

## PRESIDENTS ELECT

After serving his apprenticeship as a signwriter, Bro. Long served three years in the A.A.M.C. as a Nursing Orderly. It was during his military service that he came into fellowship with churches of Christ at Georgetown during the ministry of R. V. Amos.

During his four years at the Federal College of the Bible, Glen Iris (Vic.) he was constantly engaged in evangelistic missions (both in chapel and tent) and since then has conducted over forty (40) in all the States on the mainland.

Following his graduation, he served the Victorian churches of Ballarat (York St.), Warrnambool and Horsham. It was from Horsham he came back into N.S.W. to serve as State Secretary of our Home Mission Committee. As well as in that capacity, he also served the N.S.W. brotherhood two succeeding terms as Presi-



dent of the State Ministers' Fraternal; Secretary of the Advisory Board; Chairman of the Aborigine Committee; member of Bible College Board; and for the past three years has lectured (by proxy) for the Banmatmat Bible College, New Hebrides where he recently attended the first Graduation Service.

He has been ably assisted in all his ministrations by his wife Joyce, one of the well-known Frasers of Newcastle. They have four sons and one daughter, all of whom seem to be following in their parent's musical aptitudes.

After quite a part-time interim with Epping church during the years '60 and '61; he has been serving full-time since '62.

Coming into churches of Christ from an "Open Brethren" family background, Bro. Long needed no persuasion with regard to the absolute authority of God's Word or the challenge to eschew all things denominational in seeking to restore the simplicity of the New Testament church; which may account in part for his chosen theme for his year of office as President — "EARNESTLY CONTENDING".

Lillian Main is the wife of R. D. Main of the Warrawong Church. They were both foundation members of the Wollongong Church, the first meetings being held in their home at Port Kembla.

Mrs. Main is a country woman, having grown up in one of our country churches in Victoria where her forbears were pioneers of the work, and will be the first country woman to hold the office of president of C.W.F. in N.S.W. She has four adult children, one of whom is serving with our Church in India.

## GUIDE TO DELEGATES

On behalf of the Churches of Christ in New South Wales, may we congratulate you on having been chosen as delegate to our 83rd Annual Conference. We are very glad you are able to serve in this way and look forward to fellowship with you at Conference.

To ensure that Conference is all that it should be, would you please note the following suggestions:—

- Please give prayerful consideration to the reports and notices of motion prior to coming to Conference.
- Join us in prayer each day asking for God's guidance and blessing upon each session of Conference.
- Please be sure you register with the Conference Returning Officer on arrival at each business session.
- Please observe good meeting manners.

In a large meeting, certain formalities are recognised as important to the meeting. Remember, every member must hear and understand what is being done. The following steps help to keep the meeting informal and in order.

- Rise and address the chair and wait to be recognised before speaking. Always speak through the public address system and give your name and church you represent.
- Write out all but the most simple motions.
- Observe the time limit of three minutes on each speaker. Others may also want to speak.
- Remember that each speaker, except the mover, can only speak once to a motion without the permission of the meeting.
- Vote on all questions. Failure to do so influences the result as much as voting does.
- The correct way to bring any matter before Conference is to move a motion. When seconded the matter is open for discussion.
- Remember that in discussion we are trying to discover the will of God. Don't let prejudice blind you to the leading of God's Spirit, which may come through another speaker. Always keep an open mind. Wishing you God's richest blessing on your participation in Conference.

## CONFERENCE EXECUTIVE REPORT

As we review this past year we give thanks to God for inspiration and guidance. We reaffirm our loyalty to the throne and pray God's guidance to our Gracious Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II. We rejoice in the fellowship which we find in faith, worship, witness and service as a Conference of Churches of Christ. We offer sympathy to those who miss loved ones called to be with Our Lord, and gratefully cherish the memory of those whose Christian example in life and witness, inspires us all to a more purposeful life.

**PERSONNEL:** P. H. Morton as Conference President, Mrs. F. Elsmore (Christian Womens Fellowship), C. Cole (Past President), H. M. Long (President Elect), J. Morris (Vice-President), K. L. Baker (Conference Secretary), G. Marley (Associate Secretary), R. H. Wakeley (Treasurer), T. Smith, J. Christison, D. Beckingham, W. H. B. Palmer, R. Bartholomew, T. Dunne, C. Bowser, B. Armstrong, J. Laurence-Rodgers, Dr. A. G. Elliott, C. T. Garrett, C. G. Taylor, F. R. Gee, C. Nutt, met as representing the various Committees in full Executive. Executive meets each alternate month and the Secretariat meets on the in-between month.

During the year we saw both Conference Secretary E. T. Hart, and his Assistant, O. Wainwright, relinquish their positions because of each moving away from Sydney. We are grateful to each for service well given and pray God's Blessing on them as they now serve Him elsewhere. Mr. Hart had been Conference Secretary for nearly three years and his going to Queensland leaves a gap in our ranks.

**STATISTICAL:** This year our Total Membership has increased by 144 to 6,892. Additions by Faith and Baptism were 283. We may take some encouragement in the fact that we see an increased awareness in the increase in attendance at the Lord's Table each Sunday of some 315.

**JESUS ONLY:** Our Conference President has well represented Conference and the Brotherhood by his enthusiastic attention to the matters requiring consideration. He has visited very many of our Churches and found a warmth and fellowship within the Churches which augers well for the future.

**AFFILIATIONS:** We have continued in our support of the many activities expressed through combined organisations such as, the N.S.W. Council of Churches, The British and Foreign Bible Society, Crusade for Christian Christmas, Chaplaincy Board, Temperance Alliance, Father and Son Movement, The Education Council and many others.

### MATTERS ARISING FROM CONFERENCE 1967:

1. Brotherhood Finance has been examined by a committee appointed by Executive and its report will be considered by Conference this session.
2. Brotherhood Centre — a committee has met but had to await the production of the Sydney Planning Scheme information on the area around City Temple. This is now available but the committee has not had opportunity to consider the matter in detail.
3. Voting at Conference — this has also been examined by a committee and a report will be presented at Conference for consideration at a later date, when the proposals put forward can be given time for discussion.

**CHRISTIAN MESSENGER:** Again we are indebted to the particular efforts of Mr. C. Bowser and those who labour with him for the continued production of the "Christian Messenger". The financial statement covering this work is attached, and while we operate at a slight deficit, the results may be considered satisfactory.

**FINANCIAL:** As can be seen from the financial statement the Executive has managed to come out in front for a change, and Conference dues may not have to be increased as foreshadowed last year.

**OFFICE ARRANGEMENTS:** Having no longer any full-time staff, we have arranged with the H.M. Dept. to have secretarial assistance as may be required, and all mail is handled in this way. With all new members seeking to direct this we seek your understanding and co-operation as we just now begin to see the volume of work needed, especially at Conference time.

**BROADCASTING:** We continue to use the facilities available through 2CH, both for our time 5.50 p.m. Sundays, and in the Church Services broadcast.

**FEDERAL CONFERENCE — SYDNEY 1968 (October):** Being the host State for this year's Federal Conference, we anticipate good support for this Conference from N.S.W. members. The Arrangements Committee has all matters in hand and will take the opportunity to address Conference to bring us up to date.

**WORLD CONVENTION — ADELAIDE 1970:** We are reminded that the World Convention of Churches of Christ will next be held in Australia at Adelaide in 1970.

**HALF YEAR CONFERENCE:** This was held at the newly opened Doonside Chapel. A panel type session was held and proved of great interest. Attendances however were not greatly encouraging.

**APPRECIATION:** We express our thanks to all who have contributed to the working of Conference that we may continue together in the guidance of the Holy Spirit.

The President-Elect, H. M. Long, has chosen for the Theme for his year of office, "EARNESTLY CONTENDING". May this indeed be a year in which we will indeed Earnestly Contend for Our Lord, in the power which He alone can give.

## FEDERAL CONFERENCE

### FEDERAL MATTERS:

**FEDERAL CONFERENCE:** Sydney Town Hall is the venue for the 32nd Federal Conference from 16-22 October, 1968. Now is the time to register at a cost of \$2. Forms are available from State Conference or Church secretaries. Registrations from many who will not be able to attend will be greatly appreciated by both the Arrangements Committee in Sydney and the Federal Executive.

Non-attending members of Conference will be kept informed of activities and will receive the Conference Report Book. Those who are able to attend will find a satisfying programme of Brotherhood interest and involvement as well as inspiration.

The President's Reception will follow the pattern newly set by the last Conference. All registered members of Conference may purchase tickets to this dinner at the Trocadero. A new departure will be the informal opening session to follow the dinner, rather than a separate preaching rally in the Town Hall.

Ministers from all States will be able to share in a Ministers' Seminar from 22-24 October. The programme will be led by World Convention Secretary, Dr. L. V. Kirkpatrick. Residence will be taken up at the "Namaroo" Conference Centre at the Lane Cove National Park.

Short and extended tours and harbour cruise will be available. A six-day Sydney to Sydney tour will be arranged from 23 October, and sight-seeing tours from and to Melbourne by coach taking 3, 4 and 5 days are planned.

Secretary, W. N. McCrann, had to resign to go to Kuala Lumpur, and F. J. Stephenson assumed that office last October.

**FEDERAL CONFERENCE EXECUTIVE:** The Executive for the continuing work of Federal Conference meets bi-monthly in Melbourne. The following representative brethren make up the Executive:— President, A. W. Stephenson; vice-president, F. P. Chipperfield (Victoria), P. H. Morton (N.S.W. — proxy, L. S. Dewberry), J. K. Robinson (W.A. — proxy, N. S. Moore), A. C. Male (Qld. — proxy, J. H. McCormack), C. R. Edmunds (Tas. — proxy, E. W. Heard), S. Neighbour (S.A. — proxy, Dr. G. A. Whiting); secretary, E. W. Roffey, assistant secretary, L. J. Butler; treasurer R. A. Strongman; R. H. Conning, B. F. Huntsman, K. A. Jones, A. E. White and E. L. Williams.

**FEDERAL HOME EVANGELISM:** One of the functions for which the Federal Executive is responsible between Conferences is F.H.E. Nearly \$4000 are raised annually and, apart from small overhead costs, are disbursed in the areas for which Federal Conference has accepted responsibility.

**Canberra:** The churches at Ainslie and Lyons are one in membership, ministry and administration, with certain local responsibilities. G. R. Stirling and R. W. Lawton are a splendid team in ministry. The churches are healthy, but the demands on building standards in the A.C.T. make continuing support necessary. Present subsidy is \$30 a week — a responsibility that will be with us for some time to come because of the future development of the A.C.T. Already the National Capital Development Commission is requiring churches to anticipate their needs for land in the Belconnen district. Its first residents are just moving in, but a population of 120,000 will be established in planned neighbourhoods.

When G. R. Stirling takes up his appointment as Vice-Principal of the College of the Bible, C. H. J. Wright will succeed him.

Townsville, Broken Hill and Albany are our other three areas of remote witness. We are pleased to report that ministers are at work and very active in ministry in these three areas. They are: B. L. Reid, R. C. Stack and E. B. Clapp. Current subsidies in these three areas are \$41 a week.

There have been times when we have also been able to make small additional disbursements at particular times — changes of ministry or building programmes. Prayer is especially sought for the financing of the first stage of church buildings at Albany.

We write in the name of Federal Home Evangelism each year direct to churches asking for contributions of 20 cents per member. A goodly number respond on this basis. Contributions are received from New South Wales through Finance Co-ordinating Committee.

**FEDERAL BOARDS AND COMMITTEES AND STATE CONFERENCE EXECUTIVES** find in the Federal Executive a sympathetic clearing house of concern for Australian wide Brotherhood interests. Sectional Conferences are becoming one of the most significant parts of a Federal Conference to provide broad understandings and common purpose. Federal Consultations in Christian Union and Theological Education have been held this year. Departments of Home Missions, Christian Education and Overseas Missions have annual live-in or two day conferences. While these are expensive in spite of careful stewardship, there is a growing feeling that we cannot afford to live and plan apart.

