6. The correct way to bring any matter before Conference is to move a motion. When seconded the matter is open for discussion.

7. Remember that in discussion we are trying to discover the will of God. Don't let prejudice blind you to the leading of God's Spirit, which may come through another speaker. Always keep an open mind.

# CONFERENCE EXECUTIVE REPORT

This year has been again, one of blessing, but a year that has been filled with many problems. We extend sincere sympathies to those who have lost loved ones many problems. The full Executive has met each alternate month, with the Secretariat meeting in the month between. Most representatives have been regular in their attendance and during the year we changed the location of the meeting from Sydney Temple to Burwood. Our thanks to the Burwood officers for the use of their property.

STATISTICAL: The Statistical report printed at the rear of this Report Book reveals that during the year our total membership increased by 81 to 7,203 members and our active membership increased by 105 to 5,582. There were 446 additions by faith and baptism. Prayerful thought needs to be given to the small number of additions by faith and baptism in many of our churches and the fact that three churches alone wrote off 192 members during the year.

CONFERENCE PRESIDENT: Brother David Mansell, has led the work as President, and been spokesman and representative of the Churches at many meetings and functions. For approximately half the Conference year the President also served as Secretary. Thanks to Mrs. R. Hutton of the Wollongong Church for her valuable service as minute Secretary.

CHRISTIAN MESSENGER: This magazine continues to serve as a monthly contact within our Churches. Our appreciation is expressed to Mr. C. Bowser for his capable leadership as Editor. Our thanks also to the Board of Management.

FINANCE: 1. Conference Committee Funds. In the conference executive report last year a target increase in giving of 10% was presented to the Brotherhood. Whilst at the time of writing an analysis of direct giving to the committees is not available, it is pleasant to report that amounts for distribution coming through conference executive measured up to the challenge presented. 2. P.E. Thomas Scholarship Fund. The executive master up to the charactery product and by the brotherhood to this Fund. The Fund will be administered by the Bible College providing a permanent reminder of the work of P. E. Thomas for his work in this State.

C.A.P.: Fred Atkins is chairman of this active subcommittee for the improvement of the Church's visual image. Throughout the year the demand for quality work increased. C.A.P.'s careful management and the economical standard of prod-uction has been maintained. Among the year's publications was the new book by Dr. James H. Jauncey – "Simply Churches of Christ" – which the Christian Unity Committee promoted as their project for the year. RESIGNATION OF SECRETARY: During the year Mr. David Schofield found it necessary to resign his Office as Conference Secretary. This work was taken over by the President, and we sincerely apologise for any oversite or lack of communication, through pressure of the dual offices. Our thanks to Mr. Schofield for the service he gave and his willing co-operation.

SPECIAL CONFERENCES: During the year, special conferences were held at Rockdale on 15th August and 28th September. The Conference at Rockdale was called in response to the last annual Conference to discuss the matters of City Temple Engrand Lake Illegence and a laboration of the conference. Temple, Enmore, Lake Illawarra and Lake Macquarie properties. At this Conference, Executive was instructed to enquire into the purchase of Stanwell Tops property and a Special Conference was called at Enmore, when it was decided to proceed with the Stanwell Tops property.

We do not want to increase the price and so we are very dependent on the support of members throughout the Commonwealth.

We have been most appreciative recipients of an amount of \$3,652 that was contributed by members of the World Convention. We plan to use this as the nucleus of a reserve to stabilize our financial position in the years to come. It would be a calamity if this amount were quickly eaten up by trading losses.

Again we ask members who do not contribute to the Australian Christian to help support us by subscribing to the paper - for it is only with your support that we can hope to produce the paper without further financial loss.

#### FEDERAL CONFERENCE EXECUTIVE REPORT

The 33rd Federal Conference has been described as a "Convention Curtain Raiser" since it was shortened to give emphasis to the 8th World Convention in Adelaide, 1970. It was, however, as well supported as any other Federal Conference and significant. President S. R. Beck and Adelaide Secretary, R. S. A. McLean gave good leadership and served efficiently in conducting Conference and in all necessary details.

Increasing proportions of Federal Conference times are given to departmental and even inter-departmental consultations. Departmental officers are finding stimulation and strength in this kind of conferring. Sectional activities of the Brotherhood are made more effective together with the enrichment of plenary sessions, which keep the perspective of the whole Church.

NATIONAL MINISTERS' SEMINAR: The last two Federal Conferences have brought into residence our Australian ministers for brief seminars. These have been of such a high standard and so stimulating that they will be planned for the future. The ministers present at Adelaide have asked the Ministerial Sub-Committee of the Federal Executive to continue to plan for future seminars.

PERTH 1972 - CANBERRA 1974: Locations are now determined four years in advance. The 34th Federal Conference Committee is already meeting in Perth. While in Adelaide the President A. H. Walkington and Secretary A. D. Pyne met with the Federal Executive. These conference cities could prove expensive in travel or accommodation for most of our people around Australia, but both cities have strong appeal. To start planning and saving will result in rich rewards for those who

FEDERAL HOME EVANGELISM: The Federal Conference Executive meetings have a varied agenda with its endeavouring with sensitivity and insight to represent the Australian Brotherhood to the States, Federal departments, national and overseas bodies. However, with the various matters that arise, one continuing responsibility remains. It is the raising of funds and administering them in the interests of Federal Home Financial States and administering them in the interests of Federal Home Evangelism.

For several years our income and expenditure have been fairly constant and commitments have been met without anxiety. We are pleased that churches have given, allowing us to be their agent in supporting the work of Albany, Broken Hill, Canberra and Townsville. The aim set by Conference is 20 cents per active member from each church. We seek no increase on this aim; simply a continuing faithful application of it in response to our annual appeal letters.

# FEDERAL BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION REPORT

1970 was one of the most exciting and interesting years in the history of the Board. The year saw the introduction of the new curriculum venture, described by leading American Christian Educationist, Randolph Crump Miller, as "the most exciting Christian Education development in the world today." The year saw the commencement of only the second permanent directorship in the history of the Board. It saw the launching of a number of new ventures.

CHRISTIAN LIFE CURRICULUM: After years of research and planning, the Christian Life Curriculum became a reality. Two hundred and thirty schools in Australia and New Zealand now use teaching materials which are better planned, more exciting in appearance, and with a more comprehensive and helpful content than Australian churches have ever known. Because of fears and doubts, and because of competing materials, a significant number of churches have not yet used our new Federal Brotherhood materials. A few schools which have used the material have expressed confusion, thus underlining the urgent need for continual training and retraining of our teachers so that they can adequately use the materials to bring their scholars closer to Jesus Christ. Most teachers have been thrilled and enthused, and have received a new zest for their work. There are, of course, teething difficulties. The material is not perfect. But through the continued oversight of our Director/ Editor our churches are helping to produce some very fine tools for use in the

Christian education programme in our schools. NATIONAL YOUTH CONVENTION: The Fifth National Youth Convention of our churches was held in Melbourne in January 1971. Two hundred young people from every State and New Zealand came together for a week of inspiration, fellowship, Bible study, Christian growth experience and fun. This is the only occasion when our young people can come together in this way, and it continues to be an extremely valuable function.

NATIONAL WORK CAMP: The Board is now arranging the first ever National work party. In July/August 1972 a number of young people will give up two months of their time to journey to Carnarvon, Western Australia, and build flats for elderly aboriginal people, some of whom at the moment are living in the backs of trucks. Youth groups all over Australia will raise money for fares and for the project itself. The project will enable some significant work to be done. It will provide a service outlet for young people, and another opportunity for Australia-wide fellowship. Applications are now being called.

WORLD COUNCIL OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION: The Director-Editor was selected as one of seven delegates to attend the World Council of Christian Education Assembly in Peru in July 1971. He will take the opportunity while overseas to study significant Christian education trends in America, Europe and Asia. Finance is being raised largely independent of the Board's funds.

ADULT CHRISTIAN EDUCATION: An Australia-wide survey has been conducted to discover what is the present state in our churches of the long neglected area of Adult Christian education. The survey shows that Adult Christian education is growing at a remarkable rate, one of the reasons obviously being the availability of a splendid set of study materials as part of the Christian Life Curriculum. The survey also shows a wide variety and great flexibility in approach. Adult Christian education programmes have no set pattern, but differ according to the locality and church. The Board is planning a major thrust in this area.

RESOURCES: 1970 has seen a new discipleship kit for 10-12 year olds, "Jesus, Your Lord and Friend", written by E. C. Keating. 1970 has also seen the first appearance of "Go!", a quarterly planning journal for church leaders, covering pro-gramming for the whole area of the Church's life. The Board will also produce two major resource kits a year, the first to be in the area of family life programming.

