

CHURCHES OF CHRIST

YOUNG PEOPLE'S WORK

The 41st annual conference of the Churches of Christ commenced last night, with the consideration of the report of the bible school and young people's department, in the City Temple. Delegates from suburban and country centres attended.

The report showed that the department had enrolled 3700 scholars and 508 teachers. Mr. A. L. Haddon (departmental secretary) is president of the New South Wales Council of Religious Education.

Attention was drawn in the report to "the large army of religiously untaught children in our State," an army that a special recruiting campaign in all schools had sought to reduce.

Dealing with the department's participation in the work of the Council of Religious Education, the report says: "Denominational differences were forgotten in the interests of childhood. Consideration for the welfare of youth

unity is being surely approached."

The chairman of the department (Mr. A. H. Webber) delivered an address on "Building the Church of the future." They should consider more carefully what they meant when they spoke of the Church, he said; discover what Jesus had in mind when He said, "I will build my Church"; catch the vision of the Church as the New Testament writers saw it. A too narrow view of the Church was taken. How should they build the small section of the Church that was in their hands, was the question for their consideration. The bible school offered the solution. "If we close down the schools to-day," said the speaker, "in twenty years we would have to close the churches." Why should it be necessary for the child to serve an apprenticeship to the devil before becoming a Christian? The opportunity of the Church and the time for the Church to be at work was with the child, to help him to grow up Christian.

Musical and elocutionary items were given by the Auburn School Choir, Miss Daphne Flood, and Miss Isobel Walker.

To-night, in the City Temple, a foreign mission demonstration is to be held.

Principal A. R. Main, M.A., of Melbourne, who is visiting Sydney in connection with the Church of Christ conference, will be the preacher at the City Temple to-morrow morning and at Chatswood in the evening.

The Church of Christ annual conference will be concluded to-morrow afternoon at the City Temple, when the conference sermon will be preached by Principal Main, on "The Churches' Message for the World of To-day."