Where the Federal Executive has been an instrument of the Brotherhood of Churches of Christ in Australia, it gives thanks to God for the privilege.

#### FEDERAL CONFERENCE 1968

The next Federal Conference is planned to be held in Sydney from 16th to 22nd October. As New South Wales is the host State, the Executive has appointed a New South Wales Arrangements Committee, under the chairmanship of the Federal Conference President, Principal A. W. Stephenson, to plan local preparations including hospitality, halls, music, tours and general facilities. The Sydney Town Hall has been booked for the main sessions and registrations for Conference have been invited from all over Australia.

Members of our churches in New South Wales will have the opportunity this year to provide a Christian welcome and hospitality to delegates from other States and in this way reciprocate for the warm fellowship many of them have enjoyed when they have visited other States for a Federal Conference.

An immediate objective is to obtain at least 1000 registrations from this State and provision has been made for registrations to be made during the present State Conference as well as at local churches. Registration costs \$2 and all who register will receive a Conference Handbook and Badge, and in the case of country members assistance from the hospitality convener with accommodation arrangements. Mrs. M. Single is Hospitality Convener and she would be happy to receive offers from metropolitan members to provide hospitality for interstate or country delegates. Conference Executive commends to all churches the work of the Arrangements Committee and seeks the prayers of all for Federal Conference that it may be rich in fellowship and inspiration and accomplish much for the spiritual advancement of our churches throughout Australia.

#### REPORT OF THE AUSTRALIAN CHRISTIAN BOARD OF MANAGEMENT FOR STATE CONFERENCES, 1967

In terms of the Federal Conference Constitution the Australian Christian Board presents a report to State Conferences of its undertakings during the year.

**BOARD PERSONNEL:** The Board comprises the following:— A. D. Pyne (W.A.), Chairman; E. F. Morris (N.S.W.), Secretary; N. L. Wickham (Vic.), Deputy Chairman and Treasurer; I. J. Chivell (S.A.); G. J. Foot (Tas.); W. H. Leng (A.C.T.); Kevin Ludgater (Qld.). The Editor Mr. A. E. White also meets with the Board. Board meetings have been held once only in each year in order to conserve funds.

At its last meeting in October, 1967 the Board received and accepted with regret the resignation of its Treasurer, Mr. W. W. McDowell, Queensland. The Board placed on record its appreciation of the splendid work done by Mr. McDowell since the inception of the Board in 1962. Mr. N. L. Wickham was appointed Treasurer and Mr. Kevin Ludgater has since been appointed as Queensland representative.

**ADVISORY COMMITTEE:** The Advisory Committee has as its members: Mrs. Alison Morris, Messrs. F. Illingworth, K. Jenner, together with the Board Deputy Chairman and the Editor.

The Committee has met regularly during the year and has assisted the Board and the Editor in promotional and financial work.

**FINANCIAL:** In our last report to State Conference we reported that urgent measures were being taken to place the paper on a profitable basis. After exploring all avenues and giving deep and earnest consideration to the question the Board decided to change from a weekly paper to a fortnightly paper as from 28-3-67. The Board regretted having to do this but it was quite apparent that profitability would not be achieved whilst the paper was published weekly with its limited number of subscribers and continually rising costs. We are pleased to report that it appears the paper has at least "broken even" since the changeover and a Budget for the next twelve months indicates that we can expect operations to be on a profitable basis. Whilst the surplus may not be large we are confident that the tide has turned and that, if costs are more or less stabilised, the paper can now be operated profitably.

We are also pleased to report that all States (with the exception of New South Wales) agreed to accept the quotas suggested to them to eliminate an accumulated cash deficit that resulted in a large amount owing to the Austral Printing and Publishing Co. In thanking the States we ask that they keep the matter before them so that in due course their promises will be honoured and the debt will be wiped out. We thank them for the response they have made thus far.

**MONTHLY MEETINGS:** On the first Friday of the month, with the exception of January, July and November, we have met at City Temple, with an average attendance of 95. July meeting was held at Caringbah, and November was once again spent on "the Harbour", approximately 300 enjoying a marvellous day of fellowship.

**DEVOTIONS** have been conducted by Mrs. Bent (Overseas Missions), Greenacre Fellowship (presenting Devotions prepared by Murwillumbah) and ladies from Belmore who had attended Houseparty.

The theme for the year has been, "Strengthening our Witness" (in preparation for the Billy Graham Crusade), Mr. R. Ewers and Mr. K. Crawford brought challenging messages on Prayer and Evangelism. Other speakers were Mrs. Hammer, Federal Aborigines Committee, Ladies representative Ashwood House, Social Service, Boys' Home and Department of Christian Education. Programme "Are you Fun to Live With" was presented from C.W.F. Handbook. In September, W. C.W.F. Anniversary programme was used and Mrs. Taylor spoke continuing on from the Devotional theme of "Faith Hope and Love", telling how the Fellowships demonstrate Love towards our Aborigine Missions. The Christmas Programme was beautifully presented by North Turramurra Fellowship.

**CONVENTION DAY:** Was held at Auburn's lovely church building, and was voted a very wonderful day. In a most interesting and informative way several women told how either fellowships or individuals used their Talents for the Lord, and Mr. Howlett brought to us the work of Christian Television Association in a very challenging way.

**SPECIAL EFFORT:** Went to the Department of Christian Education that they might purchase a Movie Projector; \$844 was received.

**GILBULLA HOUSE PARTY:** This has now become an annual event, the response this year being so great it has been decided to hold two Houseparties in 1968.

**NEWCASTLE STUDY DAY** was a new feature when seven women travelled from Sydney and from Taree to meet with Newcastle District Conference for a time of real inspiration and blessing.

**WORKSHOP FOR EVENING FELLOWSHIPS** was another first in C.W.F. work. Conscious that a number of women were unable to attend previous workshops because they were held during the day, Executive arranged a Workshop for four Friday evenings when Mr. Long led sessions in Public Speaking and Business Procedure; Mr. Elbourne in Prayer and Mrs. Freckleton in Department. To those who so ably led we are deeply indebted.

**COLLEGE C.W.F.** continues to have happy and profitable meetings, under the leadership of Mrs. A. G. Elliott.

**FEDERAL CONFERENCE:** A close liaison has existed between State and Federal Executive and we were thrilled to meet together to see Mrs. Wylie's slides taken when she visited World Convention. The Federal C.W.F. Handbook has been very enthusiastically received by our Fellowships.

**SUPERINTENDENTS:** In October the Superintendents and Executive met in an informal way to discuss the work of the various Committees. This was a most helpful and profitable meeting. Many thanks to our President.

#### **ABORIGINES MISSION (Mrs. H. Taylor).**

It has been a joyful experience to witness the practical interest and co-operation of our sisters in Aborigines Mission work.

These few statistics are evidence of much enthusiastic effort by the women of N.S.W. 46 complete outfits of clothing, of excellent standards, were sent to Carnarvon. These, with all other items, amounted to 66 tea chests of goods sent to Carnarvon, Norseman and Esperance. Twelve cartons of clothing and toys to Baladoran and \$446 donated for the purchase of shoes.

I have been able to accept invitations to visit eight C.W.F. Groups to share latest news and information from our various centres.

God will surely continue to bless both us and our work as we remain open channels to Him and His love.

#### **OVERSEAS MISSION REPORT (Mrs. G. Bent)**

From the abject poverty, congestion and confusion of an Indian village, the dedication and very real involvement of Val and John Main challenged us at our Conference at the commencement of this year.

A renewed prayerful interest has been apparent, many Fellowships sending food parcels throughout the year to India.

Two Fellowships availed themselves of the opportunity to see films on our work in India and, of course, the culminating joy came in August, as nineteen large crates were packed to overflowing with really lovely gifts to bring Christmas joy to missionary and native alike in New Guinea and the New Hebrides.

Your own representatives met each month with other members of the Overseas Missions Committee and it is with gratitude, that we thank God for the many evidences of progress in each field and ask for your never-failing prayers and interest in those who have gone on our behalf.

#### **PRAYER COMMITTEE (Mrs. R. E. Wakely).**

In presenting this report at the close of my first year as Prayer Convenor I give thanks to a gracious God for His blessings and direction throughout this period. One combined meeting has been held in each district; at Tempe, Narraweena, Burwood, North Turramurra and Holroyd. I would like to express grateful thanks to each District Superintendent for their very willing co-operation in arranging these meetings. A prayer meeting is held at City Temple prior to each monthly meeting, with only a fair representation in attendance. My plea for the year ahead would be greater interest in this particular aspect of women's work. It is only through unity in these prayer meetings that we are kept in touch with the overall conference programme and the needs of each committee.

#### **TEMPERANCE COMMITTEE (Mrs. Wrigley).**

This year we have been privileged to give out further information by way of leaflets, books, strip-films, talks and demonstrations to C.W.F. groups both in halls and private homes telling of the dangers of alcohol, gambling, etc.

Sister Beth continues work of the "Helpers Club", for those 8-21 years. Ever realising the need of young people to be equipped to face up to the world of today, every opportunity is taken to present the work of Temperance. "Focus" prints short items on our behalf. Supt., represents C.W.F. at W.C.T.U. and Youth Temperance Council Meetings.

#### **PARRAMATTA DISTRICT (Mrs. Owen).**

It is with grateful thanks to our Heavenly Father that I write this Annual Report.

During the year we have met at various churches. Our average attendance is only 22 and collection \$4.15. Although we are small in numbers the sisters remain faithful, many coming from as far as Blaxland. I know their love of the Lord's work is all they desire.

We had a Prayer Day at Holroyd in August. The sisters raised \$60 from Afternoon Teas at the Boys' Home Fete in March. We entertained the ladies at Ashwood House in December when a party lunch and gifts were provided. Each church in turn takes the programme for this happy occasion.

During the year we sent \$17 towards the Special Offering for Missions to New Guinea.

To all who came and brought messages and who helped in various ways, our sincere appreciation. Our prayer is, that as we continue to serve the Lord He will help us and that the interest of all the sisters may increase.

#### **NEWCASTLE DISTRICT**

Ladies from Hamilton, Georgetown, Cardiff, Charlestown and Mayfield continue to meet bi-monthly to form the Newcastle District Conference. On occasions representatives from Taree, Kurri and Wyoming have also shared in the fellowship as we have considered together "Reaching out through C.W.F."

This year an Executive has been set up to deal with business, then bring a brief report to Conference, so leaving more time at Conference meetings for a special speaker.

We have been especially privileged to have messages from Mrs. Main on India; Mrs. Wylie — World Convention; and a Policewoman — The Problems of Youth. All urged us to be partakers of the Fellowship of Prayer.

A special feature this year was the presentation of "Echoes of Gilbulla" and we sincerely thank the State Executive and other Sydney ladies for bringing us such inspiring messages.

Each C.W.F., in turn, continues to be responsible for the Devotional Sessions. As in the previous year, a bus was hired to enable a group of sisters from this district to attend State Conference.

Throughout the year, the sisters have worked consistently in support of the local churches, missionary enterprise, at home and overseas, Aged and Boys' Homes, as well as local charities.

We thank God for the many times of inspiration and fellowship and pray that in the time which lies ahead, we may continue to "Press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus". Phil 3.14.

#### DEPT. OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION REPORT (Mrs. M. McLean).

During the year I was able to visit Doonside, Padstow, Fairfield, Beverly Hills, Holroyd, Lidcombe, Lane Cove and Seven Hills C.W.F.'s, presenting the work of our Junior Camps per medium of colour slides. Would like to suggest that a good project for Fellowships this year would be to sponsor some boy or girl to Junior Camp. This could be an investment in some boy or girl being won for Christ.