FINANCE: The future finance of the Board still gives cause for concern. It is hoped that churches will see fit to make room on their budgets for this important, if behind-the-scenes, work.

SOUTH SWANSEA YOUTH CENTRE: By resolution of Special Conference this property is now administered and will be developed by a committee of the Newcastle churches.

STANWELL TOPS CHRISTIAN CONFERENCE CENTRE: Following a favourable feasibility study, this property became the Youth Centre on 3rd December 1970. The purchase necessitated the selling of Camp Greenhalgh and this was agreed to by a Special Conference. A committee of management has been appointed by the Department in co-operation with Conference Executive. All enquiries for bookings are being handled by the Department.

BOOKROOM: Continues to be used for distinctive literature and teaching aids. The Burwood branch is filling a need in that area.

FUTURE: Full time director, Ron Kallmier, to commence early 1972. Youthquake moves to Lidcombe Hospital auditorium.

FINANCIAL: With the sale of Camp Greenhalgh and the different approach to a camp site, this Department has no revenue from camping, hence our need for finance will be more acute. Much of the equipment has been written off to Stanwell Tops, and gifts of equipment have been made to various bodies within the Brotherhood. The financial situation with South Swansea is still not clear, pending certain approaches to Lake Macquarie Shire Council. A clearer picture may emerge by the time of Conference.

# DEPARTMENT OF HOME MISSIONS AND EVANGELISM REPORT

As we look back over the past year we can see the fulfilment of Paul's words from Ephesians 3:20,21 (L.N.T.) "Now glory be to God who by His mighty power at work within us is able to do far more than we would ever dare to ask or even dream of — infinitely beyond our highest prayers, desires, thoughts, or hopes. May He be given glory forever and ever through endless ages because of His master plan of salvation for the church through Jesus Christ." PERSONNEL: The Committee consists of A. K. Wilson (Chairman), M. C. Mc-Arthur, R. Jones, D. Mansell, C. Nutt, J. Ricketts, G. Steele, C. Tandy. The Committee has been assisted by the following: Mrs. A. K. Wilson, representative among the Christian Women's Fellowship, K. Baker, Honorary Architect, K. Crawford, Director.

#### THE FIELDS:

Belrose: (D. Norling). During the year the Committee agreed to subsidise Belrose to enable them to obtain the services of a full-time minister. Mr. D. Norling commenced his ministry at Belrose in February 1971. Subsidy - \$1,560.

Campbelltown: (P. Letherby, J. Hiron). Church has grown from 51 to 62. Sunday School to 76. Our aim is to continue developments so the full-time ministry can be established at end of 1972.

Dapto: (J. Bacik). Membership at Dapto increased to 61 and Sunday School to 113. During the year subsidies from Wollongong, Warrawong and Home Mission were reduced from \$2,300 to \$1,860 per annum. Church programme featured visitation to contacts and people moving into the area. Subsidy - \$260.

Engadine: (G. Warne). During the year membership rose from 33 to 43 and Sunday School attendance from 72 to 105. Subsidies being underwritten by Caringbah, Bexley North, Belmore and Hurstville were reduced by one fifth during the period. Visitation programme developed by G. Warne has since been adopted in several other Churches in N.S.W. and Australia.

Liverpool West: (D. Norling). At the end of the year D. Norling completed nine years service as minister at Liverpool West. During this time the membership had grown from 30 to 113, average communicants from 22 to 48. Highlight of the year was Mission conducted by Reggie Thomas team. Property is to be effected in the future by road widening and negotiations are taking place with the State Planning Authority to ensure that the development of the Church is not hindered by the proposals. O. Clarke from South Australia has accepted invitation to commence a ministry in 1971. Subsidy - \$520. Guildford: (C. Crago). C. Crago commenced his ministry at Loftus Park in Feb-

Guildford: (C. Crago). C. Crago commenced his ministry at Loftus Park in February 1970. Church membership has grown from 67 to 83 and Sunday School attendance from 119 to 152. Subsidy - \$881.

Mount Druitt: (R. Smith). The Church at Mount Druitt continues to grow despite difficulties being experienced in obtaining final permission to develop the site. During the year membership grew from 14 to 33. R. Smith commenced ministry supported by Chatswood, Epping, Lane Cove, North Turramurra, Greenacre and Taree. A Manse was rented from Housing Commission pending development of our own site.

Nelson Bay: This very keen group of Christians continues to meet at Halifax Caravan Park under the leadership of S. Reeson. Special training was given during the year in Personal Evangelism.

North Haven/Port Macquarie: Meetings are now held at both North Haven and Port Macquarie under the leadership of R. Greenhalgh. Taree is assisting in development of both groups.

North Sydney: (N. Flint). We were delighted in the early part of 1970 to receive a letter from North Sydney indicating that because of developments they no longer needed our subsidy. It was a real joy to receive this letter from a Church which a few years earlier had considered closing down completely. Subsidy - \$78.

*Nowra*: (R. Bennett). Several important developments have taken place at Nowra during the year. These include the provision of a ministry by Mr. R. Bennett, supported from America, purchase of a Manse and transfer of meetings from C.W.A. Hall to Red Cross Hall. Largest attendance has been 55. The work continues under the oversight of Wollongong who are giving financial support to make this development possible.

Orange: (R. Hawkins). Membership has grown from 22 to 28 and meetings have been transferred from the Manse to the Dutch Reform Church. This move has enabled additional services to be planned which should help in the development of the Church. Subsidy - \$520.

Penrith: (G. Towle). During the year membership grew from 68 to 76 and most of the activities of the Church developed well. Special contributions from Campbell Edwards Trust of \$10.00 per week for the first year enabled the Church to develop. Miss J. Gordon has served as Deaconess and made a valuable contribution in the area of youth work and visitation. Subsidy - \$531. Seven Hills: (B. Reid). B. Reid commenced his ministry at the beginning of the

During the year Church membership grew from 30 to 47 and at the end of 1970, the number of days worked were cut back to 2. This is what we call a "Tent Making Ministry" which is making possible the development of the work.

Training: Training programmes have been conducted at Dapto, Nelson Bay, Padstow and Loftus Park.

College: As part of our contribution to Evangelism the Director has been released to take lectures in Evangelism 1 and 2 at our Woolwich College.

to take lectures in Evangelism 1 and 2 at our wootwhen Director visited each Country Visit to Country Churches: During the year the Director visited each Country Church to discuss "Prayerful Planning for Progress" and suggestions for evangelistic outreach arising from his visit to America in 1969.

Other activities: During the year the Director also attended the Newcastle Men's Camp, N.S.W. Minister's Fraternal, Home Missions Director's Conference, Federal Conference, World Convention, L.I.F.E. Training Conference and represented our Churches on the United Churches Evangelistic Crusades Committee.

FUTURE PLANS:

New Churches: The whole area of New South Wales is constantly under review with a view to establishing new Churches as required in strategic areas. To a large extent these are established where there will be a large influx of population or where we have several isolated families that can become the nucleus of a new Church.

Evangelism: 1. We will continue to concentrate attention on the area of personal Evangelism: 1. We will continue to concentrate attention on the area of personal witness as we believe the greatest impact on the Brotherhood and the State of New South Wales can be made by training our total membership in the "how to" of sharing the claims of Christ and helping others to do the same. 2. We are negotiating with one of the recognised evangelists within the Brother-

hood to conduct a series of Crusades throughout the State in 1972. 3. We will continue to use American Evangelists as they become available for

special Crusades.

FINANCE: 1. The year ended with an excess of income over expenditure of \$38 compared with \$1,850 for 1969.

2. Offerings received from Churches amounted to \$7,812 as compared with \$7,088 for 1969.

3. Subsidies for 1971 have been increased to \$5,100 to assist the Churches at Belrose and Tweed Heads.

Special Effort: We would like to express our appreciation to the ladies for their contribution of \$1,285,00 towards the fumiching of the manse at Mount

for their contribution of \$1,285.00 towards the furnishings of the manse at Mount Druitt.

#### **GENERAL:**

Sponsorship: Sponsors still continue to play a major part in the establishing of new Churches. In fact without sponsors no new Churches can be established. Each Church should help in the establishing of a new Church in line with the New Testament plan of outreach.

Isolated Members: C. Lawrence has continued to act as Superintendent for Isolated Members and maintains a comprehensive list from information supplied by Churches. The Messenger is forwarded to those Isolated Members interested in receiving news of the Brotherhood.

Appreciation: We would like to express our appreciation to all who have helped during the year with prayer and by the giving of their time and finance. We are greatly encouraged by the number of Churches we are now able to help. As God enables we look forward to seeing many more won, built and sent for Christ in 1971.

