

3. Observe the time limit (3 minutes). Others may also want to speak.
4. Remember that each speaker, except the mover, can only speak once to a motion without the permission of the meeting.
5. Vote on all questions. Not to do so influences the result as much as voting does.
6. The correct way to bring any metter before Conference is to move a motion.

As your representative, I have attended the monthly meetings of our Aborigine Committee keeping up to date with all phases of the work. I am always pleased to be asked to your Fellowship so that you may know more of the work that we as Churches of Christ are doing for our Lord amongst our Aboriginal people of Australia.

This year has been an encouraging, heart-warming one, in the progress made on our mission fields, especially in the Highlands of New Guinea, which perhaps draws a sharper contrast in the repetitive nature of our Home-front report. Our ladies' committee have worked well together as always and my appreciation goes to each one praying the Lord's blessing on each in the new year of service.

(H) AFFILIATION: Applications for affiliation have been received from the Churches meeting at Coff's Harbour and Port Macquarie.
 (I) MATTERS ARISING FROM 1972 CONFERENCE: (i) Enmore: This work

continues to be blessed by God as R. Dixon and members accept the daily challenges of this far-reaching ministry. (ii) Broadcasting Committee: The corre-spondence Course drew good response and the oversight of this work continues under a committee comprising M. Pieper, D. Norling, G. Warne and R. Hewitt. A special word of commendation goes to P. Pitts, who has for the latter part of the year conducted this session. The Conference Executive arranged for J. Bacik to have special training in broadcasting. (iii) Radio Station 2CH: This motion was discussed by the Council of Churches, but such a move was thought to be not practical or legally possible because of the existing contract. (iv) Brotherhood Administration: The necessary amendments to constitution will be dealt with under Notices of Motion at Conference 1973. (v) Indonesia: This subject was discussed at Federal Conference, and the results will be covered in the Overseas Mission Report. (J) FEDERAL CONFERENCE: The 34th Federal Conference was held in Perth

from 10th to 15th October 1972, and the next Federal Conference is scheduled for Canberra, 1974. J. G. Shaw has succeeeded C. G. Taylor as Federal Vice-President for N.S.W

(K) FINANCE: Monies received for allocation through F.A.C. again fell short of the approved budget, causing many difficulties to most committees. The Budget for 1973 calls for \$47,000 which is far below the amount actually requested by Committees. This puts the finances for 1973 in a very serious position and requires a 10% rise in last year's giving to even meet the budget allocation. (L) APPRECIATION: Our thanks are due to all who have assisted in the work

FEDERAL CONFERENCE EXECUTIVE REPORT

Apart from essential business a significant role of Federal Conferences is the focussing of the faith and witness of the Brotherhood within the setting of the fellowship of one State. 1972 was the turn of Western Australia to be hosts and the churches and members there gave of their warm traditional hospitality and their splendid Brotherhood Centre provided excellent Conference facilities.

Conference reviewed the achievements of the various departments, approved future plans, and elected committees for ongoing work. Although no new projects were definitely launched there were moves to explore openings for Christian mission in the developing north-west of Western Australia (the Pilbars region); and to be alert to establish a cause in Darwin if opportunity is presented. Limited overseas missionary assistance was made available for Indonesia although the

demands of our present overseas fields (as well as Indonesia's own restrictive policies) prevent us from engaging in large scale work there.

The 35th Federal Conference will for the first time be held in Canberra. Graham Gilmour was named President, D. W. Burdett is Secretary of the Conference Arrangements Committee, with W. H. Long as Treasurer. The Fourth National Ministers' Seminar will be held in conjunction with the 35th Conference.

The Federal Conference Executive meets regularly in Melbourne with L. J. Butler, Victorian Vice-President as Chairman. The other Federal Vice-Presidents are represented by proxies. The Executive forms a continuing link between State Conferences and Federal Departments and represents the whole Brotherhood in inter-church activities, and in national and overseas interests.

Federal Home Evangelism: The Conference Executive controls aid given through Federal Home Evangelism to churches in the A.C.T. and in the various States as determined by Conference in session and in co-operation with the appropriate State Conference Home Mission Department. Churches currently receiving assistance are in the A.C.T., Albany and Broken Hill. Townsville has reached the stage of self-support and has voluntarily surrendered F.H.E. aid, Funds for Federal Home Evangelism are raised in response to letters to the churches asking for the giving of 20 cents per year per active member.

WORLD CONVENTION - AUSTRALIAN COMMITTEE

The Committee. The same Committee which organised the 1970 Assembly was requested by the Federal Executive to continue to be the Australian Committee until after the 9th Assembly. Mr. K. D. Horne is no longer a member of the Committee due to his removal to Victoria, and Dr. K. R. Bowes has been added as Chairman, being our Australian Vice-President.

Air travel arrangements for the Ninth Assembly. Qantas have been appointed as our overseas carriers and T.A.A. as our domestic carriers. Already we have received excellent assistance from these two airlines. Any necessary printing has been done by them, and their assistance when Dr. Daniel Joyce attended Federal Conference as our guest speaker was greatly appreciated. It is our hope that all of our people will use these two airlines. The Travel Department of the Bank of Adelaide has been appointed as our Travel Agents. Mr. Peter McDonald, the Director of this Department, is a member of our Brighton Gardens Church, and he will give personal attention to all inquiries and requests. We can handle all travel arrangements in Adelaide.

Intention-to-attend cards and posters have been printed and forwarded to all of our Churches. More than 100 members have already returned these cards, and they will form the basis of our mailing list. It is our plan to arrange a pre and post Convention bus tour in U.S.A., with accommodation provided in the homes of our people. CHAPLAIN Ron Hewitt accepted this position and has proved an asset in this capacity.

PROJECTS. Early in 1972 it was agreed to contact the men of this State to purchase a Gestetner duplicator for the Church for all Nations at Enmore, as the vear's project.

At the same meeting a request from T. W. Bagley of Bexley North was accepted to raise a team of 8 men to do urgent repair work in the New Hebrides where damage had been done to our Mission stations. PREACHERS' PROVIDENT FUND REPORT

The Board administering the Fund which is resident in New South Wales was reappointed by Federal Conference held in Perth in October 1972. Its members are H. E. Bell, W. K. Hunter, A. T. Laney, N. H. Morris, P. H. Morton, R. Souness, D. Smallbone, M. Titterton.

FUND MEMBERSHIP: The total membership in the Fund stands at 381 and includes 34 student members, 37 missionaries, 30 ministers who are engaged by Conference committees as secretaries, directors, field officers, etc., 16 who are engaged in christian work outside the brotherhood, 6 who are serving with or studying with American churches and 4 on leave of absence from the full-time ministry. Of the 14 new members who joined the Fund during the year, 6 are ministering with churches, 5 are student members and 3 are under engagement to conference committees. Losses in membership of the Fund were 15 for the year: 1 by death, 4 retired and 10 by resignation. BENEFITS AVAILABLE FROM THE FUND: As a result of a motion moved in

the name of the Victorian Tasmanian Conference Executive from the floor of Federal Conference in Perth, the Board of the Preachers' Provident Fund was directed to enter into a consultation with a representative committee drawn from each of the states and appointed by the State Conference Executives, to consider superannuation contributions and benefits based on changing salary levels. The following factors were suggested as a basis for discussion and report.

1. The retirement and death benefit be at least 21/2 times the final average salary.

- 2. The contributions of churches and ministers to be based on a percentage of salary which may require at least 5% of the salary and be in addition to the church's contribution to Long Service Leave.
- 3. Individual credits to be abolished and converted into an unallocated fund which would be used to provide immediate benefits for today's as well as tomorrow's retiring ministers.
- 4. Consultation to be held in Sydney prior to September 1973 and the result to be reported to State Executives not later than December 1973 for inclusion in 1974 **Conference Hand Book.**

The Board of the Preachers' Provident Fund is very happy to enter into a consultation so that improved benefits may be available for the ministers. At this point of time however, it is not entirely in agreement with all points of the proposal and it contends the provisions of the fund are much better suited to the means of the ministers and the churches than those which would be imposed if a Life Assurance Society or company were to assume control of the Scheme. At the moment there is no limit to the amount that a minister may pay into his Superannuation account and there is no problem if by some chance he is unable to contribute any amount in any one or more years. His benefits are controlled by the amounts that he pays into the Fund and they remain his own property. This gives a man who joins the Fund at 25 a retiring benefit at 65 of at least \$7,711, to which should be added \$5,701 provided by the churches' contribution to Long Service Leave, making a total of \$13,412. This is more than 2½ times the average annual salary. If the ministers would increase their contributions, the Fund can provide a proportionally increased retiring allowance.

Other benefits which are currently provided:-

1. A gift to the dependants of a deceased minister to assist in defraying funeral expenses.

- 3. Payment of Death Cover Premiums on the lives of all married students in our **Bible Colleges.**
- 4. Short term loans to minister members against the security of their Superannuation accounts.

The continuity of these benefits depends on the type of fund management currently employed.