#### BIBLE COLLEGE (Mrs. R. Single)

It was with sadness and gratitude that we as a Committee said goodbye to Mrs. Corlett as Superintendent of the C.W.F. College Committee. At her last official function in this capacity on College Opening Day, recognition of this work was made by the College Committee, and later again on Women's Day of Conference. The ladies again decorated the Enmore Church for College Graduation night, and the work of those who assisted either by practical help or the sending of flowers was greatly appreciated. It was hoped that this year the ladies of the Committee would be able to help Mrs Holt in her cleaning of the College after the boys had left for the vacation, but unfortunately most of the ladies of the Committee were working, and could not arrange a time to suit the College arrangements. We give thanks to God for this opportunity of serving Him on this Committee, and pray His blessing on the College and Staff during 1968.

#### HOSPITAL REPORT (Mrs. Fishburn).

We are grateful to the churches who enable willing and dedicated women to do this necessary work, each group going well laden with fruit, cakes, sweets, gifts, etc.

Lidcombe Mens' Hospital . . . Mrs. Reid arranged for 28 groups to share the monthly visits. There was special emphasis on Fathers' Day and Christmas. Some ministers brought messages.

Bingley Hall. Six churches co-operated with Mrs. Norling in organising monthly visits. Practical help has been given to the staff.

Croydon. Mrs. Curzon and four churches are responsible for monthly visits. Guests are also taken neighbouring churches for special meetings.

Ashwood House. Thirteen churches have visited and also some groups from other denominations and from Scout Troops.

Strickland. With the help of eight churches Mrs. Fishburn arranged bi-monthly visits, with special visits for Mothers' Day and Christmas. These churches have been faithful in the visitation and practical help. We would like the support of two more churches. Some of our fellowships also visit local hospitals regularly, so making a real contribution to their community. Thank you, Sisters.

#### SOCIAL SERVICE, L. Beckingham.

This Committee commenced with eleven members but have received two resignations. We sincerely thank our members for their loyalty interest and their committed lives. All count it a privilege to carry out Christ's commission in welfare work. The ladies have worked hard, with the assistance of other C.W.F. members, on Stalls and in the Opportunity Shops resulting in \$2135.88 from the shops and \$498 from the stalls being raised. Long hours have been spent sorting clothes and rags, packing boxes for urgent needy cases, stalls and shops. In order to assist with finance for the ever-increasing need of welfare work in this Department, we have held functions such as the Garden Party at Croydon Guest Home raising \$300 and two of our members have raised \$400 and \$85 respectively. We have attended to Hospital visitations, assisted at the Homes and catered for several functions for the Department. It has been a busy year with the opening of Thirroul Guest Home, the Garden Party and an Art Show being some highlights. Finally, we assisted with the catering for our Aged Persons' Home Party for approximately 120 guests and with the packing of the many boxes of Christmas Cheer and toys for the needy of our churches and community. Thank you to all ladies who have helped this Committee in many ways. May God give us strength to continue in this service for Him.

**1967 BROTHERHOOD FINANCES:** During the year ended 30th November 1967 the Churches gave through F.C.C. \$42,547 (at 30-11-67 \$35,108). The total amount raised by all Committees

and of the amount, \$ was by contributions from our churches either through "Co-ordinated Finance" or direct by Committees. Fifty-four Churches sent their contributions through our Committee during the year. Contributions from two Churches, who support Co-ordinated Finance, were received after the close of Accounts at 30-11-67. Thirteen Churches did not send contributions through the Brotherhood Co-ordinated Finance Programme. It would also appear that some of these Churches are unable to make any contributions towards Brotherhood Work.

**1968 CONSOLIDATED BUDGET.** The Consolidated Budget is a summary of the individual Brotherhood Committee Budgets proposed for consideration by Conference. Our Brotherhood required \$137,938 of which \$78,421 (including capital items \$5340) is expected to be raised from other sources, and the balance of \$59,517 through Co-ordinated Finance and direct from Churches.

**1968 PLANS.** Finance Co-ordinated Programme will be governed by Conference decisions on the Report presented by the Select Committee set up by Conference Executive following the Special Conference held at Rockdale. Therefore until the Select Committee's Report has been dealt with and the necessary machinery to give effect to any decisions of Conference the Committee can only recommend for 1968 the previous formula adopted by Conference for the allocation of the unspecified giving be applied.

**A. CHRISTIAN EDUCATION COUNCIL:** R. Freckleton, R. Elbourne, E. Plenderleith, D. Rodger.

1. **Bible Schools.** State Roll at the beginning of 1968 indicates 73 Bible Schools. Total Scholars is 6172 with a staff of 1023.

2. **Bible School Workers Fraternal.** Four very important programmes held in 1967. Continuation proposed for 1968 under the organisation of Mr. C. Dainty, President; Miss D. Fishburn, Secretary.

3. **Scripture Exams.** There were 676 Scholars from 29 schools who sat for the 1967 exams. It is planned to continue procedure of independent Bible passages rather than lesson material for 1968. Prize-giving was held at Enmore.

4. **Isolated Scholars and Cradle Roll.** We pay tribute to continuing work of Miss Cox and Mrs. N. Elliott. The members however, are diminishing.

5. **Scholar and Efficiency Campaign.** This gave an increase in 1967. An excellent scheme is planned for 1968.

6. **Adult Christian Education.** Increased emphasis is planned for 1968.

7. **Home Bible Study and Training Course.** Over 100 people have taken exams in several of the set reading courses — including interstate participants.

**B. YOUTH MINISTRY COUNCIL:** F. Elliott, N. Hodgekiss, J. F. Morris, W. Murray.

1. **Christian Education.** The Department continues to encourage adoption of C.E. of every age level for adequate planned training for all ages. N. Hodgekiss has been State vice-president and led the N.S.W. contingent in National C.E. Convention in Adelaide.

2. **Youth Conference** is developing towards the co-ordinating body for district co-ords such as Westside and Northside Network. It is planned to foster further Co-ord development. The President for 1967 was Warren Murray and vice-President was John Rodger.

3. **Crusade '67** resulted in more than 20 public confessions. George Wood was again evangelist. Franklyn Elliott was song leader - choir master.

We thank God for His blessings. Thank you for your support. In light of Billy Graham Crusade, Federal Conference and changing Crusade Committee personnel, no Crusade '68 is planned.

4. **Sports.** Due to unforeseen circumstances no field day was held. The men's squash champion for 1967 is Barry Howe (Caringbah).

5. **Youth Concert.** We regret to announce that Mr. W. French who has organised the past 18 concerts, is unable to continue for reasons of health. We express our appreciation for service rendered and our concern for his health.

**C. CAMP MANAGEMENT COUNCIL:** D. Holloway, J. Hunter.

1. **"Camp Greenhalgh".** Road resumption is expected early in '68 with some foreshore land to be lost. Projects planned for volunteer groups in May. Mr. and Mrs. Morton continue as caretakers.

2. **Lake Macquarie.** The Lake Macquarie Shire Council plan to resume foreshore recreational reserve (8 chains) at V.G. Master is in the hands of a competent solicitor.

The Department expresses its appreciation to Glad and Will Fraser (Newcastle) for their faithful service amongst young people which acknowledge their retirement from this responsibility.

Provision has been made for development in the camping programme among both Junior and Young People.

## D. EXECUTIVE & GENERAL REPORT

1. **Lesson Material.** After many months of negotiation with the F.B.C.E. the N.S.W. Department acting on the 1967 N.S.W. Conference motion and in full co-operation with Conference Executive, agreed to take up the sole Australian reprint rights of Standard Graded Lessons. Conference Executive approved an appeal for \$4,500.00 to cover capital costs and ensure continuation of production.

2. **Focus** entered its 3rd year of publication. It is now endorsed by and sold by Baptist agency throughout N.S.W. **Focusette**, the monthly newsheet began during 1967 and continues well accepted. The untiring work of the Focus Committee is greatly appreciated. Further developments are planned.

Focus and Focusette together cost approximately \$1050.00 for 12 months production. Advertising and subscription have enabled the magazine to be self-supporting for the year ending May, 1967.

3. **Christian Education Lecturers.** The Director concluded the second alternate year of lectures in Christian Education at Woolwich. Students receive two-years towards Dip.R.E. (Melbourne College of Divinity standard).

4. **Staff Changes.** Mrs. K. Farmer concluded three years with the Department November, 1967. We have appreciated her fine service. Miss J. Dyson (Caringbah) has commenced duties as Office and D.C.E. Minute Secretary.

5. **Voluntary Workers.** The Department says thank you to Mrs. Dale and Mrs. Scholfield for valuable time given in essential tasks. Also to many who lead in camps, training programmes and serve on councils and sub-committee, we pay our tribute.

6. **Bookroom/Supplies Department.** Trading continues to develop and with the closure of the Queensland Book Depot, Dr. Jauncey - Kenmore has been appointed our agent for that State. We look forward to increased trading and many more satisfied customers in 1968. Mr. Ray Baker continues as treasurer. His service is faithful and greatly appreciated.

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## FEDERAL REPORT

This report, submitted by your Federal Board of Christian Education for inclusion in the reports of its constituent departments to their respective State Conferences, is of necessity much abbreviated.

**ANNUAL MEETING**, held in Melbourne, July 10-13, 1967, was attended by Department directors from all States. The next Board conference will be in Sydney prior to Federal Conference this year.

**PERSONNEL CHANGES.** Dr. K. R. Bowes is serving Victorian-Tasmanian Department as consultant in a part-time capacity, following conclusion in 1967 of ministries of R. V. Longthorp, director, and J. W. Way, associate director. C. H. Dow and B. Stitt commenced as directors of South Australian and Western Australian Departments respectively early in 1968. Present chairman is R. H. Hillier, with J. N. Ayers continuing as treasurer.

**NATIONAL YOUTH CONFERENCES.** The Third National C.Y.F. Convention was held in Perth, January 5-12, 1967, with 400 participants from all States. Arrangements are well in hand for the fourth Convention in Brisbane, January 5-12, 1969.

**CURRICULUM DEVELOPMENT.** With 1970 as the target year for the introduction of the new curriculum, the Board has been involved in a vast amount of study, research and detailed planning to ensure the provision of teaching resources which will greatly enhance the educational task of our churches.

Current materials are being continually revised. Work on the new curriculum is being carried out on the best possible lines and in co-operation with the Joint Board of Christian Education wherever possible.

Conferences between the editorial staff and our own State Departments of Christian Education on the proposals of the new curriculum were held during 1967 in W.A., S.A., Victoria and Queensland. At the time of preparing this report the Board was seeking opportunity for a similar conference in N.S.W.

At a Conference in Sydney in January 1967 Board members discussed curriculum concerns with N.S.W. Department representatives. A second conference in Sydney between members of the Federal Conference Executive, Federal Board of Christian Education, N.S.W. Conference Executive, N.S.W. Department of Christian Education, attempted to achieve unity in the use of our Australian brotherhood teaching materials.

**FEDERAL BOARD RECOMMENDATION.** The following resolution from the 1967 Board Conference was submitted to State Departments of Christian Education for presentation by them to State Conferences:

"This Board recommends to State Departments that they submit to their State Conferences the following motion:

This State Conference supports the recommendation of the Federal Board of Christian Education to co-operate with the Joint Board of Christian Education in the production of a new curriculum for 1970, provided that the witness of our brotherhood can be preserved within such curriculum."

The Departments in W.A., S.A., Vic.-Tas. and Queensland, approved the recommendation. It was accepted by S.A. at the 1967 State Conference. It is being submitted for consideration and the vote of 1968 State Conferences in W.A., Vic.-Tas., N.S.W. and Queensland.

**PUBLICATION.** By arrangement with the Joint Board of Christian Education, our Board published a Churches of Christ edition of "Church and Home Leaflets", designed to serve parents in guiding children in the first four years of life. The leaflets provide a small but important contribution to a partnership where the congregation and the family co-operate in the educational programme of the church.