# PREACHERS' PROVIDENT FUND REPORT

Pursuant on the 33rd Federal Conference held in Adelaide during October 1970, the Board of the Preachers' Provident Fund is now as follows:- R. Souness (Chairman), N. H. Morris (Treasurer), A. Laney (Secretary), W. K. Hunter, H. E. Bell, P. H. Morton, M. Titterton and D. Smallbone.

Recognition of the long and faithful service to the Fund and to the brotherhood by both Harold Bell and Ken Hunter who have relinquished the positions of Treasurer and Chairman respectively, must be made. Both of the brethren have given many years of faithful and diligent work as officers of the fund. Even now they are continuing to serve on the Board which will still benefit from their vast experience.

LITERATURE: During the past year a new brochure giving up to date informat-ion on the Preachers' Provident Fund and an amended Constitution & Regulations book have been printed. These are available on request from the secretary.

INVESTMENT MANAGEMENT: With the retirement of Bro. Harold Bell from the position of Treasurer and because the investment portfolio of the Fund is approaching \$500,000 it was considered expedient that a professional investment service be sought and arrangements have been made with the Bank of N.S.W. to provide this service. This move is expected to result in improved earning rates and increased capital gains over a period of 4 or 5 years.

MEMBERSHIP: Total membership is 366 with a total death cover of \$1,109,000. These figures include a large number of Bible College students who are married and the Fund provides the death cover for them free of charge. Practically all new enrollments came from our Bible Colleges.

INTEREST RATES: In keeping with the rise in interest rates generally, the rate of interest credited to ministers holdings in the fund has been advanced by 1%.

WORD OF WARNING: Ministers are warned that they must retire before withdrawing Superannuation & Long Service Leave benefits otherwise they may be liable for Income Tax on the whole of the amount withdrawn plus other taxable income for the year in which the withdrawal is made. If the money is drawn in one lump sum at the time of retirement, only 5% of the amount is taxable. This appears to be the position at the moment but the board has the matter under consideration to see if any relief or variation can be negotiated but in the meantime any minister considering withdrawing his credits should thoroughly investigate the Income Tax position as it may affect him.

We trust that these reports were of some assistance to those for whom they were prepared, and look forward optimistically to a further year of service to the Brotherhood.

The number of meetings held were ten with an average attendance of seven. Appreciation of the late John W. Boswell — See note under Property Trust Report, which is wholly approved by this Committee.

LOANS: Outstanding loans to Churches at the end of the year totalled \$19,800.59. An amount of \$32,332.09 is invested with the Deposits Fund.

FUNCTIONS: The Chapel Extension Committee still functions primarily amongst the Churches in providing bridging finance; subsidising interest rates on loans incurred, particularly Home Mission Churches; provides a guarantee for depositors with the Deposits Fund and consequently merits the support of the Brotherhood both by individual gifts and contributions from the Churches as well as being an income-receiving Committee through the Finance Advisory Committee.

During the year we have again been requested to subsidise interest rates on a Deposits Fund loan to enable the Home Mission Department to develop a work at Mt. Druitt. The Chapel Extension Committee has been requested by the Social Service Department to assist with the provision of temporary finance for an Aged Persons' Homes development at Forestville, thus safe-guarding our interest there.

It has also suffered a decrease in income from the Churches. In 1969 we received through F.A.C. \$1,079 as against \$267 in 1970; through Duplex Envelopes \$152 in 1969 and \$105 in 1970; through Insurance Commission \$839.74 in 1969 and \$610.95 in 1970 — with the following decline in surplus funds from \$1,434 in 1969 to \$217 in 1970. How long can Chapel Extension continue to function in the capacity for which it was set up?

Though his unexpected death occurred after the close of the year under review, it is fitting that we should pay tribute to him in this report. In reviewing our accounts, he gave unsparingly of his time and professional ability over many years and we are aware of the fact that it will be extremely difficult to replace him and his dedication in serving the Brotherhood. We express to Mrs. Boswell and Graham our Christian sympathy.

There were ten regular meetings held for the year with an average attendance of seven. In addition to this, a very special meeting was called in November for the purpose of considering matters and arranging finance for the Camp Stanwell Tops.

FUNCTIONS AND ACTIVITIES: The general recognition that the appointment of the Trust as Trustees, having decided advantages over local or independent Trustees, is borne out by the following enumeration of some of the activities during the

year: The Trust is Trustee for sixty-eight Churches in New South Wales, two of which are affiliated with other State Conferences, and five Committees of Conference, and Conference Executive.

It has attended to such matters as the purchase, sale and transfer of properties with attention to necessary legal documents; arrangements of mortgage, loans. leases; attention to matters affecting rates, rentals, estates, Council By-Laws and such detail. In this regard, twenty Churches, five Committees and Conference Executive have been assisted.

We have helped the Department of Christian Education in negotiating matters We have helped the Department of Christian Education in legislating matters relating to Camp sites at Lake Macquarie, Lake Illawarra and, together with Confer-ence Executive, in the purchase of Camp Stanwell Tops; the Department of Home Missions with the purchase of building allotments, manses and construction of church buildings around the Sydney suburbs and as far away as Tweed Heads; the Department of Social Service in the acquisition of land at Pendle Hill, application for Commonwealth subsidies, development at Forestville; matters relating to the Estate of the late L. M. Dickson affecting four of our Committees has also received attention.

The Preachers' Provident Fund has arranged for the Trust to act as Custodian Trustee on Real Estate Mortgages and such matters not held by their appointed Trust Company.

Negotiations with the State Planning Authority and the Liverpool Council on the proposed widening of Hoxton Park Road and its effect upon the property at West Liverpool, have been protracted and are still proceeding.

We have finalised matters relative to compensation from the Department of Main Roads with regard to the Lawson property.

Enquiries have been made as to how the proposed Eastern Suburbs Railway may

affect any of our Church properties and these are still proceeding. At the request of Mrs. Robertson we negotiated the transfer of \$4,500 to Brotherhood Committees for charitable purposes from her gift of \$40,000 to the Brotherhood Centre Fund.

Amendments to the Incorporation Act have been under review and considerations are still proceeding.

The volume of matters requiring administration appears to increase from year to year. For such services and the many routine details the Churches at present pay an annual fee of \$4.00. It was most gratifying when one Church assisted, enquired what the fees for the services would be. This also is a matter for review by the Trust. Surely a larger fee for the protection and service rendered is not too much to ask. After all, a group of capable men give their time and abilities freely and willingly to attend to work which is unobtrusive and yet vital to the Brotherhood.

DEPOSITS FUND: Investments now total \$58,523.72 as follows:-

\$45,178.81 on call including Chapel Extension and Property Trust General Fund, and \$13,344.91 long term investments. Monies on loan total \$42,237.65 of which \$31,975.15 is on long term loan of ten years or more, and \$10,262.50 on call. In addition, \$8,000 is invested with the N.S.W. Permanent Building Society.

At the close of the year we had applications from four Churches and one Committee for loans which would total approximately \$33,000. Other enquiries also have been received.

Interest rates for both borrowing and lending have been revised and are as follows: Borrowing:

On call	- 4¼ p.a.
1 to 5 years	- 4¾ p.a.
5 years	- 5¼ p.a.
10 years	- 5¾ p.a.
5¾ p.a.	- an increase of 1/2%.

Lending:

It may be that a better return can be obtained in other investments, but investment with the Deposits Fund is safe and it is helping the Brotherhood. The Loan Agreement issued to Churches is at present subject to revision.

INSURANCE: Commission received from the Queensland Insurance Company for insurance of Church properties amounted to \$1,106.82.

Churches have been responding well to the Schedule issued in the review of coverage on their properties, thus ensuring that adequate protection is made. We ask Churches again to insure through the Queensland Insurance Company because we are dependent in a very real way on the commission received for the work of the Trust.

THANKS: We extend our thanks to our Heavenly Father, co-operating Churches, individuals such as our Solicitor, Treasurer, Minute Secretary and all who in any way have enabled the work of the Trust to proceed.

#### CHRISTIAN UNITY COMMITTEE REPORT

PERSONNEL: Dr. A. G. Elliott (Chairman), A. Rae (Vice-chairman), R. Dixon, A. Leane, J. McLennan, D. Nutt and C. Bowser (Secretary/Treasurer). 53,165 The committee has been engaged in a variety of activities over the past year.

The committee has been engaged in a variety of activities over the past year. There has been a number of consultations in recent years between the Unity Committees of the various states and this policy was continued this year. A consultation was held in Adelaide in conjunction with Federal Conference. Reports were given by various overseas visitors on Union moves in their particular countries. The state committee was represented. During the year a "Teach-in" was conducted by the committee at the College

During the year a "Teach-in" was conducted by the committee at the College at Woolwich. This was under the approval of the D.C.E. and was aimed at acquainting young people with the background of Churches of Christ and making them aware of the issues involved in Christian Unity negotiations. These lectures were delivered by Dr. Elliott, B. Armstrong and C. Bowser. It proved a worthwhile venture and future ones will be considered.