FINANCIAL: The finances of the Fund continue in a healthy state. The position at 31.12.72 was as follows:-

ADVISORY BOARD REPORT - 1972

The advisory Board has met month by month throughout the year to prayerfully consider and then advise on the various matters that have come before it. This has included enquiries from other States as well as a call for assistance from our New Zealand Brotherhood.

We seek the prayers of the brotherhood in our ministry which is both spiritual and strategic. We believe, that if Preachers, Church Boards and the Advisory Board conscientiously sought the mind of Christ in our church ministries then the placement of ministers would be efficiently carried out with the greatest of blessings.

At the present time there are a number of churches still requiring accommodation and it is hoped that their need will soon be met. We have observed that an increasing number of churches are satisfying themselves with less than the normal recognized full time ministry. This has lessened our total full time preacher force in our state.

As usual the Board has carried out an annual revision of those licensed by the Registrar General's Department to perform marriages. The names of new preachers have been added following the approval of the President.

The Board appreciates the confidence expressed by co-operating churches and preachers and is always willing to give advice where help can be offered. Those serving on the Board were: K. E. Crawford (Home Missions); H. T. Davies;

NUMBER OF MEETINGS HELD -9, with an average attendance of 6. Initially the Chapel Extension Fund was the only means whereby the development of new Churches and the expansion of existing Churches could be financed through the Brotherhood.

The Chapel Extension Fund is no longer responsible for making loans available as this is now the function of the Deposits Fund, but it still demands our interest and support because:

- 1. Its assets provide a guarantee fund for monies lent by Churches and individuals to the Deposits Fund.
- 2. It undertakes to provide bridging finance between the money which a Church may obtain on loan from a lending organization and the cost of a project. This may only be a matter of a few dollars but can be important.
- 3. It is still the only Fund which is able to subsidise Churches and particularly new Churches, promoted by our Department of Home Missions and Evangelism insofar as the payment of interest charges are concerned, especially in the early years of their development.
- 4. It is the only Fund to which an individual or Church may make a direct gift for capital development of Churches or Committees, whereas monies obtained through the Deposit Fund are on loan.

For these reasons we need the Chapel Extension Fund for the construction of Churches.

INSURANCE. Commission received from the Queensland Insurance Company amounted to \$842.82

INVESTMENTS. Surplus monies totalling \$41,782.41 have been invested on call so that the specific function of the Chapel Extension Committee may be able to continue.

PROPERTY TRUST REPORT

NUMBER OF MEETINGS HELD - 9, with average attendance of 7.

TRUSTEESHIP: The Trust is Trustee for 66 churches in New South Wales, but 2 are affiliated with other State Conferences, 6 Conference Departments and Conference Executive.

During the year the Wingham, Port Macquarie and Seven Hills Churches appointed the Trust as Trustees. Only 4 of our Churches retain individual Trustees.

The powers of the Trust are wide and varied, as set out in the Incorporation Act 1947. Basically the Trust acts as Trustee for any Church of Christ in N.S.W. in accordance with Part 5 of the Act, or any Conference Department or Conference Auxiliary.

Careful attention is given to matters relating to property such as purchase, transfer and disposal, arrangements of mortgages, loans and leases, building agreements, attention to necessary legal documents and details, and advice on many situations by men who have specific abilities in these matters. For this the fee only of \$4 per year is chargeable.

It is generally recognized that the appointment of the Trust as trustee of Church properties has decided advantages over individual trustees insofar as it provides a continuity of trusteeship which is readily available and responsible. There is a tendency to fail to replace individual trustees at death and to lose knowledge of their whereabouts on removal, consequently creating great difficulties at a time when matters require their services.

During the year 28 Churches have consulted with the Trust on matters as diverse as the advice on relocating their activities, methods of financing projects or matters concerning their particular local work, enquiry into rating and exemption from rates, overdue rentals, Council requirements, as well as matters referred to above.

Six Brotherhood Committees have referred matters dealing with acquisition of properties, development of same and disposal of properties. Matters affecting the disposal of the late Illawarra Camp Site and Swansea Camp Site were completed satisfactorily. Communications with the State Planning Authorities with reference to the Hoxton Park Road and its affect on the West Liverpool Church are continuing.

Conference Executive has used the services of the Trust referring matters to them for advice and receiving recommendations from the Trust.

The Preachers' Provident Fund, a Federal body of Churches of Christ, recognise the advisability of using the services of the Trust as Trustee of much of their assets.

DEPOSITS FUND: Monies invested with the Deposits Fund now total \$81,922.62 comprised as follows:

From Trust A/c\$	4,522.28

Monies on loan total \$82.265.01, of which \$28.262.50 are on call and \$54.002.51 are on terms.

We have particularly helped our Department of Home Missions and Evangelism in financing the establishment of Churches in new areas. Locations such as Port Macquarie, Macquarie Fields, Coffs Harbour, have been assisted financially.

Perhaps we were unable to assist all Churches to the extent that they desired, but this has been largely due to the unavailability of finance, and in some situations there were other contributing factors. Consequently, there is a continuing need for Churches and members to invest their unused monies with the Fund where they are assured of a reasonable return on their investment at rates ranging up to 53/%, as well as the satisfaction of knowing that these investments are safe and furthering the work of the Brotherhood.

The Lending Rate over a ten year period is 534%

INSURANCE COMMISSION: Commission received from the Queensland Insurance Company from insurances on church properties total \$1,988.61 of which \$842.82 was passed on to the Chapel Extension Fund. We commend the Queensland Insurance Company for its prompt attention to all matters and its understanding and advice on all occasions.

We wish to remind Churches and Committees to insure their properties to replacement value and to adequately cover preachers and casual and voluntary workers, members of Bible schools, auxiliaries, clubs, etc.

We request Churches to seriously consider effecting their insurances with the Queensland Insurance Company as the commission received is money available for the work of the Trust.

THANKS: The work of the Trust is such that it is not prominently displayed but it is a vital and necessary part of our Brotherhood activities. Members of the Trust express their appreciation to our Heavenly Father and to the Brotherhood for the opportunity of serving in this capacity.

ABORIGINES COMMITTEE REPORT

"Change and decay in all around I see" said the hymnwriter, but Malachi 3:6 says, "I am the Lord, I change not". How true. As another year has passed we have been conscious of the fact that we are in an ever changing world and consequently the work amongst our Aborigines is also changing. We are very conscious of this however, that Our Heavenly Father changeth not and we give Him our praise and thanks for His Never-ending and Wonderful Blessings despite the many changes about us which have involved many trials, problems, sadness and joys. Federal Conference being in Perth, W.A. last year enabled some of your Committee to see the problems etc., of the work and the workers first hand and appreciate the untring services of a dedicated Board and Staff. The plight of the Aborigines of our country has been brought before the public this year more than ever before and it will be interesting to see what a new government will do. Whatever governments do is not likely to help very much in the spiritual position and that is where we dare not let up. As has been seen amongst our own people, material wealth often leads to danger and spiritual decline and this may well be the case with our Aborigine friends. Therefore, we must press on with the command given us by our Loving Saviour, Matt 28:19,20. These are our marching orders.

THE FIELDS

Carnarvon, W.A. This Field is ably superintended by Mr & Mrs G. Butler with Mr & Mrs I. Foot as deputies and Mr & Mrs R. Barlow, Mr & Mrs V. Hoskin, Mr & Mrs D. Fatchen, Mr & Mrs K. Hutton, Mr D. Schaer and Miss O. Laird assisting as House parents, Miss E Lincoln as house parent and office help, Mr & Mrs Edwards, dining/kitchen. Mr & Mrs F. Combridge, old people's section, and Mr & Mrs P. Field handling centre and hostel work, making a very efficient staff. At the end of the year the number of children had been reduced to about 80 due to new Departmental Policy which requires children whose parents are living in Carnaryon to live with their parents. This is an experiment and the future is uncertain. Generous financial help from both Government and Churches solved the serious water problem. The Federal Board of Christian Education organised a work party who helped in the building of the Aged Aboriginal Peoples Homes and the Carnaryon Staff wonderfully extended themselves enabling these Homes to be opened and ready for occupation on October 27th following on the Federal Conference. Thus many of the Eastern visitors were able to be at the opening ceremony. Owing to the needs of the little Aborigine Group at Onslow it was necessary for Mr & Mrs L. Fisher to remain there waiting for someone to take their place before they could move up further north. So it was late in the year when a matured couple from Norseman, Mr & Mrs M. Broad, were available. These folk have been well received by the natives and are doing an excellent job. This enabled Mr & Mrs Fisher to go on to Roebourne before returning to the Eastern States. Bro Bob Williams still continues on with the Outreach Work despite his health and the sickness of his good wife.