**FINANCE.** Rising costs of production combined with the smallness of our constituency forced the Board to increase selling prices of materials as from January 1968 in order to maintain its services to the Brotherhood. Economies have been effected by a reduction in staff and office space.

## DEPT. OF SOCIAL SERVICE

1967 has been a busy year for this Department for its activities and many and diverse in nature.

Whilst much has been achieved, it is recognized that insofar as demand and pressures for assistance will allow, priorities will need to be established. This may affect some of the services currently available. To do this it is anticipated that certain steps will be taken in faith believing that God will supply that which is necessary to do the work of His Kingdom. This kind of faith will not, of course, exonerate His people from accepting their share of responsibility.

### DEPARTMENTAL ADMINISTRATION

**The Elected Committee** is primarily responsible for administration. These are capable men and women comprising: Messrs. D. Beckingham (Chairman), J. W. Boswell (Vice-Chairman), L. Larcombe (Vice-Chairman), B. A. Nichols (Homes Treasurer), W. E. Crawford, R. J. Anderson, K. E. Parker, H. H. Cox (Staff member), C. Cole (Director), J. Flannery (General Treasurer), J. Ellerby and G. Laney (Co-opted members), Mesdames Styche and Beckingham (Minute Secretary) (Women's Committee Representatives).

Mr. W. E. Crawford relinquished the position of General Treasurer, and this function has been undertaken by Mr. John Flannery.

**The Women's Committee** appointed by the Christian Women's Fellowship and comprising Mesdames Beckingham, President; Camlin, Secretary; Marley, Stalls Roster Convenor; Swift, Catering Convenor; Luxton, Mitchell, Styche, Cosh and Copley, render valuable service by arranging voluntary workers for the Depot, Stalls, Opportunity Shops, Homes, as well as organizing the Garden Party, Christmas Party for the aged people, Catering for various functions and similar services.

During the year the Associate Director, Mr. E. T. Hart, and part-time Welfare Worker, Mrs. Lester Jones, resigned to take up other positions.

To all voluntary workers in the office, depot, shops, stalls, etc., we express our appreciation.

### ACTIVITIES OF ADMINISTRATION (of a continuing nature) include:

**Used Clothing and Waste Appeal** — collecting, sorting, stalls, opportunity shops, disposal of industrial cloths and rags — Net result \$3,400. Collection from Churches per Church agents will continue but expansion plans include (a) Street Warden system whereby Church members undertake to collect in their street. This provides also an "open door" for personal evangelism; (b) Street collection with use of van. Bags, literature, etc. will be provided.

**Art Exhibition** arranged by the Upper North Shore Art Society — approximately \$100 resulted after expenses.

**Affiliations** — The Department is represented on organizations such as The Council of Social Services of N.S.W., N.S.W. Temperance Alliance, Old People's Welfare Council, Mental Health Association, Good Neighbour Council, Inter-Church Migration Board, National Marriage and Family Week, Father and Son Movement, Inter-Church Trade and Industry Mission, Voluntary Geriatric Agencies, etc.

Other matters receiving attention include the Collection and Disposal of used furniture (Proceeds \$766.00 assist Homes); Rose Day Appeal (\$250.00 netted); Beneficial Co-operative Building Society (No. 2 expected to open this year); Publicity ("Social Service Survey" and publications.)

### SERVICES — CURRENT AND FUTURE

The Church must always be concerned with the problems of people which tend to devalue personality, for Jesus came "that they might have life and have it more abundantly". These services, then are both preventative and remedial in nature.

**Social Worker.** The expanding and complex demands have made the employment of a qualified Social Worker an urgent necessity. The specific duties will be to maintain and expand Individual and Family Welfare and Case-work, Services to Migrants, Pensioners, Widows, Deserted Wives, Unmarried Mothers, and arrangements of Adoptions, Rehabilitation programmes, Recruitment and Training of Voluntary Welfare Workers, Advisory services to Churches and Preachers where necessary.

**Adoptive Services.** We now operate in conjunction with the Sydney Rescue Work Society in arranging adoptions. A voluntary qualified Social Worker interviews and advises. Enquiries are invited.

**Counselling for Marriage for Married Couples** is receiving attention and it is expected these lectures will be available during 1968.

**Information Studies** on all aspects of Christian Social Work and its implications will be planned during the coming year.

**A Training Course** for Ministers and Counsellors directed by the Social Work Department of the University of N.S.W. was held and was attended by a number of our preachers. It is anticipated that these lectures will continue. This course was proposed by our Department and Churches and Ministers are encouraged to take advantage of it.

**Rehabilitation workshop.** Investigations are continuing and it is anticipated that a service of this kind for pensioners and similar people will be initiated as soon as accommodation and necessary facilities are available.

**Mortality and Memorial Plan.** After careful investigation, at the suggestion of the President and Executive of Conference, we are able to announce the founding of this Plan in conjunction with Pine Grove Memorial Park Ltd. Provision is made for a Churches of Christ Interment Section and Memorialization. Pre-paid Cremation and Burial Certificates offer great savings and freedom from anxiety by relatives at the time of demise. There will be a contribution by Park Grove to the Department. The Plan with its excellent services and facilities is highly recommended.

**Representation amongst Churches** is taking on a new form. The Director with a musical team is available for Field Days or weekends amongst our Churches. This comprises the presentation of the Gospel, together with inspirational and informative addresses and discussions.

Consideration may be given to assisting Churches whilst Preachers are on holidays, under certain conditions.

Enquire about these.

**Credit Unions and a Credit Advice Bureau** for those requiring purchasing finance and advice on credit buying are under consideration and approaches will be made to Churches during the year.

**Social Questions.** The Department believes that the Church must take a strong constructive attitude on current social problems but that it must be done with understanding and a positive objective in mind. Such questions embrace Alcoholism, Drug Addiction, Pornographic publications, Road Safety, Peace and War, and similar issues which affect the social, moral and spiritual health of our community.

**Other Services** available are — Material Aid (food, clothing, accommodation, etc.); Christmas Cheer (toys and hampers); Pre-marital Education Courses; Chaplaincy Services to Hospitals, Prisons, Institutions and Industry.

### HOMES ADMINISTRATION

The four Aged Persons' Homes conducted by this Department continue to give splendid care to the aged guests of our Churches and others — care of a quality far in excess of the fees paid.

Economic administration demands that all of our Homes must provide accommodation for not less than twenty guests so that overhead costs may be spread over a greater number. Despite economical administration a deficit of approximately \$800 was incurred in running the Homes.

**"Bingley Hall", Hornsby** — the oldest established Home accommodating nine guests. Staff — Mr. and Mrs. Edwards.

Refurnishing has been completed. Interior decoration and exterior painting must be completed this year. Additions to enlarge accommodation to twenty guests should be undertaken also.

**Pendle Hill** — Will Roffey Community Centre for independent living in flats and units — 29 residents — a splendidly-kept property. Provision is now made for Occupational Therapy in Community room. Improvements to buildings and gardens were effected during year.

A proposed gift by Boys' Home and Young Men's Hostel Committee, of land 76' x 455' at rear of Centre for additional units, possibly of "motel" design, is greatly appreciated.

**Croydon.** Guest accommodation for 13 and 6 independent units. Mrs. Richardson is Matron. The services of Mrs. R. Hart and Miss R. Mudford were appreciated.

It is planned to construct another storey over the existing units providing two flats to accommodate staff and six additional guest-rooms, together with bathroom and toilet facilities.

**Thirroul** — Samuel and Ann McCauley Guest Home — was opened in June, providing accommodation for 19 guests and staff. Ideally situated. Matron is Mrs. Atkinson. This Home was made possible by a generous donation by its previous owner, Mrs. Wyndham-Jones.

The Department has title to an adjacent cottage which it is proposed to convert to additional guest rooms during 1968. In addition, a Nursing Annexe of approximately ten beds is under consideration. This will provide complete care at this centre.

**Newcastle.** The property purchased at 26 Victoria Street has not yet been converted to a Guest Home, due to inadequate finance. The Committee is now planning to use the Home as it is until \$10,000 can be found for conversion purposes.

**Nursing Hospital for Geriatrics.** The Appeal to Churches resulted in an amount of \$24,500. Because of the change in the Commonwealth Aged Persons' Homes Act enabling subsidy to apply to such a Hospital, it was considered advisable to change the location from Pendle Hill where subsidy would not apply to the land. Other locations have been considered and it is now proposed to locate the hospital at Carlingford.

**Occupational Activities,** under the guidance of Mrs. Ken Baker, are providing a therapy for our guests at Croydon. Everyone appreciates Mrs. Baker's help. It is hoped that during this year this same kind of therapy will be introduced to all our Homes. If qualified or capable people in the field are available, we would be pleased if they would contact the Director.

There is a **Chaplain** at each Centre who provides a spiritual therapy for our guests and residents. "Bingley Hall" — Mr. D. Oldfield; Pendle Hill, Mr. A. Rae; Croydon, Mr. F. Ewers; Thirroul, Mr. D. Mansell.

The **Garden Party** organized by the Ladies' Committee was conducted at the Croydon Home in October, at which the handicrafts by the guests, together with other items provided by the Ladies' Committee, were displayed. Proceeds \$320.

It is to be expected that there will be changes in the personnel of our guests and residents during any year. Mostly these have been due to death, and we commend their loved ones to the care of our Heavenly Father.

### CHRISTIAN FELLOWSHIP ASSOCIATION

C.F.A. has been able to serve the needs of our Brotherhood in a remarkable way. Despite apparent affluence, stark tragedy sometimes could have been experienced by many of our members had it not been for the financial assistance of C.F.A., coupled with the counselling guidance of the Social Service Department. Contributions have amounted to \$2126.00. Loans and gifts have totalled \$850.00.

We commend C.F.A. to all our Church members and would suggest that both younger and older members may deny themselves that little extra extravagant living in order to assist, by our combined efforts, someone who otherwise may feel deserted and denied and thus find life intollerable and without meaning and purpose. Surely this is the application of the words "bear ye one another's burdens and so fulfil the law of Christ". However, be sure to obtain the Annual Report of C.F.A. for your information.

**Welfare Traders Ltd.** Sponsored by the Department but now a self-managing corporate retailing organization providing advantages for purchasers and distributing profits to Committees of Conference.

**Thanks.** Members of the Committee wish to express their appreciation to their Heavenly Father for His guidance and help during the year. We thank too our brethren for their co-operation and especially those who in practical ways have extended their encouragement and assistance in this most exacting, sometimes frustrating, and yet most rewarding work of our Churches in the community.

## PREACHERS PROVIDENT FUND

The Board has continued to implement its established policies during the past conference year, adding to the record of service to ministers, missionaries, students of the Bible Colleges and on behalf of the churches.

The Board consists of W. K. Hunter (Chairman); H. E. Bell (Treasurer); A. Laney (Secretary); R. Souness, M. Titterton, F. Stephenson, Dr. C. J. Mackenzie, R. Wolfenden and S. H. Laney (life member).

The work of the board consists of the receipt of contributions from preachers, churches and mission boards; the investment of these moneys in trustee securities that will return the greatest return for the preachers and still comply with the requirements of the various regulations governing Superannuation Funds; providing an insurance cover against death for each subsidised member of the Fund; determining and calculating General Bonuses, Subsidy Bonuses and interest on behalf of each member of the Fund; payment of financial assistance to widows of preachers who are in need; payment of a donation to help defray funeral costs in respect of each preacher throughout the Commonwealth who passes to his reward, arrange payment of Superannuation, Long Service Leave, with Bonuses to members of the Fund who resign or who retire from the full-time service of the brotherhood; arrange payments of Long Service Leave Benefits to preachers after 15 years of continuous service.

The Board also strives to improve the benefits payable to preachers by encouraging both preachers and churches to make adequate provision for the needs of the minister when he retires. This might be regarded as sufficient to purchase a house in which to live after he retires. Both the preachers and the churches must recognise their individual responsibility in this matter this aim is to be achieved.