Some years ago when discussions were taking place with our Baptist Brethren, the idea was expressed that fellowship should be encouraged at the local level. With the desire to foster better understanding and appreciation all churches were contacted and asked to arrange an exchange of pulpits with a local Baptist Church. A number of churches indicated that they had co-operated in this suggestion. An endeavour will be made to encourage a further exchange this year.

A number of publications has been produced by the committee in recent years. These have been met with excellent response. This year it was decided to recommend Dr. Jauncey's book "Simply Churches of Christ" instead of producing another publication, since this was excellent educational material. Indications are that the book has been well received and has had a very wide circulation. We would commend it again to any who have not as yet seen and read it.

At a recent conference a request was made to investigate audio-visual material. During the year this has been done and some material has been viewed and discussed. At present the situation is still under review.

The committee feels that a wide range of contact should be encouraged with other organisations which are seeking to find a pattern for church life in the New Testament. As a result of investigations and preliminary discussions it is hoped to hold some meetings in the near future to exchange views on the present situation in church union moves. It is hoped to report more fully on this at a future date.

church union moves. It is hoped to report more fully on this at a future date. It has been the established policy of this committee to resist any moves to bring about church union on anything but a Scriptural basis. It will be our policy in the future to commend the restoration of the simple New Testament faith as the only acceptable basis for Christian Unity.

# ABORIGINES COMMITTEE REPORT

This has been a remarkable year and one for which we will ever thank our Heavenly Father for literally the windows of Heaven have opened and He has poured out His blessing upon the Aborigines work. The sincere efforts of a wonderful working Committee headed by an enthusiastic chairman have been rewarded by ful working Committee headed by an enthusiastic chairman have been rewarded by His hands. Those who served you on this Committee last year were: H. Roose (Chairman), E. Park (Vice-Chairman), G. E. Knight (Treasurer), Mrs. L. Bills, Miss E. Stow, Mrs. M. Taylor, L. Bills, Mrs. H. Roose, E. E. Oswald, H. G. Wakerley and C. T. Garrett (Secretary). Mrs. E. Park continued as our Publicity Officer filling this office with distinction. As Secretary may I be permitted to make this observation, I have served over 50 odd years with many Committees in the Brotherhood and outside tee huit this expended all others for they have been most sincere have outside too but this one exceeds all others for they have been most sincere, hardworking and faithful throughout their term of office. We quote from the Federal Board's Report. "There is much to thank our Heavenly Father for, we note the completion of the Carnaryon Manse; the commencement of the first full-time minister with the Carnarvon Church (supported by the Church); the replacement of the Landrover used for outreach and a number of other projects completed by the churches which are among the highlights of the year. A cyclone at Carnarvon caused only slight structural damage (covered by insurance), a fire at Norseman destroyed the engine room workshop and a great deal of essential equipment but the wonderful response from the Brotherhood without any appeal being made of some \$3,000, plus a Commonwealth Government gift of \$8,000, and \$4,000 from insurance enabled adequate (and improved) replacement to be made. The substantial reduction of the overdraft (to which the N.S.W. "Walkabout" contributed a very valuable \$2,600), reveals the hand of God upon our work."

THE FIELDS:

1. Carnarvon: The Mission has been staffed by the following, Mr. & Mrs. L. M. Fisher (Superintendent), Mr. & Mrs. R. A. Jones, Mr. & Mrs. R. J. Barlow, Mr. & Mrs. A. Bonney, Mr. & Mrs. D. R. Fatchen, Mr. & Mrs. R. C. Field, Mr. & Mrs. I. A. Foot, Mr. & Mrs. A. E. King, Mr. & Mrs. S. R. Ogilvie, Mr. & Mrs. R. G. Schmitt, Misses J. Chiswell, C. Dahl, N. Fraser, O.Laird, E. T. Lincoln. During the year the following resigned: Mr. & Mrs. R. A. Webb, Mr. & Mrs. G. E. Wise, Mr. & Mrs. R. Chitty, and Miss A. Bakewell. Several others have given very valuable voluntary or temporary assistance.

The Children's Homes, Teens Cottages, Hostel Annex etc.: These have continued to provide a splendid ministry amongst children and young people, having over 100 children in residence. Adjacent to the Mission temporary accommodation has been provided to house pensioners and other families. Something of a more permanent nature is expected to be erected in the near future.

The Christian Centre continues its valuable ministry with the Mission, (Mr. & Mrs. R. C. Field) maintaining its day-to-day activities and providing help to Aboriginal people and others in need. The integrated Church through its first full-time minister (Mr. R. J. Anderson) conducts a preaching and teaching ministry in co-operation with the Mission and Mr. & Mrs. L. M. Fisher maintain oversight of the total work, together with the care of the Hostel. The Mission and Church combine in an active interest in the Outreach Work which extends to the great north west area and inland from Carnarvon. The Landrover has been replaced with a panel van giving more comfort to those engaged in this work and enabling more visits to be paid to Onslow and other towns and gives our esteemed brother, Mr. Bob Williams opportunity to continue his important ministry. We appreciate the valuable help given by the Bible Society, Aerial Missions and others in providing 'plane facilities.

2. Norseman: The mission staff here consists of Mr. & Mrs. D. P. Butler (Superintendent), Mr. & Mrs. L. P. Beach, Mr. & Mrs. J. J. Dorsman, Mr. & Mrs. S. Graham, Mr. & Mrs. A. E. Pallett, Mr. & Mrs. R. M. Rogan, Mr. & Mrs. J. R. Thorpe, Mr. & Mrs. A. Wise, Misses L. Bargwanna, J. Campbell, M. L. Higgins, M. Holt, and Mr. H. Olney (voluntary). Mr. G. Litfin entered the work in December '70 and also Mrs. C. Smith (voluntary).

The Children's Homes' work has continued to expand its necessary ministry. particularly to children from broken homes or with special needs and caters for over 100 children. During the year some needy Child Welfare cases had to be turned away through lack of accommodation. Since then a grant of \$40,500 has been approved by the W.A. Native Welfare Department, for the erection of a new section for children.

The Christian Centre activities, church services, radio programme, outreach etc.,

3. Esperance: The "Fairhaven" Training Hostel is staffed by Mr. & Mrs. G. Butler (Superintendent), Mrs. P. Lynch and Miss G. Thornton (Woolwich graduate). A very happy spirit prevails in this "Family" of over 30 girls and stretches accommodation to capacity. The work continues its dual purpose in training students (in co-operation with the High School) and in helping older girls find their place in community life through employment etc., Church services are proving very helpful to both visitors and Hostel residents enabling many to find a spiritual basis on which to build their lives and their future.

4. In Victoria at Mooroopna: The faithful services of Mr. & Mrs. R. H. Clydesdale has been much appreciated whilst church services at *Northcote* have been maintained by "Pastor Doug" Nicholls and helpers. Mr. B. Brown (Woolwich graduate), continues a faithful ministry with regular visits to Cummeragunga coupled with his services to the Echuca Church. The work at *Balladoran in New South Wales* has reached completion, all families now being housed in conventional homes with some attending Gilgandra Church and Bible School. The property is now in the market for disposal.

5. Eidsvold in Queensland is the centre for our work where Mr. & Mrs. L. Morris with the assistance of Mr. & Mrs. Kusay faithfully labour finding the new chapel of considerable help in their work. Removal of some who have helped in this field has made the task somewhat difficult.

FINANCE: Whilst we thank our Heavenly Father for His goodness we cannot fail to thank our N.S.W. Brotherhood for their wholehearted support during the year. Churches and individual members have really excelled themselves as will be seen by our faithful Treasurer's Financial Statement. The number of gifts show that many sacrifices have been made by our members with the result that our total income for the year (13 months) has more than doubled. This has been a wonderful co-operative effort for all have had a share, Churches, individual members, Bible Schools and other Auxiliaries together with our "Walkabout" friends. This latter event ended with many tired walkers and sore feet but the happy satisfaction that over \$2,600 was raised to help wipe out the Federal Board's overdraft. We sincerely thank you, walkers, sponsors & workers too.

Many of the gifts given may not occur again during this present year having been given for special projects but there are many other projects yet to be provided, which we believe will excite your enthusiasm for we know that the work amongst our Aborigine people is most rewarding as we see in them the making of faithful Christians and responsible citizens of this great Commonwealth of Australia. Brethren you have done well. In God's Name we thank you and believe you will continue to support this work and may even do better this year in the Name of our precious Lord.