Norseman, W.A. As Mr & Mrs Dover resigned as Superintendents in November. something new in the history of our work accurred in the appointment of our Brother and Sister, Mr & Mrs Sonny Graham as superintendents, with Mr & Mrs L. Beach as deputy superintendents: the remaining staff being Mr & Mrs Bell-Booth, Mr & Mrs J. Harrison, Mr & Mrs G. Polmear, Miss M. Holt, Miss G. Yorkshire, Miss C. Pomery and Miss V. Lawler as house parents, Miss M. Higgins as house parent and office worker, Miss M. Rule, kitchen, Mr & Mrs J. Dorsman in the Centre Work and Mr & Mrs A. Pallett as Mission Workers and giving oversight to Outreach work. The Lord has caused provision to be made for the water supply. A Perth University student contrived the idea as part of their practical work in civil engineering to build a concrete water tank. Norseman Mission was chosen by the Dept. of Native Welfare and during November a 30,000 gal concrete tank was erected by the students with materials supplied free by various firms and costing the Board about \$300. We are thankful to the Lord for His Wonderful & Wise Provision. "Uncle" Olney has retired after 16 years voluntary service with the Mission. He has left behind many friends who will miss his unfailing cheerfulness and willingness. After nine years of faithful service the old school bus has just been replaced, thanks to Laurie Beach for his efficiency in maintenance. The headmaster of the Norseman High School has proved very friendly and this has had the effect of showing a marked improvement in the attitude of both Mission and Town children.

Esperance, W.A. "Fairhaven": Hostel work has never been without its problems and "Fairhaven" has proved no exception. Nevertheless the staff here under the direction of Mr & Mrs R. Rogan with their valuable helpers, Mrs P. Lynch and Miss H. Hoskins have successfully grappled with the problems facing them from time to time, and involving much prayer too, "Grant-in-Aid" has enabled a basket ball cum tennis court to be constructed and is well patronised by the girls. Redecoration of the rooms and refurnishings have been carried out by the staff making this a real home. Mr Rogan has been able to go on some of the outreach trips. This has brought him in contact with many of the girls' parents which has proved of great value to all.

Yokine, W.A. "Bamburra": This is our new Hostel and its name is Aboriginal for "Young Women". Despite teething problems, under Mr & Mrs R. Abbott the superintendents, this new venture which caters for High School students has turned out a remarkable success. With the wonderful christian atmosphere introduced into the hostel by these humble workers and the close relationship of the Dianella Church combined, this has had the effect on the lives of these girls bringing many of them to commit their lives to Jesus Christ. Visits to many of the girls' parents have proved to be of benefit to girls and parents alike. This hostel built and equipped by the Government has a lovely swimming pool and many other amenities which are of benefit to the health of the girls.

Victoria: Sir Douglas Nicholls, who received a well deserved knighthood during the year has had the oversight of the work at Northcote, and is now only acting in an advisory capacity. Mooroopna still continues to prosper under the guidance of Mr Clydesdale with the help of Mr J. Atkinson, Mr Barry Brown, minister at Echuca has been faithful in his visits to Cummeragunga.

Queensland: Under the leadership of Mr & Mrs L. Morris, growing interest in the work at Eidsvold has been maintained and although these good folk would like a replacement, they are prepared to stay on until a suitable couple can be obtained. They are to be commended for their attitude.

contribution of the House Mothers and the degree of co-operation of the staff has been of the highest order. No words in any report could ever convey our appreciation of dedicated service and no one could really understand how much is

given, to the limits of endurance and beyond, by the staff. There is a steadily increasing number of boys coming into Dunmore and at the end of December there were 23 boys in residence. On every hand, from Child Welfare Departments, other Homes etc., we receive evidence of the respect that is held for Dunmore. This good name has been built up over the years and is being consistently maintained.

Recently we received a new washing machine, a wonderful and timely anonymous donation. Further a Walk-a-thon arranged by the Hornsby Young People realised the sum of \$215, and this amount was presented to the Chairman for a second washing machine.

Considerable maintenance work is required and it is hoped that at least a start will be made in the coming year.

Memorial doors have been presented by Mrs. French and these will grace the front of our building as a tribute to a good friend of Dunmore over many years, the late Wal. French.

HOSTEL: The Hostel has confronted the Committee with its problems and there is no doubt that it is essential to transfer the location to Pendle Hill to provide additional control.

Miss Cox has worked untiringly and has given of herself beyond the call of duty. Regrettably her efforts have not always been appreciated.

The original architect's plans for a Motel type hostel have been rejected due to the ultimate cost and a second plan has now been accepted by the Committee. Mr. K. Sawdy, the architect, has requested a builder to provide an estimate and it is hoped to commence building in the near future. The Committee is concerned that the new building should be within its financial capacity and should not be a call on the Brotherhood. The sale of Marrickville, together with funds in hand, should provide the major portion of the cost.

FETE: The Fete does create a lot of work and we wish there was some other way; the fact is however that our situation would be hopeless without it. We will ever be indebted to all who put so much effort into this special day. This year the young people played an increased part and their assistance was noticed and appreciated. The final result was \$2,450.

GENERAL: In an endeavour to introduce our Staff, Boys and Young Men to our country churches, we have undertaken three visits during the year. First by cars to Wagga, and then by bus to Newcastle and Taree. These have been memorable experiences and will live long in the hearts of all. We thank the churches sincerely for their hospitality and fellowship. It is hoped to continue this idea - even setting our sights further afield. If any church, city or country, would like to have the boys visit them, the secretary would be only too pleased to arrange for this.

Following requests from some churches and schools for specific projects, may we suggest the following: 1. Gestetner - Electric; 2. Furnishings for new hostel; 3. Linen; 4. Inner-spring mattresses.

Finally a sincere thank you to all who have helped, prayed and given to both Pendle Hill and Marrickville. The results are not always spectacular but consistent and dedicated service is needed continually.

SOCIAL SERVICE DEPARTMENT REPORT

The Department of Social Service, in serving the Brotherhood and the community, sees the "Good News" of Jesus Christ, in that He came that all men might "Have life and have it abundantly", as something which affects the whole person in helping that person to achieve not only spiritual rightness, but physical, material and mental wellbeing as well.

In order to make the "Good News" relevant through the Department, a re-evaluation of our Purpose, our Means of Operation, and our Structure, has taken place. This has meant that in some aspects of our work changes have been affected

and in others change is pending. THE PURPOSE OF THE DEPARTMENT. It must be recognized that this Department is a voluntary Church Welfare Agency and as such it differs in some respects, and particularly in its emphasis, from a secular agency. Mostly the welfare services carried out are similar, but if we believe in the reason for Jesus' coming into the world, as stated above, then the emphasis will go beyond normal casework and

endeavour to relate the individual and the situation to Jesus Christ as a personal Saviour, and to His principles for living and patterns of behaviour.

Saviour, and to fits principles for hing sometimes to believe that the area of our Unfortunately, however, it is easy sometimes to believe that the area of our concern is confined to the limitations of Church membership, but this cannot be so in the clear light of the scriptural injunction "to do good unto all men, especially those who are of the household of faith".

The Department has always been aware of this dual purpose, but in the process of re-evaluation it has been helpful to re-emphasize this two-fold motivation.

MODUS OPERANDI. We cannot examine the purpose of the Department without very quickly coming to grips with the means employed to fulfil the purpose. Here, too, a re-evaluation has taken place. In doing this we have been anxious to provide adequate care for the vital areas of the Community, the Fellowship of the Church and particular Personal situations which concern most, if not all, people at some time.

If the means employed are to be effective they can no longer operate from a central agency but rather the agency must provide media or tools to enable the local church to identify itself with and become involved in the community in which it is located, as well as to deal with the problems inherent in her own membership. Some of the tools may be listed as follows:

FOR COMMUNITY CARE "Community Contact" enables individuals, preferably, and local groups to contact a given segment of the community in order to secure clothing etc. for our Welfare work, and by means of a continuing planned contact program, to create friendships which by careful nurturing, may culminate in a recognition of Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord. It is a tool which places no embarrassment on the person contacted but will demand personal Christian integrity and drive.

"Neighbour Aid Program" which is still in the course of development, is designed to provide a training program for ministers firstly, and through them, selected Church personnel to enable them to become involved with and to meet the needs of people they meet in their everyday activities. The program will comprise a basic understanding of approach to people, recognition of particular problems, some casework involvement and knowledge of referrals where necessary.

FOR CARE OF THE CHURCH FELLOWSHIP. "The Fellowship of Right-Handers" which hasbeen operating for several years, is a simple New Testament method of exhibiting interest in and concern for people within the Church as well as beyond, in an anonymous way. Attractive printed folders with space provided on which may be written a brief note of encouragement, appreciation, welcome, sympathy, etc. These are sent out anonymously and the whole purpose is to create in the mind of the recipient a sense of belonging to the group and of the fellowship of the Church. If material help is required, financial assistance may be enclosed. The basic principle of the Fellowship of Right-Handers is found in the Sermon on the Mount "Let not your left hand know what your right hand doeth". FOR PARTICULAR AND PERSONAL SITUATIONS. Everybody without

FOR PARTICULAR AND PERSONAL SITUATIONS. Everybody without exception, at some time is in need of help and consequently media to meet these situations must be as diverse as our natures and the areas of need.