The Preachers Provident Fund would need to receive at least \$130 per annum towards a preacher's superannuation and the equivalent of one week's salary plus \$13 from the church to provide Long Service Leave Benefits and insurance against death. This might be equalised by the church and the preacher each contributing \$100 per annum. These observations are presented merely to provoke thought and are not intended as concrete proposals.

**STATE REPRESENTATIVES.**

During the year our Victorian representative Miss F. Haines retired after a long and faithful period of service in that capacity. The Board wishes to place on record its appreciation of the work done by Miss Haines on its behalf. Bro. A. R. Haskell has now been appointed to the position. Bro. J. Wiltshire has resigned as Queensland representative but a successor has not yet been appointed. In South Australia Bro. C. E. Curtis and in West Australia Bro. K. Patterson represent the Board.

Membership of the Fund now stands at 327 of which 24 are students in Bible Colleges, 272 are preachers under 65 years of age, 23 are preachers over 65. During the year 15 have resigned from the Fund and seven have been deleted from the records having not continued in the work after entering College.

## ABORIGINES COMMITTEE

We humbly and sincerely thank our Heavenly Father for His guidance during the past year. Progress can be reported on all fields and we thank God for the many precious souls that have been brought to the Lord Jesus Christ.

### THE FIELDS.

Important developments during the past year have been the completion of buildings for the Christian Centre work — the hall and chapel and residence at Carnarvon, hall and the purchase of adjacent residence at Norseman. The Children's Homes work continues its important ministry, and a further hostel has been built at Carnarvon for young people employed locally. "Fairhaven" hostel has maintained a steady development and is preparing for a building programme. In the Eastern States, forward moves are in hand at Eidsvold (Q), and the centre of Melbourne suburban activity has shifted from Fitzroy to Northcote. Work continues happily, and with good results at Mooroopna (V) and Balladoran (N.S.W.). Cummeragunga, on the River Murray, and long a centre of interest in our brotherhood, is included in our work, and receives regular visits from Echuca Church. We have much for which to thank God, and look forward to a bright future under His guidance.

### CARNARVON.

The Christian Centre. Completion of the building programme has provided a set-up which is practical, functional and worshipful, and a very fine example of an "integrated church" makes good use of it. A welfare work, both social and spiritual, is also conducted. Mr. and Mrs. R. C. Field have replaced Mr. and Mrs. Fisher in the Centre work.

The Children's Home continues with 130-140 children in residence, and the gradual swing towards school-aged children accepted for educational reasons continues to be evidenced. More of the young people are coming to the city for further education, and a wider variety of employment is opening to them.

Teen's Hostels. The Teen's Cottage at the Mission Homes continues to cater for the needs of the young people needing special facilities for High School studies, and a further Hostel at the Christian Centre is expected to be in operation at the beginning of 1968 to cater for young people going into employment in the town.

The Hostel Annexes caters for our young people on holidays, and for aboriginal folk needing accommodation while outpatients at the local hospital.

Outreach work. Mr. Bob Williams has had the assistance of Mr. J. Ranger, Mr. L. Fisher and others in outreach trips during the year, and a good work has been done.

### NORSEMAN

The work in this area has been maintained in spite of the handicap of having no Field Superintendent this year.

Christian Centre. The completion of the large hall has been of great help, and is being used for integrated church activities, plus a wide range of other welfare and spiritual activities. Work includes literacy and craft classes for adults, a weekly radio programme, and the usual welfare activities. The completion of renovations to the residences will provide a set-up of great value for work in this needy area.

Children's Homes. Numbers are slightly lower than the previous year (around 60 children) but still the greater number are from problem homes, or other special circumstances. Most are committed under Child Welfare Acts. There is, however, a growing tendency to recognise Norseman as a centre for higher education for the Goldfields and Western Desert areas and some development can be expected along this line. Farm activity continues to be a valuable aspect of the work.

Outreach. A number of outlying centres are visited regularly in a ministry in which Christian Centre and Children's Home missionaries share, and valuable work is being done over a wide area. Itinerant trips further afield are arranged at intervals. The radio session spreads the ministry of encouragement and help still further.

### ESPERANCE

The "Fairhaven" Hostel shows stability and this is reflected in the growing maturity of the girls who receive their training there; and also in those who remain as boarders. The grant of \$21,000 from the W.A. Government for extensions will enable the erection of a block to include adequate ablution, toilet and laundry facilities for the home, plus accommodation for ten girls, additional staff quarters and a large lecture hall - common room. Work has already commenced on this addition, and the voluntary help of men from the Churches is being sought.

### VICTORIA

Northcote. The change in the nature of the inner suburbs of Melbourne has led "Pastor Doug" Nicholls and others who share in this work, to transfer the work from Fitzroy to Northcote, where the Aborigines Advancement League hall is being used for regular Sunday services.

Mooroopna. Mr. and Mrs. R. Clydesdale report encouraging developments in this area, particularly among the young people. Help is being given along educational lines (special coaching) as well as normal youth activities. Church services continue to attract good attendances.

Cummeragunga. Mr. David Marr, Minister at Echuca, continues to visit this settlement in a regular ministry and is finding encouragement in the response made. A chapel has long been desired in this area.

### NEW SOUTH WALES.

Balladoran settlement continues its ministry under the guidance of a Committee of local brethren and representatives of the Gilgandra Church. Miss Judy Simpson, schoolteacher, will be missed from the work as she goes to an Overseas Missions appointment.

### QUEENSLAND.

Eidsvold. Mr. and Mrs. Kusay have had full responsibility of the work at Eidsvold since the departure of Mr. and Mrs. Farmer from the district. Church and Bible School activities continue to develop healthily. Young people's activities are attracting towns people as well as aborigines. A forward move in 1968 will provide for Mr. and Mrs. L. Morris to be stationed in this area. Mr. Morris graduated from Woolwich College (N.S.W.) in 1967.

FINANCE. At the beginning of 1967 the Federal Board overdraft was up towards \$25,000.

This was due to a great deal of extra expenditure for Christian Centre buildings at Carnarvon and Norseman. During the year, great care was exercised and expenditure kept within limits. At the end of the year, overdraft is around \$15,000 and local efforts at both Carnarvon and Norseman are being made to accept responsibility for outstanding debts on the buildings. This is encouraging. At the same time, larger staff commitments in various centres, and extra expenses in connection with the "Fairhaven" extensions will require careful husbanding of available resources. We are looking to the Brotherhood to stand behind the work.

GENERAL. Members of the Brotherhood help in a variety of ways. In special gifts, child support, clothing, voluntary service on the fields etc., a splendid contribution is being made. For all of this, and the regular prayer and financial support, we thank God.

It is not proving easy to keep the Churches informed of the work. Deputation work prior to Annual Offering is not generally possible, and every opportunity is being made to provide missionary speakers before or after furlough, when this can be arranged other than in the Christmas holiday period. "The Bob Williams Story" has been well received.

The growing maturity evidenced in the lives of adult aborigines who have accepted Christ is a continuing cause for thanksgiving, as is the development evidenced in the lives of so many of the young people who have been trained in the Missions.

Park who, despite ill health, has given yeoman service as Publicity Officer. We thank all the brethren of the Churches and the various auxiliaries for their continued support, not forgetting our Sisters who never fail to help forward this important work amongst our dark people. We confidently look forward to your wholehearted and prayerful support during the coming year, knowing that our Heavenly Father will bless the work of those who are faithful to Him.

During the past year many changes in ministries have taken place. Some of the situations confronting the Advisory Board have been extremely difficult and in these cases we have particularly felt the need for God's guidance and help. Now as we look back we can see that prayer has been answered and we confidently look forward to much blessing throughout the brotherhood during the coming year.

Nineteen churches have had changes in ministries and most of these have sought the assistance of the Advisory Board. Thirteen have been successful in obtaining the services of full-time men and four have decided to try to arrange part-time ministries. Included in the thirteen are two from interstate: R. C. We would especially like to thank church Office Boards and Ministers who have allowed us to be of some service when the need has arisen and at the same time remind all churches that the policy of this board is to recommend only men who, in the opinion of the board, would be suitable in each particular case. This we have endeavoured to do.

**ACCOMMODATION CAPACITY:** Dunmore House 26-30 boys — average year 23; Hostel, 16 young men — average year 12.

We again place on record our sincere appreciation of the devoted service rendered by the staff; both at the Home and Hostel. Theirs is indeed beyond the call of duty. No 40 hour-week for them! Their work — the responsibility of boys and young men and their material and spiritual needs is ever with them. This is a parent's job, very much enlarged and one which is never-ending.

Mr. Arthur Dalton has served as Manager for 16 years. They have been tremendously fruitful and valuable years. They have been years given in love to the service of boys in need of help. The end-result is often never revealed, but sometimes the fruits of labour are revealed and there are occasions when Mr. Dalton really glows with excitement and pride. Such an occasion occurred recently when one of Mr. Dalton's boys arrived at the Home to introduce his bride. This boy who was in the Home for many years, grieved over his alcoholic mother and vowed to do something for her. On his surrender to Christ and Mr. Dalton's great understanding pulled the boy out of a terrible background into a clean Christian life.

This is the aim of the Committee and Staff — to assist boys and young men physically and materially; but whilst doing so to lead them to Christ.

Mr. Dalton is ably assisted in his work by Matron Williams who has given six years of unstinted service to Dunmore. We pay special tribute to Miss Williams for her untiring service has been an inspiration. Often over these six years the going has been difficult owing to staff shortages but always we could rely on Miss Williams to carry on.

Matron Williams indicated her intention of retiring at the end of 1967 and although we were very sorry we realised this was reasonable. So we set on the almost impossible task of replacing her. Have you ever tried to find a mother for 24 boys, a cook, a cleaner, a tailor, a laundress, a psychologist, a nurse, and a diplomat all rolled into one person called a Matron? We wrote at least twice to all of our churches, we advertised in National and State denominational papers as well as our own papers. We sought by every means known to entice a Matron to Dunmore. We eventually found one, but we didn't have her for long because one of the boys' fathers came along and took her from us. Now, at the time of writing we have neither Matron or Assistant Matron; but here we have the proof of the sterling qualities of Matron Williams and Mr. and Mrs. Dalton, for they have planned to carry on whilst we explore every avenue to find a replacement for Miss Williams and an Assistant Matron.

Without the help of such a Staff and that of the casual and voluntary workers our task would be impossible.

The growth of the boys, physically and spiritually, is gratifying and a testimony to the dedication of every member of the Staff.

Mrs. Frost, as Supervisor of the Hostel, is doing a fine work, and although she has not always felt well during this past year, has always tried desperately to keep going. Sometimes the emotional drain of keeping up with 16 young men is more difficult than the physical strain. We are, however, mostly due to Mrs. Frost's patience, seeing changes for the good and marked development in the young men in residence.

**ACHIEVEMENTS:** Committee members have, for some time, expressed concern on various aspects of the work, particularly property standards. For so long finance has not been available to carry out maintenance and renovations as were necessary to keep up a certain standard. These standards are not only desirable but

necessary for the morale of the staff, boys and indeed the entire Brotherhood. Arrangements were made for an overdraft from the Bank of N.S.W. for \$25,000 and a loan from the Deposits Fund for \$5,000 to carry out essential capital work. During 1967 the following improvements were made.

## DUNMORE HOUSE:

**Manager's Residence:** This lovely three bedroom brick home was completed in August. It is a graceful home, in keeping with Dunmore. Its front door faces directly the sturdy oak door of Dunmore with the circular drive and the rose garden in between. So the position is more convenient being closer to the Home.

**NEW OUTSIDE TOILETS:** It was considered undesirable to have people wandering into the Home and toilet facilities have not been up to standard for such occasions as Fetes etc., so a powder room with two ladies' toilets were constructed alongside of a gentlemen's toilet at the back of the boys' shower block. These extra facilities have been much needed and will be a big asset.