THE FUTURE: There is much encouragement (and some concern) in the growing awareness of Aboriginal people in the need to speak and act for themselves, while this may lead to some problems in "Black Power" etc., it is also seen to advantage in the growth of the Aborigines Evangelical Fellowship, the increasing number of Aboriginal pastors, and (in our work) the greater part played by Aboriginal brethren in Mission activity. This emphasises the need for continual revision of the missionary role in the light of developments. More and more missionaries will need to take a humble position which will strengthen the framework of the work and enable the Aboriginal Christian leaders to evangelise their own people in a truly co-operative effort. On the practical side we will be facing such things as, the building of the new section at Norseman Children's Homes (from the Govt. grant of \$40,500); the Government request for the Mission to take over a working-girls' Hostel to be erected at Kalgoorlie. the urgent need of the great North West Area with its spectacular development of late; and the continual care of the present work and provision of adequate staff, finance and leadership. The future is both encouraging and challenging and calls for the faith and prayers of the whole Brotherhood. Brethren, this is an ongoing work and we must go on in the Name of our Saviour, the Lord Jesus Christ and for His glory.

# NEW HE BOYS' HOME & YOUNG MEN'S HOSTEL REPORT

to the first of the the

PERSONNEL: T. Smith (Chairman), T. W. Dunne (Treasurer), D. Oldfield (Chaplain), F. Perry (Publicity Officer), D. Parry, A. E. Morton, D. Bunt, Mesdames D. Frost and J. Maxwell and R. F. Bartholomew (Secretary). Recently co-opted J. Monk and I. Walker.

Mr. G. E. Knight resigned from the committee after many years of devoted and loyal service, far beyond the call of duty. His years as chairman have set a standard for others to follow. In some small measure the committee have sought to recog-

nise his work by naming the drive at the Boys' Home in his honour. More recently Mrs. Maxwell retired, again after many years of faithful service. She will be remembered by most of our Churches for her contribution as publicity officer.

DUNMORE HOUSE: Mr. A. Dalton (manager) is in his 19th year of service and has continued the high standard of devotion that has become so characteristic of him. He has been ably assisted by his wife and staff.

Matron Wylliams has now retired after nine years and we deeply appreciate her sacrifice over the latter years particularly when she carried on due to staff shortages. Miss Hazel Grosser served as assistant matron and has now assumed the full responsibility as matron.

Over the past year of two the numbers have been well below the capacity of the home as a result of our inability to cater for a full complement because of staff shortages, however numbers are increasing and we have decided to accept some M boys referred by the Child Welfare Department from the courts. on's Bible study

Arrangements have been made for Mr. & Mrs. T. Smith, committee chairman, to

understudy Mr. Dalton, with a view to being able to take over from Mr. Dalton on his retirement from the Home, without causing a major problem in the Home administration. Mr. and Mrs. Smith have moved into "Dunmore" and have commenced duties on a voluntary basis, with a desire to be fully equipped, when the time comes.

HOSTEL-MARRICKVILLE: Supervisor - Mrs. D. Frost (8 years). The last conference report contained notice of the retirement of Mrs. Frost and as this report goes to print she is looking forward to a well earned rest at her home unit in Ashfield - not far from the Hostel. We have no doubt that mingled with a desire for rest and retirement is the very real feeling of loss of the work so dear to her heart.

We are happy to report that Miss Cox of Earlwood Church has accepted the position of supervisor and will take over from March, 1971.

The Hostel, even more than Dunmore House presents some real problems that we are most concerned with. Among them is the need for more adequate study facilities, parking space and work areas. Most young men need somewhere to tinker with cars, radios etc. and the bedroom or lounge is not the ideal situation.

The Committee feels that there is some merit in transferring the Hostel to Pendle Hill and discussions have been held. The advantages seem to be, 1: Consolidation of staff and facilities (washing etc.), 2: More adequate supervision by manager of both units, 3: Adequate area for carports and workshop, 4: New building built to meet specific needs of a Hostel.

The obvious disadvantage is the distance from the city but we feel this is out-weighed by the intense industrial areas around Pendle Hill. A large portion of our young people today live as far out as Pendle Hill and still meet all the needs of study, work and apprenticeship.

Should it ultimately be decided to transfer to Pendle Hill, it is desired that any new building or buildings will blend in with the proposed area development by the Social Services Department.

FETE: We were again very indebted to the Churches and the many members for their energetic and loyal support, not the least our many country Churches who never overlook the Boys' Home. The Fete has become and remains the "life-blood" of the committee's finances although this was not the original intention. A wet day or lack of support could have very serious consequences financially.

LIQUIDATION OF MORTGAGE: As a result of the disposal of land the mortgage over the Hostel at Marrickville has been liquidated with a resultant saving of interest.

GENERAL: The committee is indebted to local doctors, chemists, tradesmen and G. J. Coles and Co. Ltd. of Parramatta for their assistance and interest. We would also offer our appreciation to all who have entertained the boys at Christmas parties and taken them into their own homes for holidays.

We acknowledge again our thanks to God for the privilege of service and look to Him for His continued blessing and guidance particularly in matters that are not always clear to us.

We continue to covet your prayers and interest.

FACULTY AND STAFF: This year marked the commencement of Dr. Elliott's ministry as Principal of the College after having served for many years as a lecturer and then as Vice-Principal. The Board has greatly appreciated Dr. Elliott's service in this position, made even more demanding because he was the only full-time faculty member. The commencement of Mr. G. Chapman as a second full-time lecturer in 1971 is a very gratifying and significant development and will enable both a lifting of some of the heavy responsibilities that have fallen on Dr. Elliott, and the further development of the training programme of the College. Meanwhile, the contribution of the other faculty members working part-time and sometimes travelling long distances has been outstanding and the Board and the Brotherhood owe them a very real debt of gratitude. In 1971, in addition to the full-time faculty, it is anticipated that Messrs Bowser, Dixon, Nutt, Schofield and Taylor will be lecturing in various specialised fields.

Mrs. Holt, assisted by some of the women students or student wives, has contin-

ued to do excellent service in the kitchen and cleaning duties.

STUDENTS: Appointments of exit students to date: R. Clark - Maryborough, G. Harris - Fairfield, J. Liu - Banmatmat Bible College, New Hebrides, Miss B. Yates - Sydney City Mission.

The allocation of students to churches this year was achieved satisfactorily and many good reports have come in regarding the dedicated service being rendered. Deputation work once again proved of great benefit to students and churches visited alike. The students also did very well in sport and succeeded in winning the Inter-Collegiate Soccer Cup for 1970.

PROPERTY AND ADMINISTRATION: Repeatedly the problem of insufficient accommodation presents itself and the effectiveness and efficiency of the College work is being inhibited in many ways. While limited improvements in single student accommodation have been made possible by the conversion of the kitchen area in Corlett Hall to living quarters, many married students have had to live out in vacant manses, rented flats, etc., often to travel many miles to attend lectures and missing out on many aspects of College life. The College Board has plans in hand for additional accommodation to be erected at Corlett Hall for approximately \$45,000 as the first stage of a long range plan for further extensions at Corlett Hall and the redevelopment of 51 and 53 The Point Road. To this end, inquiries are being made re the amalgamation of properties at the main site to provide adequate space for buildings in terms of Council requirements. It is anticipated that full details will be to hand in time for Conference.

In the meantime, many improvements have been made to the facilities already there. The sewer was connected to the property and toilet accommodation was improved at the married quarters. The exterior of the main building is being painted and railings around the tennis court and along the cliff edge have been improved and repaired. The furnace was replaced by an oil heating unit and plans are in hand for the cleaning up of the swimming pool and the provision of garage space for several cars. In addition, some furniture has been purchased and some donated for use in the dining room. The stock of books in the library continues to grow and donations have been received from several sources. The Board is very appreciative of all those who have made donations financial and otherwise to assist the College,

The College curriculum is, of course, always under review and this year a new Biblical Course in Christian Service of one year full-time or two years part-time has been introduced.

FINANCE: College finances have been maintained in a sound position with a net increase to College Funds of \$6,655. As forecast in last year's report there was heavy expenditure under Building Maintenance for renovations to the Principal's accommodation and the connection of the sewer to the main building. Donations amounting to \$3,701 have been received so far toward the A.W. Stephenson Building Fund. The House Maintenance Account has produced a surplus for the second year in succession due mainly to a larger number of students paying board. The College received a final amount of \$5,206 in the bequest from the Estate of the late Margaret V. Adams. This money is to be used by the Board for any purpose at its direction under the fund name "Vera and Charles Adams."

The Board is grateful for the offerings, gifts, bequests and assistance from churches and individuals.

APPRECIATION AND GENERAL: In addition to expressions of appreciation indicated above, the Board would particularly like to thank Mrs. Single and the ladies who have assisted her at the Open Day and the Graduation Service in providing afternoon tea and floral decorations respectively. We thank the churches, their Officers' Boards and ministers for their unfailing co-operation and support, and the many individuals and other organisations and institutions that have assisted the College in so many ways.