"Material Aid" is one of these areas and your Social Service Department, working through the local Church, provides assistance with food, clothing, financial help, Christmas cheer, accommodation and similar assistance. We draw attention at this point to the "Christian Fellowship Association" which enables the Department to meet some very necessitous situations with financial assistance either as interest-free loans, or as gifts. This year assistance amounting to \$ has been provided. C.F.A. also provides an opportunity for the individual Church member to share in the provision of material aid by regular weekly or monthly contributions. It is regretted that all too few of our Church members are taking advantage of this opportunity.

"Counselling, Social Casework and Chaplaincy Services" in Industry, Hospitals, Prisons and Institutions help to meet situations of mental and emotional stress. These stresses are often found in relation to unmarried mothers, adoptions, broken marriage relationships, unemployment, hire purchase, pensions, property matters, and so on. In all of these the Department has participated and facilities are available for use through the local Church.

"Inter-Personal Relationships" sometimes require attention. Parent-child, family, marriage relationships and others sometimes become distorted. Your Department provides media to assist in these situations through pre-marital education, marriage guidance, family counselling, and must do so in an increasing degree.

"Care of the Aged" is a particular area of care and should be an important factor in the Church's ministry. The Department has developed a total care program for the retired and aged in self-contained units, Guest and Nursing Homes. However, we must never regard this as an end in itself but rather a means by which the Church can identify itself in the community, thus the Church should and must find a place in its program to enable such care to be provided.

"Bingley Hall", Hornsby. New accommodation for ten guests and a new and enlarged kitchen and dining room area was completed which, together with floor coverings, furniture and equipment cost close on \$70,000. All accommodation is taken. A completely new staff, under the direction of Mrs. Johnson as housekeeper, have been installed as Mr. and Mrs. Edwards enter into a well-earned retirement in a unit provided at "Bingley Hall". To them the Brotherhood owes a very great debt of appreciation, an expression of which will be made in the new vear. "Mayfield Retirement Settlement". "Highfield Court". Ten self-contained units surrounding open-ended courtyard were completed and all are to be occupied. Plans

"Mayfield Retirement Settlement","Highfield Court". Ten self-contained units surrounding open-ended courtyard were completed and all are to be occupied. Plans are in hand for three additional units, leaving sufficient ground for doubling the size of "Victoria House", — where Mrs. Richardson is Housekeeper, as well as a small Nursing Annexe. Cost of the units and carpeting was approximately \$80,000, made available mainly by Establishment donations and Commonwealth Government Subsidy.

"Pendle Hill Retirement Settlement". Commencement was made on the construction of a forty-bed Nursing Home and eighteen self-contained units grouped around a central courtyard, together with a Therapy Block, Community room, Storage area and Office space, which is expected to be completed about mid 1973. The cost of this project is assessed at about \$450,000. An additional 62 self-contained units still remain to be built on this location.

Provision of equipment and furniture will entail a heavy outlay. It is gratifying to know that the C.W.F. have made their special project for this year furnishings for the Nursing Home. It would be appreciated if other sponsors for the Nursing Home equipment, furnishings for wards and living rooms, etc. would contact our Department with donations or interest-free loans.

"Tasman Retirement Settlement, Thirroul". Our Architect, Mr. Keith Sawdy, is preparing a developmental plan for twelve self-contained units on land at the end of Tasman Parade. Land adjoining the "Samuel and Ann McCauley Guest" Home is available for future extensions to the Guest Home and provision of a Nursing Annexe. This Guest Home held in high regard in the community, is always filled, and carefully supervised by Mrs. P. Atkinson.

"Croydon Guest Home". No developmental change has taken place at this Centre but the Home remains popular and at present is enjoying good staff relations under the capable supervision of Mrs. Brown as Housekeeper. "Forestville Retirement Settlement". At this elite location in Cook Street it is

"Forestville Retirement Settlement". At this elite location in Cook Street it is proposed to construct a thirty-bed Guest Home and 35 self-contained units. Our Architect has been requested to draw a developmental plan for submission to Council. Churches on the North Shore are interested in sponsoring occupants of some of the units and it is expected that a commencement on construction will be made during 1973.

"Epping". This project is still in the throes of difficulties as far as Council approval is concerned and we are still awaiting certain developments in this regard.

During the year our Churches at Tweed Heads and Lismore expressed concern for the development of geriatric care in their areas. Land is being sought in both locations in these growing north coast districts. The Churches believe that provision of such Homes will identify the Church and its outreach in the community.

Vigilance must ever be kept between costs and income because on the one hand we are confronted with ever-increasing costs, whereas incomes remain comparatively static. Whilst the Department has no wish to make a profit out of the care of the aged, it is gratifying to know that the Budget is being balanced.

STRUCTURE OR FUNCTIONING OF THE DEPARTMENT. In considering the means employed to fulfil the purpose of the Department, your Committee realised the necessity to do something about restructuring. It was recognized that for too long too few had been required to carry the burden of an ever-growing Brotherhood Department. In fact, only one constant full-time staff member, the Director, has been employed, until the past two or three years when a Maintenance and Pick-up Man was employed. Office work has been carried out mainly on a voluntary basis. Apart from this, voluntary workers cannot always be constant and so this has added to the difficulties of administering the Department.

"Restructuring the Department" is designed to provide for diversification, delegation and specialisation, and will involve the following:-

The Director, who will have general oversight of all activities, but specifically Homes administration, Counselling, and will deal with Property Trust matters which provide a very necessary income to the Department.

A Welfare Services Appeal Co-ordinator — part-time — whose responsibility will be to co-ordinate the various activities associated with the Welfare Appeal, such as the supply and distribution of clothing, organization of Opportunity Shops, Street Stalls, etc.

A Social Worker - part-time - whose specific task will be the planning and A Social Worker - part time which reference has already been made in the report. designed to involve the local Church in community activities and outreach.

A Promotional Representative - part-time - whose responsibility will be to A Promotional Representative part time within the local Church the aspects discuss with Church officers and key personnel Church as well as promote the of the Department which can benefit the local Church, as well as promote the work of the Department.

A Chaplaincy Services Supervisor - part-time - to supervise the voluntary Chaplaincy services in Hospitals, Industry and Institutions.

During the year Mr. R. Aldred served part-time as a Chaplain to Industry and Institutions. Towards the end of the year he relinquished this position to take up a larger ministry with the Pendle Hill Church. He is continuing to serve as a voluntary chaplain in Industry.

A Homes Staff Supervisor and Liaison Officer - part-time - who will attend to all staff matters and advise the Director with regard to maintenance of Homes property and equipment.

A Homes Maintenance Superintendent and Pick-up man whose work will be maintaining our properties in good order, as well as attending to the regular pick-un of used clothing, furniture, etc.

An efficient Office Secretarial Assistant is desperately needed and in 1973 we will be seeking such a person.

Suitable people are being sought and of course if suitable voluntary workers are available it would reduce costs involved.

Our minimum Budget for administration, apart from running the Homes, is estimated at \$30,000, 25% of which we believe should be available from the Brotherhood.

OTHER ACTIVITIES.

"Welfare Appeal". The regular pick-up of clothing and other articles from Churches has continued and we appeal to our members to increase the supply, if possible, to maintain our Welfare work and supplies to our particular shops and stalls.

Welfare Shops. The shop in Joseph Street, Lidcombe, is an excellent asset and we are delighted that our tenancy is extended for the next two or three years at least.

A Kiosk at Arncliffe Station has been secured at a low rental and early in 1973 it will be set up ready for trading.

Street Stalls are held each fortnight at Hornsby, Villawood, Fairfield and Cabramatta. Without the proceeds from our Welfare Appeal it would be difficult to continue the operations of the Department.

Representation amongst Churches. This has continued with the Director addressing Church services each Sunday. A different approach, however, is planned for 1973 with Sessions with Church officers and Auxiliary leaders to discuss local involvement, as well as Information sessions for Church members generally.

Functional Committees dealing with financial problems, Homes and Social Issues have dealt with matters as required. However, specialized individuals or specialized committees are planned to handle these matters under the restructured program.

Social Questions. These issues have become so diverse and significant that it is the opinion of our Committee that Conference ought to set up a Social Questions Board. This, we discover, is the pattern being followed in other States, for the same reasons.

Rose Day. We participate in the annual Rose Day Appeal and are particularly happy with the support given by the local C.W.F. groups in the sale of buttons, and by donations. Mrs. Walker has earned special mention because of her tremendous effort in selling buttons.

Christmas Cheer hampers comprising articles of food and toys were handed out to an increased number of families submitted by our Churches. It is estimated that the value of these hampers was in the vicinity of \$1,000. We appreciate the help of Bible Schools and other groups who provided much of the food and toys required.

Community Food Appeal. As a participating body in this annual Appeal, young people of our Churches supported us well and the groceries received were distributed throughout the year in our welfare work and to the various Homes of our Brotherhood.