**NEW KITCHEN EXTENSIONS AND MODERNISATION:** The smallness of the kitchen has concerned the Committee for many years; thus it was decided to extend the kitchen by using part of the side verandah. This gave enough space to put in a very modern cooking range, a large stainless steel sink and many extra cupboards. New floor covering was laid and the lovely new stainless steel refrigerator-freezer was brought into the kitchen and placed where the big, old chimney had been. This kitchen is now the answer to a housewife's dream.

**TRACTOR:** In addition to all these renovations a good second-hand Ferguson Tractor was purchased, which makes much shorter work of keeping the grass cut.

## HOSTEL:

The kitchen, which was terribly inadequate to serve 14-16 meals was extended and modernised with extra cupboards, lovely vinyl floor-covering, a dream of a gas range and a large two-door refrigerator-freezer.

## PROJECTS:

**DUNMORE HOUSE:** Immediate: New Laundry and Washing facilities. Sealing of drive.

**HOSTEL:** Long term: Study Room. Car Ports.

## SALE OF LAND — PENDLE HILL:

The loan and overdraft arrangements were completed on the basis of subsequent disposal of an area of surplus land and after consultation with the Social Service Department, a plan of subdivision was approved by the Conference Executive. This subdivision provides for a gift of an area 70' x 450' to the Social Service Department.

After careful consideration of all aspects over a period of years, it was obvious that the only way to achieve the essential improvements was to dispose of the surplus land area. This disposal will save approximately \$2,000 in interest annually; will reduce the area to be maintained and still leave some nine acres which is adequate for future expansion.

**FETE:** We again express very sincerely our appreciation to all the Churches and Brethren involved in this major effort. Last year we realised \$1843. Over the past years the fete has been essential for the continuance of the work.

**FINANCIAL:** As will be seen from the Financial Report, both the Home and Hostel are paying their way (after taking into consideration the Fete), but it is obvious that revenue could never provide for capital works.

**LADIES AUXILIARY:** The Committee is indebted to the following members for their assistance through the year: Mesdames Luxton, Kitchener, Smith, Michelle and Menogue. Also to the ladies who have allowed themselves to be co-opted and have done a tremendous work at the Home and the Hostel.

**THANKS** are expressed to the Brotherhood for its interest and help in so many ways; for donations from individuals and churches, for expressions of concern and interest and for prayers. We know we can count on all to assist, inspire and encourage the staff and committee, that together we may honour the One whose name we are privileged to bear.

## CHAPEL EXTENSION REPORT

**PERSONNEL:** Messrs. P. H. Morton (Chairman), N. D. Morris (Deputy Chairman), S. C. Woolley (Registrar), R. Bartholomew (Asst. Secy), B. Perkins (Securities Officer), K. Hunter, N. H. Matthews, L. Wilson, C. Cole (Secretary), Mrs. D. Beckingham (Minute Secy) (non-member), W. McFadyen (Treasurer) (non-member), D. Ferguson (Solicitor) (non-member), J. W. Boswell (Auditor) (non-member). During the year Mr. L. Wilson became a member of this Committee by virtue of his appointment as a member of the Property Trust. Mr. D. Bentley found it necessary to resign as Treasurer and we express our appreciation to him for his services. Mr. W. McFadyen willingly accepted the responsibility of Treasurer and we express our appreciation to him. The number of meetings held were 12, with an average attendance of seven.

**LOANS:** Outstanding loans at the close of the year numbered 18 with a total indebtedness of \$28,513.

With regard to loans, the function of this Committee in the future will be one in which bridging finance is made available where a Church is unable to find the difference between money in hand and finance by borrowing for a project. Generally lending is being done through the Deposits Fund. The Committee too may guarantee a Church in its borrowing where necessary.

**OTHER FUNCTIONS OF THE COMMITTEE:** It may subsidise interest rates payable on Deposits Fund Loans where a Church finds the payment of interest a burden in the early stages of the mortgage. Particularly this may be the case with new Churches. It also provides an avenue whereby Churches may contribute directly to the ongoing of Brotherhood work, particularly with regard to the establishment of new causes, through their regular offerings either through F.C.C., duplex, or annually.

**INSURANCE COMMISSION:** The amount of \$810 was received from the Queensland Insurance as commission on insurances.

This Committee expresses its thanks to our Heavenly Father for the opportunity of service and to Churches and individuals who have assisted in any way. During 1967 we would like to see a large increase in investments with the Deposits Fund. In this regard it is planned to publicise the Deposits Fund amongst the Churches.

## PROPERTY TRUST REPORT

Wilson, C. Cole (Secretary), W. McFadyen (Treasurer) (non-member), D. Ferguson (Solicitor) (non-member), J. W. Boswell (Auditor) (non-member), Mrs. D. Beckingham (Minute Secretary) (non-member). During the year Mr. D. Bentley found it necessary to relinquish the position of Treasurer as he planned to go to the U.S.A. His work was greatly appreciated. We welcome Mr. McFadyen as Treasurer. Mr. L. Wilson was appointed to fill the vacancy left by Mr. R. Taylor's resignation.

The number of meetings held were 12 with an average attendance of 7.

**THE FUNCTIONS OF THE TRUST** in the future as in the past, will comprise many and varied matters dealing with Church properties. In many respects these are of a specialised nature such as providing a continuing Trusteeship, arrangement and approval of mortgages and overdrafts, leases, sale and purchase of properties, representation to Department of Main Roads in cases where Notices of Resumption are issued to Churches, attention to rating of properties, suitable and adequate insurance cover for property and personnel, attention to draft amendments to the Incorporation Act and Constitution, etc.

It is interesting to note that whilst in some way all our Churches have been served by the Trust, 24 Churches, 4 Conference Committees and Conference Executive have received detailed and prolonged attention to matters involving their properties during the past year.

**DEPOSITS FUND.** There has been an increase in investments with the Fund which now stands at over \$37,000. Included in this amount is \$18,475 Chapel Extension and surplus monies of the Property Trust. Money "on call" amounts to \$29,813. The amount of money on loan to Churches is slightly in excess of \$33,000.

Most Churches who applied for loans received assistance, if not in full, then in part. Those Churches requiring finance and which have been deferred provide an opportunity for investment in the Fund by individuals and Churches. Individual Savings not immediately required could earn better than Bank interest and be available in short time. Similarly Churches who may have surplus monies or holding accounts for future development could greatly assist by investing these with the Fund, thus enabling an extension of our Brotherhood activity amongst the Churches and Committees of Conference. Security is excellent.

**INSURANCE COMMISSION:** The amount of commission received from the Queensland Insurance Co. as commissions from insurances of Church properties, totals \$1657 of which \$810 was passed on to the Chapel Extension Committee. The services and facilities offered by the Queensland Insurance Co. are good and the commissions received without any effort or work by the Trust help in Brotherhood development. May we urge Churches to consider insuring with the Queensland Insurance Co. and to make sure that adequate replacement cover on property is taken out and provision to meet all contingencies with reference to personnel is made.

The work of the Trust is of vital importance to our Brotherhood although it is carried through without ostentation.

We express our thanks to our Heavenly Father for this avenue of service believing that the faithful care of material matters has a part in His kingdom.

We thank too all who have assisted in any way and are grateful for the rich fellowship enjoyed by Trust members in their regular meetings.

### GENERAL

G. Elliott, K. Farmer and R. Kallmier combined University Studies during the year with their college course. Ex-Students G. Chapman, D. Nutt and R. Ellis have continued their studies assisted by the Ashwood Settlement Scholarship.

The College Board acknowledges with gratitude the work of the Faculty in their important contribution to the College. Those who have served in an honorary capacity during 1967 have been Brethren Bowser, Ewers, Taylor, Crawford and Armstrong.

Thanks are expressed to the brethren who have provided hospitality for the students at the various churches. We consider this association of students with churches to be an essential part of the students training, as well as providing for them a 'home' away from 'home'. There are over 20 churches served by students but once again may we remind the churches that this is only a part-time ministry and restricted demands be made on students' time.

The work of publicising the activities of the College was done by the Board through our regular paper the Australian Christian and the Christian Messenger, as well as by the efforts of the students in visiting country areas, provincial cities and the Sydney metropolis. Tapes and slides were used extensively. Country churches were particularly appreciative of this work. The Woolwich Magazine was again published, receiving favourable acceptance. Valuable help was received from the Publicity Committee. Sales have covered costs. The students are to be commended for this effort which is entirely their own work.

Once again senior students took the opportunity to enrol in a series of studies provided by various hospitals in Sydney which deals with the various problems associated with the counselling of the sick. Valuable experience was gained by the students who participated.

Arrangements were made for the College Buildings to be used in late January by the Federal Conference for a meeting of representatives from various states and colleges to discuss the training of men for the Christian ministry.

During the year the lady students with the fiancées or wives of the students participated in Christian Women's Fellowship meetings held by Mrs. Elliott in her home.

It was decided to provide extensive repairs to the Corlett Hall Verandah; to supply an ablution block for the students and as well carry out necessary maintenance. The conversion of the property under 51 and 35 The Point Road into four flats for married students has proved very successful. However, we are still not able to meet the requirements of all the married students desiring accommodation and we would appreciate the help of the churches in making manses available when possible. The appeal to the brotherhood for the married students flats was very successful, the amount being given exceeding the aim. For this we thank each one who helped.

Mrs. Holt has continued very efficiently as housekeeper, and with her helpers Mrs. Ellison, Mr. and Mrs. Taylor as well as some of the students, have provided very good meals, and kept the College clean and attractive.

At the opening session of the College in 1967 Mrs. Corlett was thanked for her many years of service as convenor of the Women's Conference Committee. Mrs. Single now has taken over this responsibility and we thank for this help.

At the invitation of the Overseas Mission Board and a special request from the College Committee of Banmatmat, Principal Stephenson attended the first Graduation service and gave the charge to the nine out-going students. The Federal Executive and the Woolwich College Board made it financially possible for Principal Stephenson to attend. The Board was happy to do this for a close liaison has existed between the two colleges, Bro. D. Eagling being an ex-student of Woolwich. Principal Stephenson was impressed with the excellent tone of Banmatmat and with the dedicated and wonderful work done by Bro. Eagling.

### FINANCIAL

We still need the constant financial support of the Brotherhood in view of rising costs in matters of building and catering requirements of the students and we look to the Brotherhood in confidence to provide this help. We have in the last year enjoyed a high standard of spiritual life in the College. The students have maintained their devotional life on a high plane and have also conducted each month a Chapel Service for the local residents. The work done by the staff and faculty is of a sacrificial nature and for those who share in a like manner, each joins in speeding on men and women into the Harvest.

The Board acknowledges with gratitude the response by Churches and individuals to the Special 25th Anniversary Appeal by the College to assist in the provision of accommodation for married students. Altogether an amount of \$4267 was received by the Board to 30-11-67, which exceeded the target that had been set by the Board of \$4000. This magnificent response together with splendid gifts made by the Christian Women's Fellowship and bequests from estates of the late Christina Maud Adams and Florence Whelan resulted in a marked improvement in the financial position of the College at 30-11-67.

The Board also expresses appreciation to Miss F. M. Ashwood who has again shown in a tangible way her very real interest in the College by making available a capital sum of \$4000 to be invested, the interest to be used in assisting students in University courses.

Thanks are also expressed to Mrs. Ashwood-Robertson for converting an interest free loan of \$4000 to an outright gift to the College.

Continuing rising costs have again outstripped amounts paid as board by Students and may necessitate a further upward adjustment in board charged, in order to balance the budget in the coming year.

In thanking the Brotherhood for its support in the past year the Board asks for continued interest and support during the twelve months ahead.

## DEPT. OF HOME MISSIONS REPORT

### INTRODUCTION

In presenting this report we wish to praise God for His continued guidance and blessing during the past year. Our aim as a Department has been to fulfill the charge given in 11 Timothy 4:1-2, "And so I solemnly urge you before the God and before Christ Jesus — Who will some day judge the living and the dead when He appears to set up His kingdom. To preach the Word of God at all times, whenever you get the chance, in season and out, when it is convenient and when it is not. Correct and rebuke your people when they need it, encourage them to do right, and all the time be feeding them patiently with God's Word." (Living Letters).