The work of the College has become perhaps a little more widely known this year through the publication of "Woolwich News" from time to time, and through the many visits that have been made to the College, especially by those in Australia for World Convention.

We seek the continued prayer and practical support from the Brotherhood so necessary for the work. Such giving and effort are a sound investment as their effectiveness is multiplied as the students and graduates of the College continue to reach out to so many in need of the Gospel of Christ.



DEVELOPMENTS IN THE FIELD:

INDIA:

Indian Leadership: Following the recommendations made to the Field by the Board in late 1969 several changes have taken place during the year 1970. Indian brethren have been appointed in charge of the following departments of the Conference in recent months — Baramati Boys' Home; Mission Hospital; Shrigonda Girls' School; Shrigonda Library and the Literature Department. With the return to Australia of Mr. and Mrs. Ryall it was felt that the time was at hand for the appointment of the first Indian to become Superintendent of the Baramati Boys' Home, and Mr. and Mrs. Waghmode assumed this responsibility. At the Hospital at Dhond, Dr. Thomas returned for twelve months in June 1969 to hand over responsibility of the Dhond Hospital to Indians. He returned in July 1970, having seen the appointment of two Indian doctors – Dr. Kaviraj, and Dr. Ninan. Dr. Kaviraj, formerly of the Disciples Mission in Madhaya Pradesh, is now Medical Superintendent of our Dhond Hospital. Miss Nalini Jadhay, eldest daughter of Sitabai Jadhay, a teacher and Bible Woman for almost 40 works in the second se Woman for almost 40 years, is now in charge of the Girls' School. Bhikuji Shinde, who has served with outstanding devotion for over 40 years, and who has managed under missionary supervision the Shrigonda Library since it was opened in 1959, has been made fully responsible for this work. Pandhrinath Bhalerao, who has assisted in the literature work for some years, has been given full responsibility for this Department, and is Superintendent of the Dhorja Boys' Home. Australian missionary personnel will continue to serve in an ever widening advisory capacity, rather than being directly in control.

Medical Work: With a lady doctor also at the hospital there has been a very considerable increase in the number of women patients attending during the last six months of 1970. This, together with quite an increase of male patients, has meant that all available ward space has been severely taxed. So much has this been the case that an old building (the first erected at the Hospital back in the 1920's) has had to

he recommissioned as a small Ward block. The Hospital at Dhond is self-supporting as far as general running expenses are concerned. The staff salaries, including the two doctors, are met by receipts from patients.

Education: In August 1970 the Dhorja Primary School was taken over by the Z.P. (Zilla Parished), the Government body responsible for education. After lengthy negotiations they finally agreed to take over the Staff as well as the School. They have been using our own class rooms till the end of the present school year, but from June 1971 are expected to move into their new school class rooms. Negotiations have also begun for this body to take over the Baramati Primary School. A new Headmaster at the Baramati High School has enforced rigid discipline. Before accepting this position, Mr. Chavan was the Professor in a college affiliated with the Poona University. He has visions of this High School being a model school for the area. At Bori High School, the first students to study right up to matriculation will sit for this examination in March 1971. The Government is planning to attach all Primary School classes from Grade 5 upward to the local High School. At Bori, at the present time, the Primary School is run by the Government up to Grade 7. How ever, if this new plan is enforced, our Bori High School will have to accept classes 5, 6 and 7, and create a classroom crisis. A classroom problem already exists. Bori is the home village of Mr. Waghmode who carries a real burden for the salvation of his own people.

Evangelism: Whereas this was once one of the main tasks of the overseas missionary, the place of the foreigner in the land today has changed this. Today the Church's evangelistic programme is directly the responsibility of the Church. Statements from high officials have been most emphatic on the point that any evangelistic programme of the Church is the responsibility of the Indian Christians. Over the next few years the plans are for the Church to be fully self-supporting. The stress is for a real layman's involvement in this programme of evangelism.

Literature: Mr. and Mrs. John Main return to India in early 1971 to take over a key post in Poona. Until early 1971 this position of Manager of the C.S.P. (Christian Literature Distributors) of Maharashtra has always been in the hands of missionaries from the Swedish Hindustani Mission. They have been the backbone of this organisation with which we are affiliated. On our part, we have been the spearhead of the rural distribution programme since its inception in 1959, our part being the organisation, and operation of the book tours over quite wide areas of Maharashtra. This body is made up of a number of missions working in Maharashtra, who have a keen interest in the work of literature. Meanwhile our Literature publication programme will continue as normal. This C.S.P. organisation has always provided one of the outlets for our own publications.

Radio: Since the return of Mr. and Mrs. Powell, they have been located at Dhond where Mr. Powell has constructed a new studio. Dhond being the most central of all of our Stations seemed an obvious choice for its location. It was months of hard work to get a verandah in the Sister's bungalow fitted out as a studio, and then make sure that all the conditions were right for the production of first-class tapes. Having completed this, the studio is now providing rapes for the F.E.B.C. at Sychelles Is. in the Indian Ocean to broadcast the Christian message back into India two or three times each week in the Marathi language. Besides many hearing the message over the air, it introduces many to the Bible Correspondence Course which in turn increases their enrolment. Once again this year this aspect of the work has reached into many lives and homes, and over 20,000 question papers have been marked.

World Convention Delegate: Dr. K. Kolhatkar from Baramati represented the Conference of Churches of Christ in Western India at the 8th Assembly of the World Convention. We were pleased to have him amongst us.

NEW GUINEA: The following extracts from Annual Station Reports tell of the development in New Guinea during 1970:-

Tung: Tung has been staffed by only one missionary for several years, Miss A. Draney. The Sunday School is still very popular, and it is an encouragement to hear the youngsters repeating the stories to one another and older folk. Numbers are still about 30 on most Sundays. Church Life continues much the same, but it is a thrill to see how some of the younger ones are growing. Tung-Bunapas Church membership is 48 which includes 14 new members.

Pir: The visit of Ermot and his wife Wenup from Chungribu to Pir in the early part of 1970 proved to be a great blessing to the work in the Pir area. Ermot and Wenup are studying at the Christian Leaders' Training College at Banz. As a result of their visit there developed a growing interest in the gospel and 78 people register-ed their names to start a discipleship class. In August over 80 people were baptized. Most of these people came from Minung and Temnung, villages in the Pir area.

Tsumba: When the Beale's returned for furlough at the end of 1969, the young

people from the Bible and Vocational School went back to their home villages. Their presence there made a foreign missionary's visit less necessary, as these young people witnessed effectively amongst their own people. The work amongst the women is showing results. Standards of cleanliness have improved and a number of women regularly attend Sunday and mid-week services. Church membership at Tsumba and Bramfito is 108. Eighteen people were baptized at Tsumba during the year.

Asau: Miss Rosalie Rofe has been the only worker at Asau for several years. The major development during the past year has been the commencement of Pidgin Teacher Training. In March ten villages sent men to Asau to begin training as literacy teachers. It is important that adults, as well as children, become literate, and these men, on completion of their training, will return as teachers to their own villages.

Chungribu: The school work has occupied most of the missionaries' time at Chungribu. The Church has experienced a time of testing, as those who joined for cargo have been disillusioned, but there are those who are very earnest in wanting to please Christ, learn more of the Bible, and accept their responsibilities in the Church. It is a strategic time for deeper teaching of the few, so that they may be able to teach others. A small experimental Bible Class has been in progress for over a year, in which direction is given in individual study of a Bible passage, followed by a time for discussion of answers to questions set on the passages.

Bunapas: It is hoped that in the new year one or two girls will train in Infant Welfare and Maternal Health. At the commencement of the year there were six doctor boys on the staff, but this number has now been reduced to three for financial reasons. Thirty children attend the Bunapas School. Eighteen children attend Sunday School and from one to ten attend the weekly prayer meeting and Bible study class. Contact is made with the women of the station through weekly meetings, consisting of sewing and a devotional time.

Bunam: Work at Bunam on the Keram commenced in September 1969. The Bethesda Hospital, formed by the Bethesda Hospital, Western Australia, will be located at Bunam, and a work team from Western Australia will go to New Guinea in 1971. Leprosy is a major problem in the area. The people have shown a keen interest in the Word of God. Fifteen villages in the surrounding area are visited.

Mui: New Hebridean missionaries, August and Maelene Ben, are located at Mui in the Keram River area. They have seen a great change in the people since arriving there in March 1969. It is encouraging to see the people keen to hear the gospel. They travel long distances to hear the message, and often ask for the same gospel message to be repeated. There are three Sunday Schools in the area, with a total enrolment of 131.