Affiliations. We are represented on many external voluntary organizations such as The N.S.W. Council of Social Services, Council on the Ageing, Voluntary Geriatrics Association, Temperance Alliance, Mental Health Association, Good Neighbour Council, Inter-Church Trade and Industry Mission, Council for Clinical and Pastoral Education, Chaplaincy Advisory Council, AUSTCARE, and similar bodies.

GENERAL: A new bookkeeping system has been evolved and this should simplify the many matters which have been a burden to our Board Treasurers. With an ever expanding work and rises in costs of all commodities, a watchful eye must ever be kept on finances. Assistance has been given by the Board to pastors of the Aboriginal Evangelical Fellowship who have Ben Mason working in Kalgoorlie and Cedric Jacobs in Perth. The Sectional Conference of our Aboriginal Work held in Perth requested the Board to give financial aid to an A.E.F. pastor for Port Lincoln, S.A. Housing and Land Rights matters have been taken up with the Prime Minister of Australia and the Premier of Western Australia by the Board on several occasions. Whilst keeping an eye on these things and the many social habits, unfortunately detrimental, which have crept into the lives of our Aborigines, the Board's chief commission and concern is that these people might know Jesus Christ as their Saviour and to this end they are actively engaged. COMMITTEE: Your Committee in New South Wales for the year consisted of

Mr & Mrs L. Bills, Mr G. E. Knight, (Treas.), Mrs J. Maxwell, Mr E. E. Oswald, Mr & Mrs H. Roose, (Chairman), Mrs M. Taylor, (C.W.T. rep.), Mr R. H. Wakerley and Mr C. T. Garrett, Miss E. Stow and Mr E. Park were co-opted on to the Committee. However both Mr Park and Mr Wakerley were forced to resign, the former owing to family difficulties and the latter due to ill health. It was a severe wrench to part with both of these brethren as they have given a lifetime to Aborigine work and their knowledge and advice was of great value to the Committee and the Brotherhood. We regret very much losing them but sincerely pray that the Lord will be their guide and stay at all times. We thank our Heavenly Father for enabling our brethren to give so generously to this important part of His work and as we face the task for another year we seek a continuance of your wholehearted and prayerful support. The Committee emphasis for the year was upon prayer and to this end a Bi-Monthly Prayer Letter was introduced. There have been few comments concerning this but we trust you have found it of great help in your prayer life. It has been sought after by other States and commended by the Board. Legacies and Special Gifts have again accounted for the greater part of our receipts. The balance of the bequest left by our late Sister, Mrs L. M. Dickson, fully materialised enabling the Federal Board to finalise the purchase of the fine property at Mount Lawley, W.A. which is their headquarters. Special gifts were given for the Carnarvon Water Supply and the Work at Onslow as well as for other Mission work. The "Cents Appeal" for the North West Outreach amounted to \$4,008.36 and the "Cents" are still coming in. Just where we are going in our Aborigines Work for the future is hard to forecast for the work is more or less changing every day. But this we do know, that by the signs given by our Loving Saviour, when living upon this earth, the day is far spent and the night cometh when no man can work. Therefore we have NO time to waste but must use all our resources and energies in order that the precious gospel reaches our Aborigines before it is TOO LATE. This report would be incomplete without a word of thanks to the many Auxiliaries, Bible Schools, Ladies' Fellowships, Christian Endeavourers, Club Members and the many others who have made by their gifts the work of our missionaries much easier and the lives of our Mission children as well as adults and other children much happier. In the words of Paul, we give "thanks always for all things unto God and the Father in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ".

DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION REPORT

C.W.F. representative was Mrs. C. Nutt; Treasurer, N. Cowdrey; Bookroom Treasurer, D. Martin.

STAFF: Mrs Hughes has continued to give much appreciated service as office secretary to the Department of Christian Education and in a variety of other roles. We also express our appreciation to Mrs Roose for her service in the Bookroom where her enthusiasm to further improve the Bookroom's ministry to the Brotherhood has been clearly demonstrated. Mr Ron Kallmier took up the position of D.C.E. director in 1972 and concentrated much of his attention on camping and teacher training. GENERAL:

Australian Standard Lesson Material: Throughout Australia and New Zealand "Australian Standard" maintained its good reception despite the price rise which became necessary during the year. It has been necessary also to reprint some of the material during 1972 and reprinting will continue in certain grades during the coming year. Increasing printing costs and our commitment of repayment to the printer have required consistent reviewing of the situation. We seek your continued support as we serve the Brotherhood by producing Australian Standard Lessons.

Focus Magazine: The number of subscriptions is near the 2,500 mark despite the price increase that became necessary during 1972. The quality of production and content continues to draw favourable comments from readers. Thanks to the "Focus" Committee for their excellent work.

Christian Education Council (J. Saxby, Chairman): A number of individual churches throughout N.S.W. introduced Teacher Training Programmes organised by the D.C.E. in 1972. The Teacher Training Seminar at Stanwell Tops during July was particularly well attended and has encouraged this Council to plan for a greatly expanded programme for Sydney and Newcastle districts as well as local churches in 1973. Plans for a series of audio-visuals to be used in local churches to assist in training bible school teachers and youth workers are on the agenda for this year. These will be produced if sufficient finance is available. The annual Bible School Examinations were again organised by this Council. Congratulations to those who were successful. Once more the inter-state churches demonstrated their ability.

Youth Ministry Council (C. Pieremont, Chairman): Increased numbers at most camps during this year have proved very encouraging. Evangelistic Car Camp teams are being organised for country churches in 1973. Their objective is to train young people in Christian witnessing, to bring young people into an environment of Christian fellowship and concern for others that will stimulate them to be more effective in their local churches, and to assist the country churches visited. The response to this innovation in camping has been most encouraging already. "Tools" training seminars were organised for the first time in 1972. Some of Youth Ministry Council members comprised part of the committee which arranged for the sessions. A wide range of talented personnel acted as seminar leaders. The attendance, which was beyond what was expected, demonstrated that our young people feel the need for training in Christian growth and service. Further "Tools" sessions on a wider scale are planned for 1973.

Youthquake: The 1972 Youthquake Rallies have been very successful. The approximate attendance at each rally was between 400-500 people coming from all over the metropolitan area and even as far as Newcastle and Wollongong. The Committee has endeavoured to cater for every taste with a well-balanced and always interesting programme.

By far the best rally was held in May. The programme took the form of an "Old Time" night which was attended by over 600 young people (and just a few not so young) a lot of whom dressed up for the occasion. Two young people responded to the invitation given by the speaker, Barry Brown.

We praise God for the opportunity that these rallies provide for young people to hear the Gospel.

We thank you for your prayer support during the past year and we look forward to your continued support in 1973.

FINANCE: At the end of 1971 the balance was \$186.54; the income for 1972 was \$429.83, giving a total of \$616.37. Expenditure for 1972 rallies totalled \$561.23 leaving a balance of \$55.14.

Bookrooms: During the past year Burwood and City Temple Bookrooms continued to serve the Brotherhood as a source of Christian literature. The work of voluntary helpers both at Burwood and City Temple has been much appreciated. Special thanks to Mrs Schofield for her work at the City Temple and at Church bookstalls, to Mr Peiper for his enthusiasm in the oversight of the Burwood bookshop, and to Mr D. Martin for the capable way he has accepted the responsibility of Bookroom treasurer.

Unfortunately the D.C.E. has had to reach the decision to terminate its involvement in the Burwood Bookshop early in 1973. This has been brought about by a number of factors including work load on full-time staff and finance. Stanwell Tops: Three of the D.C.E. committee members serve on the Stanwell

Stanwell Tops: Three of the D.C.E. committee members serve on the Stanwell Tops Management Committee because of the D.C.E.'s particular interest in the development of the camp site.

FINANCE: Again we face a difficult year financially. With costs continually increasing we are confronted with a diminishing budget. We seek your prayerful concern in this regard as it seems certain that some of our plans for the future must be greatly limited or shelved if present trends continue.

FUTURE: Areas of immediate challenge and concern to the D.C.E. include the following:— a wider range of camping opportunities for all ages; expanded training programmes touching on all facets of Christian education; the acquisition of new and the replacement of old equipment; the production of training audio-visuals for use in local churches; the building of a tape/cassette/filmstrip library; the continued printing and distribution of Australian Standard Lesson Materials.

We would close this report by expressing our gratitude to God for the privilege of service in the past year. We look forward expectantly to what will be achieved with His help in 1973.

REPORT OF FEDERAL BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The excitement comes in seeking new approaches to suit new situations, so that the Gospel may come afresh to people in our day.

The Future: Some churches are moving away from the tradional Sunday morning time slot for Sunday School. They have moved back to Sunday afternoons, to week days after school, to week nights, to monthly 5-hour Saturday programmes. They are doing this in order to recapture the flagging interest of families, to make the best use of limited facilities, to increase the effectiveness of their teaching.

It is vital that each congregation should constantly examine what is the best way in which it can carry out its Christian education programme.