During 1967 we have seen several developments which we believe are of God and could have a profound effect upon our work as we are obedient to what God is saying to us through His Word.

### THE COMMITTEE

### THE FIELDS


**Belrose-North Balgowlah** (R. Foletta and V. Dallinger). This is a very rapidly developing area of Sydney and local members need our constant prayers as they endeavour to keep up with all the opportunities that are being presented to them. At the end of the year R. Foletta concluded his ministry and moved to Tamworth. Membership is 48, subsidy \$520 from Home Mission and \$500 from Campbell Edwards Trust.

**Broken Hill** (R. Sack). This ministry is maintained by Co-operation between the local congregation, South Australian Home Mission Department, Federal Home Evangelism and ourselves. Church membership stands at 62 with a high percentage of members in regular communion. The Sunday School average is in the sixties. Subsidy \$104.

**Campbelltown** (J. Bacik). Development at Campbelltown has been slower than anticipated due to delays in providing electric train service to Campbelltown. It is now anticipated that this will be available next year. This should result in a more rapid development in the area and it is hoped that some of our young couples in Sydney will establish their homes here and become missionaries to Campbelltown. Membership is 35, subsidy \$520.

**Dapto**. Developments at Dapto have been encouraging. Sunday School held in the home of Mr. and Mrs. F. Northey has grown to an attendance of 65. During the year Church building and manse have been erected on site in preparation for the ministry of Mr. and Mrs. J. Bacik, who will commence in February, 1968. Wollongong and Warrawong are both playing a vital part in the development of this Church.

**Engadine** (D. Sander). There has been a steady development of the work at Engadine following the opening of the building last year. Sunday School has grown to 100. Caringbah have continued initial assistance by paying for the student's salary and several members from Caringbah assist as teachers in the Sunday School. Rockdale, Hurstville and Bexley North are continuing contributions towards their share as sponsors in the cost of the land. Membership is 23, subsidy \$520.



Liverpool West building when under construction.


**Liverpool West** (D. Norling). This area has shown the quickest development of our new Churches. Local members are to be congratulated on the tremendous amount of work and sacrifice they make in keeping up with local developments. Sunday School has an enrolment of 260 and most clubs have a waiting list. Our new Church building is to be opened in February, 1968. Membership is 79 and subsidy is \$520.

**Mount Druitt**. A Sunday School has continued to meet in the home of Mr. and Mrs. M. Harrison. Three blocks of land have been acquired in Belmore Avenue for future development. Consideration is now being given as to the best procedure for development. Doonside have continued to assist in staffing of Sunday School.

**North Turramurra** (G. Warne). This work is now firmly established and is beginning to reach out in the local area. Attendances at youth activities are most encouraging. Membership is 84.

**Murwillumbah** (G. Davis). During the year G. Davis completed his ministry. While looking for another minister the Church is being assisted by Barry Cutchie, a student from Kenmore College. Membership 84.

**North Sydney** (N. Flint). This work has given indication of very encouraging developments during the year and most departments have shown improvement. Manse was purchased. Membership 44 and subsidy \$500.



**Orange**. During the year land has been acquired and a manse erected to enable Mr. and Mrs. Hawkins to commence meetings in Orange in February. It will be necessary for Mr. Hawkins to obtain employment in the early stages and the prayerful concern of the Brotherhood for the development of the work is vital.

**Penrith** (J. Sedman and R. Taylor). During the year Mr. and Mrs. Sedman concluded their ministry at Penrith. They are followed by Mr. R. Taylor, a third year Woolwich student. Membership is 86.

## EVANGELISM

As a department, we exist to serve our Churches and members in this very important area of responsibility. Help in this way usually takes four forms:—

- Training.** During the year training in personal evangelism was provided at Crusade '67 Training Camp, Men's Camp and Institutes for Evangelism. 550 were trained through these during 1967. Several of our men have also been trained up as seminar leaders for the Lay Institute for Evangelism. These Institutes have been a rich spiritual experience to those taking part either as leaders or just attending.
- Programmes of Evangelism.** These have been held in our Churches at Turramurra, Belmore and Caringbah. The objective is to commence a programme of outreach within the local Church, train members in the art of personal evangelism and present those associated with the Church with a simple presentation of the Gospel in their own homes with an invitation to receive Christ. Results of these have been most encouraging. It is anticipated that much blessing will result in the Churches in the years to come because of the programme.
- The Billy Graham Crusade 1968**  
As a department we have encouraged our Churches to give their support to this Crusade. There is no doubt that the Churches who involve themselves in preparation for and participation in the Crusade will receive a rich spiritual blessing.  
Our Director has served as a member of the Executive and Chairman of the Visitation Committee.
- Consultation.** We urge the Churches to examine their programme and see if their witness is as virile as it could be. We are always happy to meet with Church Boards to discuss the matter of their evangelistic outreach.

## FINANCE

- We ended the year with an excess of expenditure over income of \$144. This excess has now eliminated the accumulated general funds and unless additional funds become available it will be necessary for us to reduce expenditure to ensure that special purpose funds are not used for general purposes.
- The amount of \$10,000 on fixed deposit was held to meet payments due on buildings in progress.
- Budget for 1968 calls for an expenditure of \$11824.

## GENERAL

**League of 1,000.** This year's call to members of the League was for the Church at Dapto. The amount contributed was \$876. This has been passed on to our Church at Dapto towards the cost of their building.

**Sponsorship.** Sponsors continue to play a major part in the establishing of new Churches. In fact without sponsors no new Church can be established. Each Church should help in the establishing of a "baby" Church in line with the New Testament plan of outreach.

**Isolated Members.** C. Lawrence has acted as Superintendent for isolated members and maintains a comprehensive list from information supplied by Churches.

**Appreciation.** The volume of our work is only possible because of the many members who have assisted during the year. In particular we would like to express our appreciation to those who have given voluntary assistance in the office, during evangelistic missions and evangelistic training sessions. In conclusion we would like to express our thanks to the members of our Churches who by their prayers, gifts and encouragement have made this work possible.

As we review our mission overseas during the past year, we conclude that there is abundant evidence that the Holy Spirit is at work guiding and encouraging and for this we give our grateful thanks unto God.

National workers on all fields serve with our Australian Missionaries, they include Bible women, Preachers, Nurses and Teachers in India, Doctor boys in New Guinea, and Pastors, Nurses and Teachers in the New Hebrides.

**THE FOLLOWING HAVE RESIGNED:** Sister Ruth Roberts, Dr. and Mrs. R. Williams, Mr. and Mrs. R. Chamberlain, Mr. J. Graham, Miss J. Smith, Mr. and Mrs. J. Smith, Sister J. Doye. Many of these workers have resigned after long years of missionary service, but the ministry of all is appreciated, and we pray for God's blessing upon them as they serve the Lord in the homeland.

**LEAVE OF ABSENCE:** Mr. and Mrs. A. Fletcher (New Guinea) and Dr. and Mrs. D. Coulter (New Hebrides), who had leave of absence during 1967, will return to the work early 1968. Dr. B. Pitt from South Australia has served in the New Hebrides during Dr. Coulter's absence. He will return in February 1968. His ministry has been deeply appreciated.

**NEW WORKERS:** Mr. and Mrs. G. Harrison were appointed to New Guinea in February, and for the past twelve months have been assisting the Lutheran Mission in their building programme in Finschhafen. It is expected that they will transfer to our mission work during 1968.

Mr. and Mrs. H. Finger were re-appointed to the New Hebrides in October, after being away from the field for ten years. Our island brethren are delighted that the Fingers have returned.

**VOLUNTARY WORKERS:** Sister Fran Cole from Queensland returned to the New Hebrides in October to serve once again for six months as a voluntary worker. We are indebted to her for this ministry.

**WORK TEAM:** A Work Party from Victoria went to New Guinea in July to construct the Hermann Memorial Hospital at hungribu, and other projects including construction of an airfield at Bunapas.

The team was sponsored by C.E. and C.Y.F. GROUPS in Victoria who paid half costs involved in travel and field expenses. Team members paid the other half. The team was sent to New Guinea for several weeks, but several members remained for a longer period. The building programme in New Guinea was advanced by two years due to the offer of the Work Party.

## ANNUAL MEETING FEDERAL BOARD 1967.

The third Annual Meeting of the Federal Overseas Mission Board was held in Adelaide on 3rd and 4th March. All Interstate and Adelaide members were present.

Summary of major points discussed at Annual Meeting:

- Grants-in-Aid New Guinea Schools:** A report was made on progress being made since last Annual Meeting on the establishment of village orientated schools, which may not attract Grants-in-Aid. Board does not wish the mission to be restricted by the acceptance of Grants-in-Aid.
- National Workers — India, New Hebrides:** It was felt that in our older fields, India and New Hebrides, we must endeavour to appoint as early as possible indigenous personnel to some positions where missionaries now serve.
- Budget:** Present budget \$158.50. It was agreed that this budget should not be altered.

- Support National Workers:** It was resolved that we should adopt as a policy of the New Hebrides, that the mission supports Australian personnel only, and all indigenous staff in hospitals and schools should be fully supported by island churches. This could be done through school fees, hospital fees, offerings by island churches.
- Mission Boxes:** Concern was expressed at cost of freight and customs of mission boxes and it was suggested that senders of boxes pay all freight and customs charges.
- Indian Workers Pension:** The Board is concerned because while the present Preacher Provident Fund in India will be of considerable assistance to younger men, consideration should be given to providing a pension for older workers who will not have full benefit from the present scheme. The matter is being referred to the Indian Conference.
- Function of State Committees:** A profitable time was spent discussing the function of State Committees. It was agreed that the main function of State Committees is to promote missionary interest within the State, and ideas were exchanged on present methods.
- Sepik Evangelical High School:** A report was given on the proposed establishment of the Sepik Evangelical High School which will serve member missions of the Evangelical Alliance in Western New Guinea.
- Medical Outreach:** The value of medico-evangelistic tours were discussed and the value of this work noted. It was agreed that as far as possible our base hospitals should not be enlarged, but greater stress should be made on medical outreach in distant villages and towns.
- Association Missionaries:** Discussion took place concerning the appointment of Associate Missionaries. It was suggested that member of Churches of Christ serving with Missionary Societies that have a link with our work, such as Missionary Aviation Fellowship, Schools in India, e.g. Lushington, Hebron, etc., should if they applied, be appointed as Associate Missionaries.

## MISSIONARY ORIENTATION CAMP

Plans were made for a Missionary Orientation Camp to be held in Adelaide from January 3-10, 1968. The purpose of the camp is to give detailed information concerning conditions under which missionaries serve, and provide an opportunity for the Federal Board to meet young people who feel the challenge of missionary service. It is expected that over thirty will attend the camp in January. Missionaries home on furlough, ex-missionaries and the Secretaries of the Aborigines and Overseas Federal Board will be responsible for the lectures. The course will include practical activities such as bushcraft, motor-maintenance, handling boats, etc.

The following missionaries elect will attend: Mr. and Mrs. R. Whan, New Guinea; Miss J. Simpson, New Guinea; and Dr. and Mrs. P. Shannon, India. The following who will serve as voluntary workers during 1968 will be present: Mr. and Mrs. T. Ellis, New Guinea; Miss E. Smith, New Guinea and Miss M. Burgermeister, New Hebrides. It is expected that the camp will be held annually, and all missionaries elect, or those offering to serve as voluntary workers will be encouraged to attend. The Camp will be open to all who are preparing to serve Christ overseas.

## HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE FIELDS:

### NEW GUINEA:

Extract from Federal Secretary's report on return from New Guinea in August. "This was my fourth visit to New Guinea, and I feel it was the most encouraging. The Missionaries work well together as a team. There was a good spirit throughout the Annual Meetings and I am confident that Aileen Draney will render a valuable service as field leader.