Gokto: Bill and Janet Buli from the New Hebrides have commenced work at Gokto in the Schrader Ranges. Before going to Gokto, they worked with August and Maelene Ben at Mui. They need our prayers as they pioneer in yet another new area.

#### **NEW HEBRIDES:**

World Convention Delegates: Mrs. Leith Wilson from Maewo attended the World Convention, being sponsored by C.W.F. groups throughout Australia. Mrs. Laura Daniel also attended the Convention and was sponsored by C.W.F. groups in the New Hebrides. Other delegates from the New Hebrides were Elder Abel Bani and Pastor Amos Waki. Prior to, and following the World Convention, the delegates visited churches throughout Australia, and were appreciated by all.

Evangelistic Outreach: Our Churches in the New Hebrides continue to receive invitations to villages on Santo and adjacent islands and Malekeula. More New Hebrideans are going to New Caledonia for employment and they need a New Hebridean pastor to minister to them. There is also a growing work in Lugainville (Santo), the main Northern port, and Vila, the Administration Centre.

Medical Outreach: In addition to the three hospitals, Ndui Ndui, Nasawa and Ranmawat, there are four dispensaries, which operate in remote areas. Regular visits are made by the hospital staff to dispensaries and also to villages reasonably distant from the hospitals that are not covered by the dispensaries. The functioning of hospital equipment, lighting plants, etc., has improved considerably since the appointment of Mr. Alex McKay, the engineer. Improvements and additions have been made to hospital buildings, and while further additions are required the major needs now are mainly concerned with maintenance work on the buildings.

Banmatmat: Mr. C. McCosker, Principal of the Bible College, reported that over 400 people attended the graduation service in November for five men and two women. The Bible College continues to meet a vital need in training young men and women to work effectively amongst the churches in the New Hebrides and overseas. Mr. John Liu returned to the New Hebrides after completing two year's Bible study at Woolwich. He will serve as a tutor at Banmatmat.

Education: The primary schools at Ndui Ndui, Ranwadi, Londua, and the Technical School at Nasawa continue to maintain a high standard. Six students who sat for the Senior Primary Examinations conducted by the Government were selected for teacher training at the Kawenu Teachers' College in Vila. Mr. Sam Vira, a teacher from the Ndui Ndui School, studied at the Wattle Park Teachers' College in Adelaide during 1970. He returned to the New Hebrides in November, and the additional training he received will benefit our educational work. Mr. Abel Olul, who was teaching at the Ranwadi School, is now in England studying teaching methods. An increasing number of our young people are being given the opportunity to train as teachers in the New Hebrides and have additional training overseas. This speaks well for the future of the work.

GENERAL:

Missionary Consultation: A World Brotherhood Consultation Overseas Mission was held on October 17 in Adelaide. Missionaries, and mission Board representatives told of the work that Churches of the World Brotherhood of Churches of Christ are doing in many parts of the world. Over 200 people attended the all-day consultation, which proved to be a time of challenge and inspiration as information was shared.

Federal Conference Policy Decision: Federal Conference approved the following policy in view of the changing situation in India and challenge of S.E. Asia:-

(1) That as villages along the Keram River and in the Schrader Ranges in New Guinea have appealed to us directly as Churches of Christ to send missionaries to them, we regard this field as having first priority in any new expansion of our work overseas.

(2) While recognising that we are deeply committed financially to our existing work and the expansion of the work in New Guinea, we serve in S.E. Asian countries by:— (a) Assisting in recruitment of missionaries and the seconding of missionaries to churches and missions in S.E. Asia that invite us to do so, e.g. Missions affiliated with World Convention of Churches of Christ, Leprosy Mission and National Churches. (b) Following up contacts that have already been made with churches in Indonesia who have indicated their willingness to receive workers from us with a view to a full report on the Churches concerned, the results of the following up of contacts with them and any proposed action arising from such contacts to be submitted to all State Conference Executives for consideration and approval. (c) Supporting Nationals to reach their own people with the gospel, such as student team ministries in Indonesia.

(3) That any proposal to move into new areas of work which would involve increased expenditure be implemented only after referral to State Conference Executives and approval by a majority of them.

Mr. Rex Ellis, Federal Board member in Queensland went to Indonesia in December. The Camp Hill Church met travel expenses to Djakarta and the Federal Overseas Mission Board paid travel expenses from Djakarta to Medan, North Sumartra. Dr. Hutagalung had planned meetings with Mr. Ellis and the Protestant Christian Church of Indonesia. His visit will enable us to understand further missionary opportunities in this area.

Missionary Orientation Camp: A successful Missionary Orientation Camp was held in January in Adelaide. 57 people attended, 8 of whom were missionaries elect. We are grateful to all who assisted in organising and participation in the Camp arrangements.

STATE ACTIVITIES: The Committee, on behalf of the Brotherhood, thanks most sincerely those churches, individual members, local missionary committees, etc., who have supported special projects, made special gifts, held missionary demonstrations and rallies, received deputations by visiting missionaries, held regular prayer or in any other way have furthered the Brotherhood's Overseas work. During the year, special purpose gifts were made by a number of churches and individuals. The N.S.W. Brotherhood was requested by the Federal Board to accept \$28,000 as a target for the year, and the sum of \$33,336 was given for this part of the N.S.W. Churches' Christian work in this Conference year, and sent to Adelaide. The response of the N.S.W. Brotherhood to the Mission appeal is good reason to give thanks and these thanks, on behalf of the missionaries, are here expressed. They need our intelligent, informed prayers, also, to enable them to carry out their work properly. Mr. C. G. Taylor has represented the Federal Board at the meetings of the Division of Mission, Australian Council of Churches.

To all who have helped the work of the Committee, thanks are expressed.

# DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL SERVICE REPORT

In a Department as complex as the Social Service, Christian Fellowship Association Homes Department, it is virtually impossible for only one executive officer to give adequate attention to all aspects and expect the ultimate in results. Consequently some phases have been exasperating and results most disturbing.

We submit the Report in the following order so that you - yes, YOU - who peruse it, may understand what is being done, how it is being done, the means of support and where weak and vulnerable spots need strengthening.

APPRECIATION: At the outset we express our thanks to God for having been given opportunities and making possible service through the Department.

John William Boswell. It is fitting that this Report in its early paragraphs, should contain an appreciation of the activities of the late John Boswell even though his unexpected death occurred after the close of the year under review. At the time of his death, John Boswell was Chairman of the Committee, having been unanimously elected to that position by his fellow Committee men. He had served in this capacity on previous occasions and also as Treasurer at different periods. He was the longest standing member of the present Committee and would be amongst those who had served from earliest times in this Department. His wise counsel was sought on the many different issues of the Department and he never hesitated to make available the sound advice gained from his professional activities. Though this appreciation is short, the service he rendered is voluminous and we will continue to miss his personality and wisdom over the years to come. We extend to Mrs. Boswell and Graeme our Christian sympathy.

To the members of the General Committee, Women's Committee, Voluntary Workers and to all who in any way have assisted in the work, we express to them

ACTIVITIES: Often it is asked, "What happens in a Department of this kind; what is done?" Our reply is:-

"METHODS remain the same. For instance, there are-

Counselling Services - for family, marriage, housing, property, pensions, referrals etc.

Special Casework - for individual and group welfare.

Adoptions - In conjunction with the Sydney Rescue Work Society and with the assistance of Miss Dorothy Cole, B.A., Dip.Soc.Wk., and the care of unmarried

Migration — care of migrants in association with the Inter-Church Migration Committee and the Good Neighbour Council, as well as arranging Chaplains for overseas and coastal ships.

Chaplaincy Service (Voluntary) — in Hospitals, Institutions, Prisons, Industry. Employment - A register is kept of employment vacancies and of those seeking employment.

Accommodation — For country young people, business girls and young men in private homes, hospitals, etc. Christmas Cheer — Hampers of food and toys provided for Church families,

Bible School and Club members and others who may or may not be associated with our Churches.

Material Assistance - Monetary help and provision of food and clothing is available.

Special Issues - An alert watch is maintained with regard to crucial issues affecting the community and we join in appropriate action with other interested organisations.

Welfare Appeal - Involving collection of clothing, waste rag, newspapers, bottles, furniture, metals and saleable knick-knacks, is carried on under the supervision of David Hunt.

Geriatric Care - Present care is provided in self-contained Units and Guest Homes, including personal care is provided in self-contained Units and Guest Homes, including personal care. Projected development of a Nursing Home will complete the cycle with nursing care. Unfettered Establishment Donations are the main source of revenue enabling development of Homes, and their maintenance is made possible through weekly Service Charges paid by the occupants and guests. "Victoria House", at 26 Victoria Street, Mayfield, commenced activities during November, under the supervision of Matron I Combridge A House Comparity November, under the supervision of Matron J. Combridge. A House Committee administers local affairs. Twelve guests can be accommodated. Information is freely available.