We are realizing increasingly, however, that what takes place in formal classes will not effectively teach as much as what happens in the total life of the congregation. If we have drab worship services, no enthusiasm to share the Gospel, no love to serve those in need, we are undermining the teaching of our Christian education classes. On the other hand, if worship is alive and exciting, and the congregation is keen to share its faith and serve those in need, powerful teaching is already taking place for all who are involved, even as spectators.

The Board is exploring ways and means of translating these realizations into realities.

Christian Life Curriculum: The curriculum is over half way through its second cycle. Intensive evaluation is taking place with a view to revision after the third cycle.

Already new material has been introduced for leaders of youth classes to help them have a more lively and effective approach. This year has seen the publication of the Church Membership Training Manual and Kit, the Nursery Manual/ Coursebook and Teachers Packet, and several new adult studies. Increasing emphasis will be placed on teacher training materials in order that standards might be raised.

Work Party: The Aged Persons Homes in Carnarvon are in use. They were built by sixteen members of the first national youth work party. Young people from all over Australia raised over \$7,000 towards the fares of the team and the cost of the project, an amount which was subsidized 2 for 1 by the Commonwealth Government.

Preliminary investigations are under way for a second national work party.

National Youth Convention: About 220 young people from all States and New Zealand gathered in Canberra in January for the 6th National Youth Convention. National Youth Conventions have had a significant spiritual impact and been a growing experience for many of our young people.

The 7th National Youth Convention will be held in Christchurch, New Zealand, in January 1975. A Savings Club has been formed to enable young people to get there. As well as the usual growth and inspirational experience, it will strengthen the links between the two countries.

Youth Ministry: Most of the action in youth ministry is in the local congregation. The Board has issued a call to congregations

(1) to involve young people in the whole life of the congregation — its worship, evangelism, service and its decision-making, and

(2) to re-examine their goals in youth work and their ways and means of reaching these goals.

The Board continues to explore more effective means of carrying out youth ministry.

Staff Training: In conjunction with The Joint Board of Christian Education the Board has held its first biennial staff training for Christian education directors and field staff. For the sake of the local churches it is important for our Christian education staff to be of the highest quality.

GO! GO! continues to serve the need of local churches to carefully plan the broad scope of their life and witness. GO! continues to meet with enthusiastic

THE AUSTRALIAN CHRISTIAN REPORT

"The Australian Christian" showed a deficit of \$1,323 for 1970. By careful stewardship, and in spite of rising costs, the deficit in 1971 was \$173. The figures for 1972 were not available when this report was prepared. Our finances were also assisted by the "Friends of the Christian" Appeal. In the Second year of the appeal the response was \$1,927, making a total of \$10,629. This money is, of course, invested and only the interest used for operating costs. At the beginning of 1973, the subscription rate was raised to \$5.00 per year. This is a moderate rise in view of the sharp increases in the cost of living in every this is a moderate rise in view of the sharp increases in the cost of living in every area and represents the first increase in ten years. subscription rate. The present number of subscribers is 5189 compared with 5250 at the beginning of 1972. years of partnership between the Austral Company and "The Australian Christian". ("The Australian Christian" has engaged another printer, but it is emphasised that the Austral Company is still ready to meet the printing needs of churches,

members, and church departments.) The Board of Management, the Associate Editors, and the Advisory Committee are dedicated to serve the Australian Brotherhood through Christian journalism. We ask for the continued support of State Conference and local churches to enable us to serve effectively.

In New Guinea, Mr. John Fasi, who first attended our mission primary school at Pir and was one of the first to be baptized in this area, is now President of the I.V.F. at the Madang Teachers' College and in this capacity arrived in Australia in December to attend the I.V.F. Conference in Hobart.

In the New Hebrides, Mr. Amon Swero has returned to the teaching staff at Londua after spending a year at the Cambridge Institute of Education. Miss Judith Nelson from Pentecost Island is at present studying at the same Institute in Cambridge.

Mr. Edward Tambisari from Pentecost Island in the New Hebrides has successfully completed his second year in medicine at the University of Papua and New Guinea. Mr. Tambisari is sponsored mainly by the New Zealand Lepers' Trust, but also receives support from the St. Andrews St. Andrews St. Church of Christ, Dunedin, New Zealand, and the Overseas Mission Board through the Tunstall Trust.

Two New Hebridean nurses after completing training in New Zealand, returned to the staff at the Duindui Hospital.

Mr. John Tabi from Pentecost Island completed in December at Naracoorte, South Australia, an apprenticeship course in motor engineering. On his return to the New Hebrides, he will teach motor mechanics.

the New Hebrides, ne will teach motor mechanics. The Banmatmat Bible College in the New Hebrides is meeting the need to train New Hebridean pastors. It is expected that two men who have graduated from Banmatmat, will go to New Guinea or Fiji for further theological training. Mr. & Mrs. G. Warne from N.S.W. have been appointed to the Banmatmat Bible College to replace Mr. & Mrs. C. McCosker who have faithfully served in this work for the past three years. The Warne's are, for the time being, at Ranwadi.

The short term pastor training and Bible Schools established in New Guinea by Mr. Beale have assisted in the task of reaching out into new areas. Mr. R. Whan will be responsible for the continuation of this important ministry. During 1972, three Churches of Christ students were studying at the Christian Leaders' Training College at Banz.

(e) Local Churches starting new Churches. Three years after the commencement of the Church at Tsumba on the Ramu River in New Guinea, thirty to forty villages became enquirers of the mission under mission influence. Through kinship ties the gospel spread from Tsumba to Bramfito on the Keram and a new Church was started initiating the beginning of the work in the Keram area which has spread to other new areas.

As a result of contact between clans through long established trading practices and through the web of family relationships, established churches have the opportunity to start new churches, and this is being encouraged.

Mr. & Mrs. Beale who pioneered the work in New Guinea were encouraged before they left the field to know that from the small beginning in 1958, today services are being held in 52 villages each weekend with about 2000 in attendance.

More than 60 people were baptized in New Guinea during 1972 and church membership now exceeds 400.

In the New Hebrides established churches continue to commence new churches in new areas.

(f) Bible Translation. If a relieving teacher is available for 1973, Miss Diana Catts will conduct an intensive survey of the linguistic situation with a view to Scripture translation in the Keram River area and Scrader Ranges. The New Guinea Field Council in May 1973 will give further consideration to this important

New Hebridean translators have now translated a large portion of the New Testament into two languages and portions of the New Testament into other languages.

(g) Bible Correspondence, Literature and Radio Evangelism. Bible Correspondence lessons continue to be an effective means of evangelism. Over 18,000 students have enrolled since our Bible Correspondence Courses became available and approximately 17,000 lessons are marked annually.

Our Literature Department in India, which is now under Indian leadership, published Dr. Paul White's book, 'Jungle Doctor Tug of War' during 1972, and 'Monkey Tales' the previous year. Another book, 'Hippo Happiness' is due out in 1973. These books are translated and published in Marathi. The Marathi edition of A. R. Main's First Principles has proved to be most popular and the fourth edition has now been printed. Requests have been made for the book to be printed in other Indian languages. Mr. S. P. Hiwale has added a new chapter to First Principles, 'The Lord God'.

To meet the demand and need for Christian Literature in the New Hebrides, the Board made a grant of \$2,000 for the purchase of books for resale. There is an urgent need for the production of Christian literature suitable for the needs of

The commentators are indian personnel. we nave one 15 minute programme, "Shastra Shed" meaning "Search the Scripture" which is broadcast to India each week by the Far East Broadcasting Association in the Seychelle Islands.

PLANNING FOR EVANGELISM AND CHURCH GROWTH As was reported to Federal Conference in October 1972, the following plans are

being made for Evangelism and Church Growth: New Guinea: Five Year Plan for Evangelism adopted at Annual Meeting of Field

Council 1972:

- Expansion i. ANGORAM Within 5 years a European or New Guinean pastor be situated (a) Expansion
 - ii. SCHRADER RANGES Establishment of trained New Guineans in central localities as either literacy teachers or Bible teachers. Linguistic work - The learning, and reduced to writing of one of the local languages.
- iii. Villages along the track connecting Madang and Bogia with Aiome, and the placement of local Bible trained evangelists in villages willing to have them. iv. The mouth of the lower Keram and mid Sepik, the placement of local Bible
- trained evangelists in villages willing to have them.
- y. We note we have adherents in Madang to whom we would like to minister but in the next five years we feel we could not undertake this.

(b) Stabilising

- i. Within 3 years of a church being formed, we encourage at least one member from that church to be involved in one of our training programmes. We note that by the end of 1972 there will be 12 Churches of Christ in New Guinea. By the end of 1973 there are indications to show there could be 16 churches all told.
- ii. The training programme for Pastors and Bible School students to be upgraded to the place where they could spend 50% of their time in Bible School, with normal attendance between 30 to 40.
- iii. That in each Mission area, a regional Bible School be set up to give 3 or 4 short courses each year, from which people could go to the central Bible School.
- iv. We will still be encouraging students who qualify to apply for Christian Leaders' Training College and other training institutions. The New Guinea Field Coumcil estimates that ten additional workers will be

required during the next five years.