The pattern of the work is beginning to change as each mission station begins to function to serve the whole of the work instead of being limited to work in nearby villages, e.g. establishment of central schools at Bunapas and Chungribu, base Hospital at Bunapas, Vocational school at Tumba, etc.

While village outreach work may be limited in the lower reaches of the river, nevertheless Bunapas is an ideal centre for the base hospital and central school. The move made in 1960 to 'leap-frog' all the villages between Tung and Chungribu was a good one as it gave us a footing in another part of the Ramu area and made it easier for us to later occupy Tumba, and the present outreach work along the Keram River.

I feel that the nature of our mission work changes from Tumba upstream. The people seem to be more responsive than the down river people. Tumba is our latest mission station, and good progress is being made in its establishment. The church at Tumba has a membership of 22 and about 20 are in the present discipleship class. Sunday services and mid-week meetings are well attended.

From Tumba and Chungribu, our evangelistic work is being conducted into the villages along the Keram River which flows into the Sepik. A number of villages in this area have said they want to hear 'God's Talk', and they are not insisting that missionaries come and establish schools etc. They have been willing to send their older school boys to Tumba, where a vocational school has been established for older boys, but with more Bible Training than allowed in the Government curriculum. Boys from 13 villages attend the school.

There seems to be a real desire for the people in this area and along the Keram and villages south of Chungribu in the Schrader Ranges to adopt Christianity. They have been less influenced by the Roman Catholics than the people nearer the mouth of the Ramu. Frank Beale has been showing the people how to establish coconut plantations. This is important as it is a means of contact and is a practical way of combating the cargo cult which is rife in this area.

The possibilities of outreach in the Tumba-Chungribu area is most encouraging, and it appears as though this will be the main area of activity as far as our mission is concerned in New Guinea.

A word of commendation should be said concerning Rex and Elaine Chamberlain who have now resigned. To labour at Pir for so long and see so little by way of spiritual results is most disappointing, but they have served faithfully and well.

Improved travel facilities, new airfields, at Tumba and Bunapas, better amenities and new opportunities of outreach and the development of the church numerically, have been an encouragement to our missionaries, and we look to the future with renewed hope believing that we are serving God in the area of His appointment.

**Church Growth:** The church in New Guinea continues to grow numerically with a membership of approximately one hundred. With new opportunities, we may expect a rapid increase in church growth during the next few years.

### INDIA:

**Entry of Missionaries:** The Government of India has changed its policy concerning the entry of missionaries from Commonwealth countries into India. Applications for visas which were previously approved by the Indian High Commissioner in Canberra, must now be forwarded to New Delhi and they are no longer granted automatically. Missionaries applying to enter India for the first time have been refused a visa. There was considerable delay in granting visas for the Veals and Miss Geyer. All missionaries must now have residential permits, which must be renewed every twelve months. The situation demands that we give immediate attention to the question of giving greater responsibilities to our Indian brethren, and consideration must be given to property in India held in the name of the Overseas Mission Board.

**Famine Relief:** In November we concluded our famine relief programme. Since commencing the Wheat for India appeal in 1966, the sum of \$35,097.18 has been received. Total costs including freight and cartage was \$33,292.46, leaving a balance of \$1804.72. This will be used in relief work amongst needy people in India, or it may be needed to send further food supplies, as reports received during December advised that there had been no rain since planting the grain, and the prospects were worse than two years ago.

Our famine relief programme was extended to assist the people in Bihar where the British Churches of Christ are working. This was one of the worst hit famine areas in India. Mr. K. Skillicorn, a member of our Australian Churches of Christ serving in Bihar, wrote, in appreciation, "Thanks a million, and may God richly bless all concerned in this fine piece of relief that you have given us. During the famine I had personally seen people existing somehow on leaves of trees, grass seeds and roots, and during the real crisis period, folk did not even get these foods. At one stage 32,000 were entirely dependent upon food being sent into the area."

**Poona Penetration Plan.** "Our Churches are co-operating with the Evangelical Fellowship of India in their plan to penetrate Poona with the Gospel of Christ at every significant level of the City's life. Mr. B. C. Bhonsle, the pastor of our Bombay Church, has been released for several months to be the co-ordinator of the whole plan of evangelism. In December, Indian Christians from the Poona area were encouraged to visit every home in this vast city to distribute gospel portions and other Christian literature. Evangelistic rallies were being planned for January 1968. Seminars and lectures will be arranged by the Evangelical Fellowship of India. Experienced Christian leaders, renowned for their ability to communicate the gospel to educated Hindu and Moslems, have accepted the invitation to preach and give lectures.

The period leading up to Easter 1968 will be a time of intensified evangelism among the churches in Poona; this is planned as a climax to the Poona Penetration Plan." Roger Ryall.

**Indian Doctors Appointed:** Two Indian Doctors, Dr. Satralkar and Dr. Gaikwad have been appointed by the Indian Conference to serve at Dhond.

**Dr. Patil retires:** After serving at our mission hospital at Dhond for over 40 years, Dr. S. S. Patil retired from full-time service on April 30. Dr. Patil continues to serve temporarily in part-time work. The Conference of Churches of Christ in Western India has placed on record its grateful appreciation for the years of service Dr. Patil has given, particularly for the gracious way he has served as Hospital Superintendent in times of necessity. The Overseas Mission Board on behalf of Australian Churches of Christ fully endorses the resolution expressed by the Conference.

**Death John Bairagi:** Our Indian churches were saddened by the death of Mr. John Bairagi in January. Mr. Bairagi joined the mission in 1943 and faithfully served His Lord through the years. His name will always stand high in the history of Australian Churches of Christ Overseas Mission work. The Committee of Management in India has suggested that a hall be erected at the Friendship Centre at Baramati as a memorial to Mr. Bairagi.

**Bori High School:** The Indian Conference has received permission to establish a High School at Bori. There are a number of factors still to be considered, but the establishment will increase the influence of the mission in this area.

**General Evangelistic Outreach:** Through the production and distribution of Christian Literature, Bible Correspondence Courses, Radio Broadcasting, we have the opportunity to spread the gospel throughout India and S.E. Asia. In our own mission area the gospel is proclaimed through open air preaching at bazaars and Hindu Festivals, Medico-evangelistic work in the villages, and distribution of literature. Bible Women continue their ministry by visiting people in their homes and by personal evangelism in the hospital. Friendship Centres, Schools and Children's Homes are all centres of evangelism.

#### NEW HEBRIDES:

**First Graduation Banmatmat Bible College:** On December 1, ten students graduated at the Banmatmat Bible College. They are the first students to graduate and we praise God for this achievement. The Graduation Day, understandably, began long before 1st December. Technically it originated with every move that led to the College's establishment and commencement of lectures with the first intake of students three years ago.

Approximately 800 people from Aoba, Maewo and Pentecost encamped at Banmatmat for several days as special meetings were held prior to the actual graduation. Included amongst the visitors were Mr. F. Stephenson, Federal Conference President, Mr. and Mrs. H. Long, Miss R. Oliver from Epping, N.S.W. and Mr. R. S. A. McLean, Secretary Overseas Mission Board.

The graduating students have been appointed to villages on Aoba, Maewo and Pentecost, and the work conducted by our island brethren near Santo. Consideration is being given to one of the graduates and his wife being sent to New Guinea.

We praise God for the establishment of the Bible College in a most delightful setting and commend Mr. and Mrs. D. Eagling for the work accomplished.

**Translating the Scriptures:** In the past several attempts have been made to translate the Scripture into the various languages spoken by the people on Aoba, Maewo and Pentecost. The Federal Board has as its policy the encouragement of Nationals to accept this responsibility and translate the Scripture into their own tongue. With the rise in educational standards of the people, this seemed to be the most realistic approach when there are at least five languages that must be translated. Mr. K. Ludgater who has translated portion of the New Testament into the Ndui Ndui language has been guiding two native brethren in translating the scriptures, one comes from Maewo and the other from the Ndui Ndui area. It is expected that during 1968 several others from various language areas will live at Londua and under Mr. Ludgater's guidance, translate the scriptures into their own tongue. To enable Mr. Ludgater to devote time to this important work, Miss M. Burgermeister is being sent to the New Hebrides to assist at the Londua school.

**Development of Schools:** Our mission schools in the New Hebrides continue to develop and a high standard is being maintained. The British Government has commended the development of the Technical School on Maewo under the supervision of Mr. R. Combridge. In November a new classroom valued at \$4000 was opened at the Technical School by the British Government's Senior Educational Officer. We are grateful to the Campbell Edwards Trust, Victoria, for donating half the cost of this fine building. A new classroom was erected at the Ndui Ndui Primary School and new dormitories at Londua. A new boys' dormitory is planned for Ranwadi school in 1968, and the W.A. young people have given \$1100 for this project.

Graduates from the British Government Teacher's College in Vila, are now teaching in village schools and the standards of these schools is being raised considerably. Our mission schools and the standards of these schools is being to instruct young people in the way of the Lord. Students at Ranwadi and Londua Schools are being prepared for baptism. At a mission conducted at expressed their desire to accept Christ for the first time, or re-consecrate their lives to Him.

**Evangelistic Outreach:** New opportunities for evangelism are being brought to our attention in the New Hebrides. In August a church was opened in a new area about fifteen miles from the town of Lugainville on Santo. Five people were baptised and this has given our island brethren an opportunity to reach people that until now have resisted the gospel. There are a number of villages in this area that remain heathen and the establishment of this new work may be the opening of a door to the many people that live in the hinterland of Santo. Villages on Malekeula have invited our island christians to send pastors to them. Until now this outreach work has been conducted mainly by the Aoban churches, but now that eleven churches have been established in the Santo area, they are calling upon the churches on Pentecost and Maewo to assist in this work. On the Eastern coast of Pentecost there are several heathen villages. The five hour trek from Banmatmat to our Christian village at Ranwash is accomplished frequently by our missionaries and students at Banmatmat. Only half an hours walk from Ranwash is the heathen village of Banlap. The state of these people is in direct contrast to the christians at Ranwash. It is reported that the people in this village want to become Christians but will not do so without the consent of the chief who is opposed to the gospel. We request the Australian churches to pray for these people in their need.

**Medical Work:** The hospitals at Nassawa on Maewo, Ranmawat on Pentecost, and Ndui Ndui on Aoba continue to render a valuable ministry. New hospital buildings are planned for Nassawa during 1968, and there will be improvements and renovations at Ranmawat. Medical patrols in the villages provides a valuable contact with the people.

#### GENERAL

On all fields the important task of caring for the physical needs of people is being maintained. In India over 300 children are cared for in our Children's Homes. Our mission hospitals bring healing to the sick often in areas where no other medical facilities are available. Assistance is given to those in dire physical need. This ministry is performed in the name of Christ and at all times we are mindful of the fact that we are crusading for Christ in the many activities that we are called upon to perform in His mission overseas, and our constant prayer is that at all times His Name will be glorified and His Kingdom increased as men and women accept Him as their Lord and Saviour. Our future plans include the maintenance of the present work which God has entrusted to us with all its opportunity, and to follow as the Holy Spirit leads.

#### STATE ACTIVITIES

The Committee has been glad to see that many of the Churches of the Brotherhood have been active throughout the year in special missionary work, rallies, support of missionaries, receiving deputations and in many other ways have provided that support in prayer, time, energy, and money which the missionaries need.

The sending of food, money for famine relief, and Christmas gifts has been a feature.

The N.S.W. Brotherhood was requested by the Federal Board to accept \$28,500 as a target for the year. It will be noted that the N.S.W. Churches gave \$25,000 for this purpose.

C. G. Taylor represented the Federal Board as far as possible at the meetings of the A.C.C. Division of Mission.

To all those who have helped with the work of the Committee, thanks are expressed.