Beneficial Co-operative Building Society No. 1 - providing finance for homes development to Church members and others as a terminating Society. Whilst this Society is full, efforts are being made to secure additional finance for subsequent Societies.

Welfare Traders - A trading organisation handling most lines of merchandise is sponsored by the Department which also provides the Directors for same. Mr. H. Cox resigned as Executive Sales Manager early in the year. The year has been quite successful.

Property Trust. In consideration of a substantial subsidy from the Property Trust, the Director attends to matters dealing with Church properties.

Outreach Activities are for a four-fold purpose, namely, to meet the needs of people, help the local Church, assist the Department and as a means of personal evangelism. These are:-

- Operation Street Warden. A simple and effective method of contacting the people in your street and others for the purpose of collecting used clothing, etc. and discussing Christian matters.

- Fellowship of Right-Handers - a New Testament method which operates in the local Church to help with material, social, mental and spiritual needs and of increasing the sense of fellowship.

- Christian Fellowship Association for many years has been meeting the financial needs of those in necessitous circumstances. Your contirbution, together with others, creates a fund to make this possible. Contributions for the year amounted to and assistance with interest-free loans and gifts totalled \$

- Aid in Counselling. Still in the process of formation, but with a design programme and offering training techniques to Action Groups within the Churches to assist with counselling, supportive case-work, referrals, housekeeping, budgetting. An effective means of friendship and evangelism. Information about all the above activities is freely available on reference to the Director. In all of these, you may participate if you care enough." "BUT CIRCUMSTANCES continually change, as the following number of brief

Miss S. was addicted to drugs, and hard ones at that! Many circumstances led to this state. Much time and counselling and therapy have been expended. She still

needs our prayers and help. The Smiths were in financial difficulties - very deep difficulties. The local Church in association with the Director and the Christian Fellowship Association, helped solve them and gave them a fresh start, as well as their marriage and family.

Jim was a nice lad, rising to a teenager. His several misdemeanors earned him the attention of the Child Welfare Department. We are thankful that we were able to

attention of the Unid wehare Department. We are thankful that we were able to join the local Preacher in stabilising Jim's character and his position with his family. Mr. H. came from interstate to seek his deserted wife. We listened to his story helped financially and counselled. Let us pray that husband and wife and family will remain reunited.

A dear old lady, suffering with an incurable disease, associated with our Churches came to the office for assistance with accommodation because she had been forced to leave the room in which she had lived for years. She had no money, but is now living happily in one of our self-contained Units. And so we can go on referring to case histories, each with different circumstances, but all of them requiring the application of the age-old, well-tried methods referred to above, and in all instances a Christian emphasis is being expressed."

HOW ACCOMPLISHED. The above activities are made possible by the following people:-

GENERAL COMMITTEE: J.W. Boswell (Chairman), R. Garrett (Vice-Chairman), J. Rigg (Treasurer), H.H. Cox, G. Laney, J. Ellerby, D. Craig, L. Douglas, F. G. Love (co-opted), C. Cole (Director); together with Women's Committee representatives, Mesdames Beckingham (Minute Secretary), and Styche (Temperance Alliance Representative). Mr. B. A. Nichols continues to act as Treasurer of the Homes Accounts.

An assessment was made during the year to ascertain the specific contribution which members may make to particular functions of the Committee. It will now be possible to set up Functional Committees to deal with the following aspects:-

Finance - to critically examine fund-raising activities, make recommendations and to carefully watch expenditure.

Publicity - to promote a helping relationship between the Committee and the Churches and to provide information on the Department's activities through literature, articles, deputation, etc.

Homes - examine and prepare a long-range policy and programme for the provision of Homes accommodation and to supervise general running of the Homes.

Social Issues - to consider relevant Social Questions, to promote interest in and study of these, to prepare literature and set up various types of discussion on the same.

WOMEN'S COMMITTEE - Appointed by the Christian Women's Fellowship, comprises Mesdames Swift, (President and Catering Convenor), Marley (Secretary and Roster Convenor), Camlin, Luxton, Mitchell, Styche, McArthur and Banner. This Committee is responsible for arranging voluntary workers for the Depot, Stalls, Welfare Shops, Homes, as well as organising the annual Garden Party and catering for Christmas Parties at our Homes, and the C.F.A. Dinner.

VOLUNTARY WORKERS look after the Clothing Depot (supervised by Mrs. Cairncross and Mrs. Symons); two Welfare shops (supervised by a part-time worker in each) some fifty or more street stalls, supervision of collection of clothing, newspapers, etc. in the Churches, and assistance at our Aged Persons Homes.

CHURCH GROUPS from the various C.W.F. Fellowships and Youth Fellowships visit our Homes, providing entertainment and devotional programmes, as well as refreshments. Bible Schoole and Clubs refreshments. Bible Schools and Clubs, as well as Church Officers and individuals; assist with Christmas Cheer in gifts of food, toys and money.

SPECIALISTS. Men and women qualified as Social Workers, Psychologists, Doctors, Solicitors, Accountants, are available to whom counsellees may be referred for specialist attention.

OFFICE STAFF. The Department is still unable to afford the services of a fulltime Office Secretary and is dependent upon the voluntary assistance of stenographers, Mesdames Beckingham and Cole who give four days each week between them, of top grade service. Many aspects of the Department must be left to these workers for attention. A full-time office secretary, however, is desperately needed. Patricia Bateman is employed full-time as receptionist/clerk and makes a valuable contribution to the efficient running of the office.

DIRECTOR. The Director, in addition to co-ordinating all the above-mentioned means of assistance, must give attention to selective and specialised matters, attend to the many activities of the Department, function as Secretary for the Property Trust, prepare Homes developmental programmes, supervise their maintenance. attend to the social well-being of occupants and guests, and ensure that adequate staff is available, prepare and effect media of promotion and publicity by way of literature, lectures, deputation work, initiate means and maintain oversight of fundraising activities, as well as assist with the actual pick-up of goods and the distribution of same to shops, stalls, etc.

HOW SUPPORTED AND MAINTAINED. This deals particularly with the provision of finance for the ongoing of the Department and is made possible as follows:

Funds through the Finance Advisory Committee and Contributions from Churches and individual church members have been responsible for \$4,767 during the past year.

Subsidies-from Property Trust, Chapel Extension, our Homes, Christian Fellowship Association and Conference Executive for services rendered in various ways. have added approximately \$5,028 to our income.

Government Grants, in recognition of our Social Welfare Work and Christmas Cheer, have provided another \$1,575. This is apart from Commonwealth subsidies towards the capital cost of provision of Homes and Personal Care subsidies.

Individual Donations, particularly for Homes development, are deductible for Income Tax purposes.

Bequests. Remembering our Department in your Will, and particularly the development of Homes for Aged People, is an excellent way to ensure the continuance of the services and will assist when Probate duties are being assessed.

Welfare Appeal - that is, income derived from the sale of clothing, wiping cloths, waste, furniture, newspapers, bottles and from shops and stalls, has totalled \$9000 odd, with a net profit of 25% after payment of wages, running costs, shop rentals, purchases, etc.

Rose Day Appeal - This annual event has added \$279 to our income and we appreciate the help of the ladies in selling buttons in their churches and on Rose Day. **EMPHASES FOR 1971:** 

Office Secretary - An efficient Secretary costing approximately \$3,000 per annum is a necessity.

Social Worker - costing in excess of \$4,000 per annum - a long-overdue requirement.

Aid in Counselling - (See under "Activities"). In course of preparation. Should be available for Church groups, full-time preachers and College students during the coming year.

Functional Committees (See under "How Accomplished"). Will be streamlined this year.

**Homes Development:** 

"Bingley Hall" - purchase of adjoining land, enlargement of existing Home to take twenty-five guests and construction of self-contained Units.

Pendle Hill - construction of approximately thirty-five bed Nursing Home and first stage in development of additional eighty self-contained Units.

Thirroul - construction of several self-contained Units on adjoining land and enlargement of Guest Home.

Mayfield - first stage development of self-contained Units on adjoining land. Forestville - Production of developmental plan and first stage construction of self-contained Units.

Welfare Appeal - Re-assessment and possible elimination of newspaper collection and substitution with more profitable activities. Introduction of new methods of clothing collection.

Building Society. Anticipated set-up of Beneficial Co-operative Building Society No. 2.

C.F.A. — Enlargement of scope of contributors with special reference upon the young people of our Churches, and wider use of available funds.

Welfare Traders - Examination of means of promoting and appointment of officer to supervise same.

FINIS: Having perused this report, we trust that you will now not only have a better understanding of the Department's activities, how it functions and how it is supported, but will have a keener interest to share in every phase of the Department's Life and Work.