New Hebrides: Five Year Plan for evangelism as first proposed Annual Meeting of the Missionary Committee, July 1971, and further developed in subsequent meetings

- (a) That appeals be made to the Australian Brotherhood for funds to subsidise Church buildings, pastors' salaries, and other church needs so that the work may be stabilised and work in new areas commenced.
- (b)Possible goals in outreach programme, 1972 Pastor's house in Vila and Santo. 1973 Church building, Santo. 1974 Christian Centre, Vila. 1975 Christian Centre, Noumea.

(c) That consideration of European help in pastoral work and preaching in Vila and Santo be given.

(d)That every effort should be made to double Church membership within five vears.

(e) Encourage pastors to do more outreach work among heathen villages on Santo and Malekula.

(f) Implementation of the Five Year Plan should begin at the local Church level rather than in large meetings. Village crusades and Leaders' camps should be

encouraged to bring Christians into a deeper commitment of their lives to Christ. (g) Literacy programme to be intensified using literature in Pidgin English, cassettes and a wider range of Christian literature.

India: Strategy for the future.

(a) Handing over leadership of all aspects of the work if possible during the next two years.

(b)Greater emphasis on planting and developing churches through self-support, self-government and self-support. self-government, and self-propagation. While with self-support, there are several limiting factors, newsday, and far as limiting factors, nevertheless it must continue to be objective. As far as self-government is continue to be objective. self-government is concerned, much progress has been made. Concerning self-propagation, while a great deal is already being undertaken, the church must be enthused to capture a real concern for the masses without Christ.

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GENERAL

INDONESIA: Federal Conference approved of the Notice of Motion presented by the Overseas Mission Board concerning Indonesia. The text of the Motion was "Believing that its expanding responsibilities in India, New Guinea and the New Hebrides will make full demands on its resources in the foreseeable future, the Board recommends to Conference that we as a Brotherhood accept these new challenges in our existing fields and do not fragment our efforts by undertaking in Indonesia any but minor operations for a two year period when Federal Conference will provide an opportunity to reconsider the extent of our involvement.

The Board at meetings held after Federal Conference has decided that our initial policy of work undertaken in Indonesia within the framework of approval given by Federal Conference, should be in the field of Literature, Radio and Bible Correspondence. These methods of communicating the gospel have been most successful in our Indian field. It is expected that some of our Marathi Radio programmes will be translated into Indonesian and enquiries are being made concerning participation in Bible Correspondence and Literature ministries. VISIT TO INDONESIA AND INDIA: In july and August 1972, Mr. B. V. Coventry, Assistant Secretary, visited Indonesia and India. The purpose of visiting

Indonesia was to make further enquiries concerning the situation today and how we could serve as a Brotherhood. Mr. Coventry reported on a number of changes taking place in our Indian field today and stressed the urgent need to train more personnel for leadership.

CHINA: At the September meeting of the Board it was agreed that we should encourage our churches to pray for China with its 800 million people for whom Christ died. It was agreed that information which would help stimulate prayer should be published in 'Missionary News'.

PROMOTIONAL MATERIAL: During the last twelve months, several new promotional pamphlets have been produced. These include a Projects Book, pamphlets on C.O.C.O.A., Save Stamps for Missions and a History of Churches of Christ in New Guinea by Mr. Frank Beale.

A 16 mm coloured movie film on the work in India was produced and several audio-visuals using tape and slides. These audio-visuals include - 'Preparing people in New Hebrides and New Guinea for Christian Leadership', 'Helping others through C.O.C.O.A.', 'Are You in the Pictures?', plus audio-visuals prepared by Miss J. Simpson on the work in New Guinea, and Mr. B. Coventry on India.

Coloured maps of our Mission fields were up-dated and reprinted during 1972. The Bi-Monthly periodical 'Missionary News' continues to be well received and provides regular information concerning the work of the Overseas and Aborigines Mission Board.

MISSIONARY CAMP The 1972 Missionary Orientation Camp was held at Longwood, South Australia. Missionaries from our Overseas and Aborigine Mission fields attended the camp as well as Missionary candidates and others interested in learning about our mission fields and missionary service.

APPRECIATION. The Overseas Mission Board sincerely thanks all who have given financially as well as gifts of clothing, food parcels, etc., and who have prayed earnestly for the work. The encouragement given by individuals, youth groups, Women's and Men's Fellowships and the churches as a whole is deeply appreciated. We thank our missionaries and national workers for their devoted service. We convey a particular word of appreciation to missionaries who after many years of service have found it necessary to resign. We are most grateful for services rendered by voluntary workers. We are indebted to the State Overseas Mission Committees for their co-operation and assistance.

We thank our Heavenly Father for blessings received and we count it a joy to take the glad tidings to the remote corners of the earth.

STATE ACTIVITIES: The Committee, on behalf of the Brotherhood, thanks most sincerely those churches, individual members, local missionary committees, etc., who have supported special projects, made special gifts, held missionary demonstrations and rallies, received deputations by visiting missionaries, held regular prayer or in any other way have furthered the Brotherhood's Overseas work. During the year special purpose gifts were made by a number of churches and individuals. The N.S.W. Brotherhood was requested by the Federal Board to accept \$29,000 as a target for the year, and the sum of \$ was given for this part of the N.S.W. Churches' mission work in this Conference year, and sent to Adelaide. The response of the N.S.W. Brotherhood to the Mission appeal is good reason to give thanks and these thanks, on behalf of the missionaries, are here expressed. They need our intelligent, informed prayers, also, to enable them to carry out their work properly.

Cardiff: (R. Smith). Cardiff have responded well to the beginning of R. Smith's ministry and membership has increased to 39. Mrs. Smith continues to work to help support ministry. Subsidy \$650.

Carramar: (W. Harrison). This has been a settling in year for Mr. & Mrs. Harrison. Mr. Harrison works two days per week to maintain support. This is to be reduced to one day in March 1973. Subsidy \$450.

Coffs Harbour: (G. Towle - elect). A highlight of the year was the commencement of a church in Coffs Harbour when a group of christians meeting in the area decided to associate with the Churches of Christ in New South Wales. At the end of the year membership was 16. To assist the church develop, G. Towle will move to Coffs Harbour in January 1973, obtain employment and assist in building up the local membership. Subsidy \$520. Dapto: (E. Holt). This year Dapto once again created a record by relinquishing

support from Sponsoring churches and Home Mission four and a half years after this support commenced. The church at Dapto is to be congratulated on achieving this ahead of schedule. They now have a very good 'All Purpose Hall', Manse and fine membership, who are enthusiastic to reach Dapto for Christ. Engadine: (G. Warne). Membership increased to 56. Subsidy being underwritten

NATIONAL WORKERS. On all fields, National workers share with our Australian Missionaries serving as Bible Women, Preachers, Nurses, Bible Corres-pondence staff etc. in India: Doctor Boys, Assistants to Technical workers, Village evangelistic workers in New Guinea: Pastors, Nurses, Teachers and Technical workers in the New Hebrides.

THE OUTREACHING CHURCH

"The Mission of the Church is out in the World ... Church growth requires an outreaching community. There is no place in church growth theory or practice for an enclosed congregation without outreach. This applies to evangelical missions, to service projects, and to the fight for social justice." (A.R. Tippet, 'Church Growth and the Word of God.')

The outreaching ministry of our churches overseas is demonstrated in various ways such as:

(a) Ministry of healing, teaching, caring for children, relief aid. Healing: In India a new rural health and educational programme is being pioneered by Sister Dorothy Holstein in poverty stricken villages in the Shrigonda area. Sister Holstein spent several months in the Jamkhed area studying a similar project which she said 'was top quality and was having an obvious impact in the area.' The programme includes immunization of children, family planning, detection of T.B. and leprosy, and teaching concerning hygiene and general health. Included in the team that will assist Miss Holstein, are Indian medical and evangelistic workers. It is estimated that this new project will cost \$4,000 p.a.

Dr. Kaviraj continues to serve as medical superintendent at the Dhond Hospital, and is ably assisted by Dr. Ninan, and other Indian medical personnel.

Dr. D. Coulter has resigned from Missionary service in the New Hebrides and is being replaced by Dr. Trevor Taylor from South Australia who will serve for twelve months, when Dr. D. Hemer from South Australia will be appointed to the staff.

Our Hospitals at Duindui, Ranmawat and Nasawa, as well as five village dispensaries, provide an extensive medical programme in the New Hebrides. In addition, nurses and dressers are trained at the Duindui Hospital. Sincere appreciation is expressed to Dr. & Mrs. Coulter for their important contribution in the development of our island medical work.

In New Guinea medical work is conducted at Bunapas, Tsumba, Chungribu, Mui, Gokto and Bunam. In addition, our missionary nurses have an extensive medical programme in the villages.

Teaching: Significant changes have taken place in our education work during the last 12 months.

In New Guinea due to an increasing number of teachers being trained, and the new Employment Ordinance which came into force in May 1972, we may expect an increasing number of New Guineans serving as teachers in our mission schools. The Ordinance is intended to increase employment and training opportunities for Papuans and New Guineans by regulating the entry of immigrants for employment in occupations Papuans and New Guineans could immediately fill, or could be trained to fill. A District Education Board is expected to employ local teachers in the district before it starts looking for teachers outside of the country.

The School established by Miss Rofe for training Pidgin English teachers at Bunam in New Guinea, continues to make good progress. Teachers trained at this school establish Pidgin English schools in their own village. This is enabling children who do not have an opportunity to attend any other school to at least learn to read and write in Pidgin English. The whole of the New Testament is translated into

Relief Aid: Through C.O.C.O.A. has been given to Bangladesh refugees, Korean erm of Overseas Missions, assistance from flood, famine stricken villages, Korean Churches of Christ families suffering from flood, famine stricken villages in New Guinea Highlands, as well as famine assistance and the normal aid programmes in our own mission area such as our medial work in New Guinea and the New Hebrides, and the support of the Dhorja Boy's Home in India.

Financial aid has also been sent to assist Korean Churches of Christ pastors and their families in times of sickness. During their visit to Australia last July, Dr. &

Mrs. Chae from Korea, expressed sincere appreciation to the Australian Brotherhood for the provision of relief assistance.

C.O.C.O.A. has assisted with practical development programmes such as deepening of wells in India. One of the worst famines on record is being experienced in the area where we serve in India. Mr, Ray Veal attended the December meeting of the Board and advised how financial aid could assist in this crisis. It was resolved that \$3,000 be forwarded from our Special Physical Needs fund and additional finance as it became available through C.O.C.O.A.

(b) Concern for Human Rights. At the December meeting of the Overseas Mission Board, it was resolved that we advise our representative on the New Hebridean Council of Churches, that we are in agreement with the following resolution passed at the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Victoria: "Request the Australian Council of Churches to initiate action with the New Hebrides Council of Churches and the World Council of Churches to urge British and French Governments to grant political rights of citizenship, universal suffrage and self determination to the people of the New Hebrides."

(c) Town and Village Evangelism. The Board has appointed Mr. & Mrs. M. Humpries from Victoria to establish a work at Lugainville, often referred to as Santo, in the New Hebrides, Mr, Humphries will be available for pastoral work in town and be responsible for the business interests of the mission, C.W.F. groups in Victoria have accepted as their Golden Bag project for 1972/73, providing finance toward the erection of a house for Mr. & Mrs. Humphries.

Pastor Samuel Vusi continues his ministry in Vila and plans are being prepared for the Vila Christian Centre. The town of Vila is growing rapidly and there is an increasing need and opportunity for Christian witness, Restrictions have been placed on the number of New Hebrideans entering New Caledonia, but contact is being maintained with our brethren in Noumea.

In New Guinea there is a growing need to pastor our folk in the towns of Angoram and Madang, and we are challenged to establish Christian Centres in these places.

Plans are being made to build a Christian Centre on land purchased in Bombay. Finance from the sale of our present property will assist, but in addition at least \$5,000 will be required. It is estimated that in 1973, 3000 people will be living within a 200 yard radius from the area where our Christian Centre will be erected and around this area there are other flats, with a population of 10,000.

On all fields, most of our evangelistic work is in the villages, and the work is expanding into new areas. In New Guinea, villages throughout an extensive area are asking for our help. Amongst these there are tribes, particularly in the Schrader Ranges, that have had hardly any contact with other New Guinea tribes, let alone Europeans and the Christian gospel, Right on our door step in New Guinea there is an extensive, practically unevangelized field. The responsiveness of these people is our opportunity to disciple these tribes.

In the New Hebrides the work continues to expand into villages on Santo, Malekula and invitations have come from people in Tanna, one of the islands in the

Evangelism: This year's theme in the area of evangelism will be "Winning Your World for Christ" and several projects will be presented during the year to assist churches and members in reaching their world for Christ during 1973. FINANCE:

FACULTY AND STAFF: Dr Elliott and Mr Chapman have given splendid service to the College and to the Brotherhood during the year. We are pleased to report that Dr Elliott has been much improved in health and was able to resume full duties. The visiting lecturers have also served very effectively and their ministry is much appreciated by both Board and students. The Board has long been concerned about the low salaries being paid to our full-time faculty members relative to their qualifications and during the year under review some move to bring these up to a more realistic level was made. As foreshadowed in last year's report, Mrs Holt resigned during the year and suitable acknowledgement was made of her faithful service at the College over a number of years. Miss M. Burns was appointed to succeed Mrs Holt and has settled in well.

STUDENTS: All the 1972 exit students seeking placement in full-time ministries were placed. Others are making plans for further missionary training or have entered specialised evangelistic work. The allocation of student ministries was achieved satisfactorily and many reports have been received of excellent work being done. Of considerable concern, however, is the fact that many churches are unable to fully cover the cost to the College of the students' allowances, let alone some proportion of the costs of administration and training, and a crisis point is rapidly being approached. The Board would be reluctant to cut down the student's allowances which are already quite low, and even more reluctant to charge full tuition fees to the students. But apart from additional funds being forthcoming from churches through offerings and/or payments for students' services, just such radical measures may need to be seriously considered.

The placement of students in churches for 1973 presented a number of problems and we apologise to those churches that submitted their requests early but had to

wait until February 1973 for notification. Inevitably, many churches are unable to wait until reforming the second secon notifications could be made.

During 1972 a student assessment form was sent out to churches in which students were serving, and the replies to this are of great help in guiding the student students were setting, and the representation for the ministry. The Board also met with in his training and personal preparation for the ministry. The Board also met with the Student Executive during the year, keeping open the lines of communication. Four ex-students were assisted during the year with their university fees from

the Ashwood Settlement Scholarship Fund.

the Ashwood Settlement Scholarship Fund. The Woolwich Convention held at Burwood in July, was one of the year's highlights and provided inspiration and challenge to all who attended. PROPERTY AND ADMINISTRATION: At time of writing, there is still no sign

of the final outcome of our attempt to secure Council permission to proceed with the erection of the much-needed married accommodation at Corlett Hall. The Board would like to place on record its very sincere appreciation of the efforts of Mr K. Baker who has guided the Board and represented it before Council. During this time of stalemate, the Board has been actively pursuing information about alternative solutions, and several properties have been inspected for use as married accommodation. One property inspected had been suggested as an alternative site for the entire College, but was judged as being unsuitable.

This problem of accommodation is not being considered in isolation from other problems being faced by the College, and the Education Committee, set up last vear, has given some consideration to alterations of the structure of the entire course, perhaps to enabling a reduction in accommodation requirements and achieving economies in the use of lecturing staff and other facilities. This is not to suggest that a decision is about to be made along these lines, but rather to indicate the attitude and concern of the Board to most efficiently use the resources available, consistent with the need to train men and women to high standards for the ministry and other christian work.

Maintenance of the existing premises is continuing as required, and several improvements have been made in the parking facilities at Corlett Hall and elsewhere. It had been hoped to improve the condition of the tennis court, but quotes received for resurfacing with bitumen were prohibitive. It is also intended to provide an overhead projector and other teaching aids in the near future.

FINANCIAL: Once again a deficit was recorded in the House Maintenance, Building Maintenance and College Administration Accounts for this financial year.

Whilst the House Maintenance expenditure decreased, so too did the students board as both expenses are directly variable to the number of students. Painting of the main College building and the building at No. 41, and extensive work on the shower facilities at Corlett Hall resulted in a very heavy expenditure on the Building Maintenance Account. In addition, a bituminous pavement and retaining wall have been constructed at Corlett Hall to provide suitable student parking facilities. This expenditure has considerably reduced the building maintenance reserves built up over a number of years.

The deficit on College Administration is increasing (as expected) and is attributable to a general increase in costs, particularly student allowances and salaries, and insufficient income to meet these increases. The donation of \$1,458 from the Christian Women's Fellowship enabled a new refrigerator and Kenwood Chef to be purchased. Whilst the amounts received from churches for students facilitates payment of student allowances, faculty salaries and general running expenses must be paid for from other income received. To meet these expenses, it has been necessary to transfer \$1,514 from the Endowment Fund and reduce the General Account reserves by \$6,754. General Account reserves are now critically low

As a result of this year's financial transactions the accumulated funds recorded a net decrease of \$9,699.

A legacy of \$2,014 from the F. J. Purdy estate is greatly appreciated and has been invested in the Illawarra Permanent Building Society to increase the Endowment Fund by a net amount of \$500.

Support from churches and individuals plays an important part in College finances and it is pointed out that donations of \$2 and over to the Building Maintenance Account qualify as a dedution for income tax purposes. The construction of married quarters will be financed from this account and your continued support will assist greatly.

The increasing financial deficit is a great concern to the Board and we would ask that your generous support may continue and increase during 1973. APPRECIATION AND GENERAL: The Board wishes to gratefully acknowledge
